Our 25th Silver Jubilee marks a point in time that begs for us to see just how much we have achieved as a neighborhood. Twenty-five years ago most all residential living in downtown Orlando was substandard rental. Lake Eola Heights was mostly boarding houses, each chopped into many units with only a few individual owner-occupied homes in between.

Now imagine a small group of those home owners wondering why the City of Orlando wasn't doing much at the time to improve the area as a place for future families. Commercial intrusion was occurring all around. Homes were being torn down for parking lots. I believe that we were one of the few organizations that changed the course of downtown living forever. We didn't do it all, but we've done a lot. We grew in size and influence ... then there were more of us. Through the years much has improved and each and every one who was a part of LEHHNA has brought us to where we are today.

We started meeting regularly, got organized and often became involved in planning, identifying our borders and developing a mission. The City began to listen and help us with rezoning, new laws and historic designation. Then came the restoration of our brick streets, street lights with bronze plaques and plaques for our homes.

At St. James Cathedral School, learning takes place outside the classroom as well as inside. Students greatly enjoy both local and long-distance field trips and embrace lessons learned with enthusiasm.

Kindergarten classes went on their first field trip to the Green Meadows Farm and had a delightful experience. The students enjoyed a picnic lunch, a scenic bus ride, and encounters with various farms animals. They returned to school with exciting stories and intriguing questions.

The fourth through eighth grade students, along with their parents, ventured to Williamsburg, Virginia, and on to Washington, D.C., for a three-day field trip. A professional guide led the group to Jamestown Settlement, Colonial Williamsburg and through the U.S. Capitol and Smithsonian National Museum of American History.

The first grade classes will experience the Orlando Shakespeare Theater with the live performance of Lilly's Purple Plastic Purse. After reading the book, the students are studying different ways a genre may be presented. It is also a fabulous introduction to theater etiquette!

Additional field trips will include travel to historic St. Augustine and to Kennedy Space Center.

Our school's downtown campus allows the expansion of the classroom curriculum to include nearby performing art venues, history center and government facilities.

DON'T MISS GREEN FEST 2010, IT'S JUST AROUND THE CORNER

The inaugural Green Fest 2010 sponsored by the Mills 50 Main Street District is just around the corner.

The Green Fest will take place on the block of Thornton Avenue between Hillcrest Street and Highway 50. Parking will be available at Hillcrest Elementary School. The date of the event has changed since the last newsletter came out. The event will be held November 13 from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. The focus of the event will be on sustainable products, practices and business which benefit the community.

Mills 50 Main Street is a non-profit community group that partners with local business and neighborhoods to make viable commercial districts that intern provide the shopping and services that residents of local neighborhoods will use, thus benefitting them as well.

The Norseman Company will be selling composters called Earth Machines and water cisterns, both of which are ideal for home use. Each composter sold removes about 650 pounds of garbage per year from the waste stream, thereby reducing garbage and recycling costs to the city and reducing the carbon foot print. This is good for the taxpayer and the planet, too.

The earth machines usually retail for \$100.00 but the special truckload sale at Green Fest will sell the composter for \$33.00. This is done to maximize the number of products sold in the area which maximizes the amount of recycling. These products are likely sell out before the Green Fest ends so be sure to come early.

Both these products are ecologically sound, good for the environment and lead to good sustainable practices by home gardeners. The cistern has about a 40-gallon capacity. It collects rainfall and stores it for later use such as filling water features and watering plants. The collected rainfall is especially good for environments with fish as the water contains no chemicals. The cistern usually sells for \$125.00 but will only cost \$43.00 at Green Fest.

The benefit to the planet is a reduced carbon footprint by diminishing the amount of fertilizer that is manufactured, transported and sold -- not to mention the garbage the trucks don't need to transport all that refuse the local landfill.
