## RECYCLING: IF IN DOUBT, LEAVE IT OUT By Martha Morris

Did you know that when a truck full of recycling contains too high a percentage of inappropriate items, the whole truckload is sent to landfill? To avoid this, follow the Orange County Solid Waste Disposal guidelines.

Above all else, include no plastic bags, whether empty or full. The equipment for sorting the materials becomes jammed by plastic sacks.

Other items to avoid: styrofoam, pizza boxes, gift wrap and ribbons, little bits of paper or cardboard; appliances and electronics; hard plastic items such as toys and laundry baskets and long items such as hoses.

Do not include batteries or other hazardous waste. Here's what can be recycled:

- newspapers, magazines, junk mail;
- flattened corrugated cardboard boxes;
- flattened cracker or cereal boxes (remove the bag inside)
  - empty glass jars and empty cans, without the lids;
- empty plastic bottles and containers with triangles container any number from 1 through 5; no lids

Water-saving hint: when you hand-wash dishes, use leftover water to rinse the food containers so that they are relatively clean when you put them in the bin.
