Notes on the Annual General Meeting February 20th Crime Prevention Panel

Chief Hambleton, Berkeley Police Dept.

- Violent crime is down 1.4% since last year
- There has however been an increase from the last half of 2007 through start of 2008
- Crimes are a combination of strong arm and armed robbery
- There were several violent incidents last fall locally
- There has been success in catching perpetrators.
- Property crime is up 1.1% last year that includes burglary, auto theft, theft and arson – for Berkeley as a whole
- However, down 25% overall since 2003
- Crime in the Willard neighborhood is pretty much static
- Property crimes are 50% auto
 - Recommend a steering wheel lock
 - Don't leave anything in your car
 - 10-15 year old Hondas, Toyotas and Saturns are the most vulnerable. Those cars have good transmissions but poor security.

Chief Harrison, UC Police Department

- The University has lots of new people (students) at the start of every semester
- Students are out and about 24/7
- Students have laptops, cell phones,
 iPods high profile items for theft
- There has been a double digit increase in street crime
 - Strong Arm and pellet gun
- About 70% of the crimes get solved.
- There were 139 violent crimes reported
- There is a night shuttle service which is a regular route till 3AM and after 3AM is door to door
- There is the Bear Walk
- There are blue phones on campus
- Students are encouraged to program in the University emergency numbers to their cell phones
- There is an additional funding request for the South Side which consists of 1 Sgt and 7 officers. Their duties would be patrols, party control and robbery suppression

- The police department would like a larger budget to handle certain areas of crime fighting
 - 3 more additional bike officers for daytime
 - 1 Sgt and 4 officers for evening bike patrols in Downtown and Telegraph
 - Berkeley is #1 for a city our size for injury/collision accidents for pedestrians and cyclist so more traffic enforcement is necessary
 - A request of additional community service officers
 - A request for 7 additional patrol officers
- A larger funding request to make radios interoperable among all of Alameda and Contra Costa County police and fire departments. Currently Oakland Police can't speak with Berkeley Police. Berkeley Police can't speak with the University police etc. This could be a public safety problem in case of earthquake, fire etc.

Councilmember Gordon Wozniak -- D8

- A goal to make all neighborhoods as safe as the safest neighborhood
- Need neighborhood by neighborhood organization to provide sustained pressure across the city to the council
- 50% of Berkeley's crime doesn't come from Berkeley
- Ask the police chiefs what they want/need to reduce crime
- There are many more needs than money in Berkeley
- Berkeley doesn't have a commission focused on public safety
- Work more effectively with UC Berkeley

There is no quick, simple fix

Councilmember Kriss Worthington -- D7

- Help low income neighborhoods organize watches. A relatively inexpensive way to bring down crime
- Increase the police force by 2 officers from current general fund —which is more expensive
- Develop more crime prevention strategies

Questions and Answers from the Crime Panel

Q: Why is there still no communication between the various departments? What is needed to get all the departments talking?

A: Each city developed it radio system independently. The fire departments have some regional radios. Berkeley has purchased some UC Berkeley and Oakland radios. There needs to be a new infrastructure put in place. That will be expensive. The federal government will provide some grants, but it will not cover everything. About \$65 million remains unfunded. Radios and the infrastructure that the radios use are needed. The hope is to start building over the next couple of years.

Q: How bad is it for this neighborhood? What do I need to be wary of?

A: In 2007 for Berkeley there were

- 5 homicides
- 23 rapes
- 432 robberies of which 1/3rd where commercial
- 167 aggravated assaults in which the parties mostly knew each other

It is a diverse group of people committing the crimes, not one specific group. Some suggestions on staying safe or what to do in an attack include

- Yell help or yell "Call 911"
- Carry and use a whistle and a flashlight after dark
- Walk with confidence and purpose
- Be aware of the area around you
- Don't walk and talk on your cellphone or listen to music
- · Walk with a dog or in groups
- Cross the street if something seems odd
- Don't be afraid to call the police—it is better to "cry wolf" then not

Q: How were people caught?

A: They were tracked back from other crimes or by using stolen credit cards. Sometimes solving one crime would lead to several others.

Q: How much burglary is in the neighborhood?

A: Students are the main target. 35-40% could be prevented by making sure doors and windows are closed and locked. We suggest better locks in general. Please trim your bushes/shrubbery so no one can hide in them. More lights left on, like porch lights, and lights on motion sensors will also be helpful. If you call the Community Service Bureau at 510-981-5808 they will do a safety check. It is also good to get to know your neighbors and their cars so you can keep an eye on each other's houses/cars. An alarm system can be very helpful. If something doesn't look/feel right. Call 911 and have the police sort it out. Just because they aren't doing something today, doesn't mean they won't be doing something tomorrow or next week.

AC Transit has proposed a new type of public transit system that will change the way people get around Berkeley. Their proposal takes 2 lanes of traffic off Telegraph Ave. and dedicates them to the Bus Rapid Transit system – at a cost estimated to be \$400 million.

Proponents say that dedicated lanes, and high tech changes to the way the buses operate, will mean more on-time service and higher transit ridership.

Water is Essential in a Disaster

Halcyon Neighborhood Association is coordinating a joint neighborhood order of water barrels to enable households to easily store 55 gallons of water for disaster preparedness.

In the event of a major quake on the Hayward Fault, it will take time for government help to reach us. Even if the main water supply through the Caldecott Tunnel area escapes damage, EBMUD predicts at least 5,000 breaks in its system! And when government trucks finally arrive with water, there will be long lines and frustrating waits to get limited supplies.

Water is essential for survival! The recommendation is to store a MINIMUM of 1 gallon per person per day (2 gallons per person per day preferable, to allow for cleaning and other needs), to last for at least

Opponents say that its possible to get 80% of the time savings at a fraction of the cost by implementing many of the features proposed for BRT but without permanently dedicating 2 lanes of traffic to buses that will run every 5 minutes.

Why does this matter now? Within the next two months, the City Council will take the first official steps to implement the system. People have an opportunity to weigh in on what they think is the right direction for Berkeley to follow.

Come to the Bus Rapid Transit Forum that's been organized by the Claremont Elmwood Neighborhood Assoc. This community forum is being supported by many of the other local neighborhood associations. There will be speakers on both sides of the issue presenting their case and representatives from AC Transit who can answer questions. We look forward to seeing you there.

5 to 14 days. By ordering at least 70 water barrels at a time, we can obtain a substantial discount of approximately 35%.
