

Merry Oaks Art Crawl





Living in Merry Oaks

Dogs, Cats and Chickens

Yes, that is a rooster you sometimes hear crowing in the neighborhood. Pet chickens are a great and environmentally sound way to keep a yard free of harmful insects, and eggs produced by free-range hens are much more nutritious than what you find at the supermarket. Geese are even effective to chase intruders away. But, they must be protected from the red-shouldered hawks who live in Merry Oaks.

By Charlotte City Code, you can keep chickens in Charlotte if you pay a \$40.00 annual permit. You can have no more than 20 birds and they must live at least 20 feet from structures. The chicken coop must have 4 square feet per bird. Two web sites on keeping urban chickens are:

You must have a permit to keep cattle, goats, chickens, turkeys or pigeons. The permit cost \$40 (renewed annually) and your premises must be inspected to make sure they are in compliance with code. You also must have a permit to keep three or more dogs or cats, in any combination, if they are frequently kept outside. Call 704-336-3002.

Fire Safety advice

Watch Your Food

- Do not leave the kitchen while you are cooking. This is the most important thing you can do to prevent cooking-related fires.
- If you must leave the kitchen, turn the stove off or take a spoon or oven mitt to remind yourself there is food on the stove.
- Never cook if you are sleepy, intoxicated, or heavily medicated.

Keep a Clean & Tidy Cooking Zone

- Turn all pot handles inward.
- Keep the stove-top clean and clear. Move combustible items such as oven mitts and utensils away from heat sources.
- Keep children away from appliances when cooking. Create a "kid-free zone" around the stove, and teach children not to play in that area. If you allow older children to cook, supervise them closely and teach them safe cooking practices.
- Carefully monitor hot oil, keeping the pan lid close. Cover the pan if the oil catches on fire.

In Case Of Fire...

- Keep an ABC dry chemical fire extinguisher near the kitchen.
- If a fire starts in your microwave oven, do not open the door. Unplug it immediately. Do not use the microwave again until a professional has checked it.
- If you have a fire in your oven leave the door closed to keep the fire contained.
- Always call the fire department for any fire, even if it has been completely extinguished.

Merry Oaks Real Estate Roundup

If you have even glanced at a newspaper in the last six months you probably think the prospects of selling your home are dismal, at best. The state of the real estate market across the country has been pretty depressing news. Luckily for Merry Oaks home owners your little piece of paradise have been holding their own. Homes continued to sell and values even went up a little bit, 3.2%. If you look at the neighborhoods appreciation over the last 5 years it averages out to be 13.27 % per year. That is a great average!

Actives, Pendings, and Solds - "OH MY!"

Taking a look at the current market, there are 5 homes active on the market. These run from small fixer uppers to a nice 3 bedroom, 2 baths with a new roof and HVAC system.

One home is pending after just 61 days on the market.

Seventeen homes sold in 2008 with an average of 66 Days on the Market. Charlotte's average days on market stat is 97 days.

What does all this mean, and what will it mean for 2009? I think it means that people still want to live in Merry Oaks. The fact that the neighborhood hasn't seen any huge blow out remodels or additions is probably good news for the neighborhood at this point. Midwood has suffered from the surge of flipper properties that hit the market at the end of 2007 and early 2008. Many of those homes were built too large and the price point has not been able to withstand the slow down. Most Merry Oak's homes are priced in a

range that first time buyers can afford. Most of the buyers that came into the neighborhood did not have another home to sell, so the days-on-market remains below average.

After consulting with my crystal ball, I see 2009 being similar to 2008, in sales. I think we will see slight appreciation... no double digits, but little moves up. I think the homes will continue to sell quicker than in other parts of the city. Due to the great location just minutes from up town, the proximity of restaurants and shops and amenities like the greenway.

My warning to sellers though is: don't get a "big" head because your neighborhood stats are strong. Buyers are being super picky, so make sure your home looks the best it can before you put it on the market. Consult with a realtor to make sure you have it priced competitively, not only for the neighborhood but also with the competing neighborhoods.

Briar Creek flood plain buy-outs

After the severe flooding last August, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Storm Water Services, Mecklenburg County Park and Recreation Department (MCPRD) and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) offered to purchase 40-50 properties in the Briar Creek floodplain between Central Avenue and the creek's headwaters north of The Plaza.

In Merry Oaks, three houses on Harbinger Court have been purchased and demolition bids are going out. The buy-outs were voluntary; no property owner was forced to sell. Upstream of Merry Oaks, eight acres of residential properties on the north side of Dunlavin in the Country Club neighborhood and the daycare at Eastway and Hilliard were also purchased.

Robert Billings, Flood Mitigation Project Manager, said that the properties will be mowed and maintained by the County, and will be available for eventual expansion of the Briar Creek Greenway. The Mecklenburg County Greenway Master Plan calls for the existing Merry Oaks section to be extended up- and down-stream along Briar Creek, intersecting with the Little Sugar Creek Greenway -- part of the proposed 500-mile, 15-County Carolina Thread Trail (www. carolinathreadtrail.org). That's a long ways off, but continued advocacy with MCPRD can help. Contact Patsy Houston, Administrative Supervisor for MCPRD 704 336 5476 patsy.houston@meck lenburgcontuync.gov to find out how to be heard on this issue by the Central Park District II or Greenway Advisory Council.

Briar Creek Sewer System

Improvement Project (Phase 2).

Charlotte Mecklenburg Utilities Department (CMUD) is upgrading the sewer lines along Briar Creek to provide greater capacity. Benefits are environmental (stopping leakage), economic (capacity for infill growth) and quality of service. Phase 1 is in progress downstream of Merry Oaks in the Myers Park neighborhood.

Initially, Phase Two did not include Briar Creek up to Country Club Drive (Merry Oaks Neighborhood) but this section was recently added, so it will be important for us to participate when CMUD calls meetings. The project timeline will be more specific once the contract is awarded, but the work could come to our neighborhood as early as 2010. We will request a CMUD staff presentation at a future MONA General Meeting.

The greenway will probably be disrupted, but it will be restored afterwards. From a citizen's viewpoint, extending the Briar Creek Greenway beyond its current length seems like a logical piggyback on the sewer work, but easement issues are more complicated than that. However if you are interested in extending the Greenway, it can't hurt to keep prodding CMUD and Park and Recreation Department (MCPRD) to work together toward that end. CMUD meetings about the sewer project would be a good place to start, in addition to contacting your City Council and County Commission representatives to advocate for CMUD and MCPRD collaboration on extending the Briar Creek Greenway. Their contact information is on the MONA web site.

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Advocacy and Updates

Ceramic tile and mural art projects on Central Avenue

Merry Oaks artist Greg Scott is one of three artists commissioned by the Arts and Science Council (ASC) for an upcoming public art mural project along Central Avenue on the perimeter of Merry Oaks. But before we see the murals, we will see a ceramic tile project which is currently in progress.

By early summer there will be some extra color on Central Avenue between the Briar Creek Bridge and Eastway Drive, in the form of mosaic designs on city trash receptacles. By late October, all twelve trash receptacles along that stretch will be covered with mosaic designs.

Ceramic artist Amy Sanders, lead artist for both projects, is an east Charlotte resident whose home and studio is in the Plaza Shamrock neighborhood. She will attend the MONA general meeting February 19 to brief us on the projects and to answer questions.

The purpose of the trash can project was to create

a beautiful landmark for the area that can also be functional. Amy worked with art students from Garinger High School to create one of the three ceramic tile designs, using blue, green, yellow, red and orange. She will make the ceramic tiles then apply them on all four sides of the cans, replacing the current pebble surfaces.

Amy is also the lead artist for the mural project. An ASC artist selection panel reviewed resumes, qualifications and past work of nine artists and chose three to create the murals. Besides Greg Scott, the other two mural artists are Duy Huynh and Sharon Dowell, who lives near Merry Oaks.

Amy and ASC staff member Jean Greer, ASC Vice-President of Public Art, are currently meeting with property owners in the vicinity of the Briar Creek bridge in search of three wall spaces for the murals.

Once the spaces are selected, there will be business and community meetings with the artists to give them direction on what the theme of the art

work will be. These meetings should occur during March. MONA will inform neighbors via the Google Group. If you do not have internet you can call one of the Board members and ask to be kept informed.

If you are wondering what vinyl mural art might look like, view the vinyl art on the three silos visible going south on South Boulevard, just past Remount Road on your right.

Rezoning for a Dentist office

A 60-year-old brick house at 3410 Central Avenue (across from Merry Oaks Road) has been rezoned from Multi-Family Residential to Neighborhood Service in order to allow a dentist, Dr Michael Berglass, to purchase it and open a family practice. It has been used as an office for a nonprofit agency (allowed under residential zoning), El Centro Hispano, for the last several years. Dr. Berglass, who plans to open for business by summer, will attend the February 19 MONA general meeting.

The rezoning was controversial because the Briar-Creek Woodland/Merry Oaks Small Area Plan, created 10 years ago to guide land use in our area, calls for that entire section to eventually be redeveloped as medium-density townhomes. The land use plan calls for retail and office to be clustered at Eastway and Eastcrest, some mixed use at Briar Creek, with residential lining the Central corridor. Neighbors who worked on the Small Area Plan in 1998, including Nancy Pierce from Merry Oaks and Deborah Gilbert from Commonwealth Park (formerly Briar-Creek/ Woodland) initially opposed the rezoning, as did other neighbors who were concerned that a dentist office would attract problematic foot traffic.

However, ultimately the majority decided to support the rezoning "with reservation". They felt that since residential development is unlikely for another 5-10 years, a dentist office will be a good place holder. Merry Oaks neighbor Liz Primm spoke for the MONA Board at the City Council hearing in favor of the rezoning. Despite opposition from the Zoning Committee and City Planning (who are honor-bound to support the land use plan), City Council voted unanimously in favor of the

rezoning.

Note that there are conditions on the rezoning: It can be used ONLY for a dentist office, the structure cannot be changed, the trees will remain and there will be attractive landscaping and signage. There are several additional single family properties on the same block and we may be asked to consider rezoning requests one by one as they come up for sale. The conditions on Dr Berglass' property set a high bar for use of the properties on that block.

Central @ Briar Creek Developments

The Vyne: The first residential building, the pool, and street side landscaping are in, and residents are moving in. The second residential building is scheduled to begin mid-2009.

Former Renfrow property across Central from The Vyne (Duo @Briar Creek): Development here is on hold due to the economic situation and the depress housing market. The property owner, Tuscan Development, is still working to resolve issues around connectivity into the neighborhood interior, which City policy requires for all new projects.

Birding in Merry Oaks

Merry Oaks is a great place to watch birds. The big trees here provide both a home and food source for many species. This time of year we can see several types of sparrows that winter in our region of the country. Dark-eyed junco, white-throated and song sparrow are the most prevalent, but you might see a fox sparrow or even a white-crowned.

Our many pine trees attract interesting species such as pine warbler, brown-headed and white-breasted nuthatch. The sweet gum trees attract American goldfinch, house finch and on rare occasions, pine siskin. Almost all of the eastern woodpeckers can be seen here including both northern flicker and yellow-bellied sapsucker in winter months. Perhaps my favorite visitor from the north is the cedar waxwing which can be seen feeding on anything with berries including, unfortunately, the invasive Chinese Privet.

Many birds of prey such as hawks and owls

frequent our neighborhood as well. At the moment we have a pair of great horned owls displaying breeding behavior and can be heard just before sunrise and just after sunset hooting to each other. With any luck they will nest close by and have a couple of "Merry" owlets.

Here are some hints for attracting more feathered friends to your backyard: Put bird seed into a tube or hopper-type feeder, spread it on a tray or just scatter it on the ground. In order to keep the squirrels from eating your seed, hang feeders at least 3 or 4 feet from anything they can climb. You can also put your feeders on a hook or post with a squirrel baffle at least 3 or 4 feet above the base. Hooks and baffles can be purchased at most hardware stores or you can fashion your own. Another good winter food source is a suet feeder. Suet is high protein dough made from lard or peanut butter and can be bought at any store

carrying bird seed, you can even make your own (see inset). When making your own bird feeder or house avoid using pressure treated lumber; it contains chemicals that can harm the birds. Instead, use naturally rot-resistant woods such as cedar, teak or even plastic lumber.

Don't forget to provide birds with a good clean source of water. Many small birds prefer puddles over ponds or streams. So, if you keep a clean, full bird bath in your yard you will be rewarded with seeing birds both drinking and bathing in it.

In addition, be sure and provide some sort of cover for the birds to "stage" in while waiting for their turn at the feeder. This can be thick shrubs or trees, or just a small brush pile on the ground nearby.

By the way, it is not true that keeping your feeders up too long will prevent birds from migrating; the drive to migrate is stronger than the temptation to stay at a feeder. In fact providing a high energy food source will help migratory birds fuel up for their long flight.

Winter is a very active time for birds, and we can help them when their natural food sources are low. So put up a bird feeder and a bird bath in your backyard and enjoy who shows up on cold winter mornings while you sip your cup of coffee or tea.

Make your own suet: Use one part lard, one part peanut butter, one part flour, two parts corn meal and two parts quick oats. Melt the lard and peanut butter together and then add the dry ingredients, stir until mixed thoroughly. Hang chunks in small, square, cage feeders or spread onto a natural piece of log with holes drilled in it.

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Wildlife

Merry Oaks has plenty of animal diversity, including opossums, raccoons, rabbits, a few mostly harmless snakes, and even occasional deer and turtles. We can all live peaceably together if you take a few precautions: Don't leave cat or dog food outside overnight since it is sure to attract scavengers. Secure your under-house vents, chimneys and access doors. After a few warm days in spring, when working in your garden, keep an eye out for snakes. The harmless ones perform a service by eliminating voles and mice and the very rare poisonous ones can usually be identified by the triangular shape of their head.

Our many birds keep the annoying insect population down. Avid birder Tom Sanders reports seeing 56 varieties of birds in the six months he has lived in Merry Oaks. In the spring, we may see great blue herons along Briar Creek and the tributary near the Hillcrest Apartments. Herons stand up to 4' tall and have grayish body, white head, with dark stripe above the eyes.
