Many Wrigley residents may already know Slater Barron as the "lint lady" because she creates art out of dryer lint. I have personally seen a lint portrait of the Queen of Denmark, Margrethe the II, in the Ripley's Believe It or

Not! Museum in Copenhagen. I could not tell that the medium was lint until very close observation. It was a treat to find out she was an artist from my own neighborhood in Wrigley.

I recently visited Ms. Barron in her Wrigley studio, as she was part of the Mid City Art

Walk this month. It was here that I learned that Ms. Barron is more than a lint artist, but also works in other mediums, some of which are of social commentary and some very humorous. I also learned that she is an author as well.

Slater Barron came to Long Beach when her parents

were sent to a sanitarium here due to Alzheimer's disease. Slater coped through the difficult experience of observing the decline of

her parents via her art and the writing of a book titled, "Remembering the Forgetting" which earned a glowing review in this July's Downtown Gazette.

Ms. Barron's resume boasts many exhibits spanning from 1975 to the present. Her work is part of prestigious collections all over the world. As you might have guessed, such a diverse artist has an interesting past. holds two bachelor degrees, one in sociology and psychology and another in art. earned her Master of Fine Art from CSULB. Besides being a professional artist, she has also been an instructor of art and design for 25 years at several California colleges and universities. It is also interesting to note that she served as a Line Officer in the Navy during the Korean Conflict. Marriage to a Marine officer led to four children and travel around the world.

Katherine Spitz Associates is working with the community and to design a plan to enhance the streetscape in Wrigley Village. During the first two community meetings on this project, the consulting team worked with the community to define design parameters. The community focused on which components will have the most impact on improving Pacific Avenue and expressed a strong interest in the "green" design scheme being the focus of the plan for the streetscape. Research into the current state of the art on green street practices and conceptual plans to implement them on Pacific Avenue are being prepared. Friends of the Los Angeles River (FOLAR) presented the 28th Annual Great River Clean Up on

Friday October 12. This clean up was held on a Friday in order to allow schools to participate. Students from Jordan High School International Baccalaureate program, Lakewood High, The New City School, and Environmental Charter all participated by picking up trash in the river. In speaking to the Jordan IB students, they were amazed at all the trash that accumulates in the river. Many shopping carts were hauled out and Styrofoam continues to be an environmental concern. The fish and marine birds eat the small pieces of Styrofoam and cigarette butts and feel satiated but then die of malnutrition. These students have now observed why it is important not to litter and to recycle whenever possible.



Science teacher Mr. Van der Vort accompanied the Jordan High IB students and was using the river environment to reinforce biology lessons. I spoke to Mr. Van der Vort and his students about the upcoming Wrigley Tree Planting event to take place on November 3rd. They were very excited about the prospects of volunteering to plant trees for us! Dr. Shere from the Poly High PACE program is also informing his students of the event. Students will be able to earn credit toward their required community service participation. Look for these volunteers on November 3rd and thank them for supporting our tree planting as they are becoming the future stewards of our precarious environment.

Big Plans

Notes from the LB Dept. of Building and Planning

1851 West PCH, Home Depot (Case 0708-09)

A new 132,725 square-foot Home Depot center is proposed on PCH, just west of Santa Fe west of the McDonald's restaurant and West Division police station and adjacent to the Industrial Technology Park. The project includes a garden center and 506 parking spaces. Existing buildings onsite would be demolished. Staff is reviewing the proposed design and providing comments on other project issues. An Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is being prepared for the project. Public comment on the Draft EIR will be requested once the document is complete, probably by Spring 2008.

3140 Long Beach Blvd Medical Office Building (Case 0707-10)

A 7,400 square-foot medical building (dialysis center) is proposed for this currently vacant lot. The project would require a site plan review, standards variance, and sign standards variance as proposed. An abandoned well is located onsite. Design comments from staff are being responded to before any hearings are set.

ANNUAL TOUR OF THE LAFAYETTE COMPLEX IN LONG BEACH

The Lafayette Historical Preservation Group is hosting its second annual tour of the historic Lafayette complex in downtown Long Beach from 12 noon - 5 p.m. on Sunday, November 4, 2007. The \$20 tour will include a viewing of Lafayette's fully restored grand lobby and tiled solarium, plus more than a dozen private units in the complex's three distinct buildings. Participants will also learn about the colorful history of the Lafayette, once part of the Hilton Hotel chain and the focal point of Long Beach high life circa 1929 - 1959, with four-star restaurants, basement bars, a penthouse ballroom, and even a wedding chapel.

The Art Deco Society of Los Angeles is assisting the La-Where fayette Historical Pres-The Lafayette, ervation 140 Linden Avenue, Group with East Village Arts District the theme logisand tics of the tour, which is designed to provide a genuine "Walk Through Time" experience. Tour participants will feel they've stepped into a bygone era as they walk past vintage automobiles parked in front of the complex, and find themselves in the Lafayette Hotel lobby of the 1920s, complete with live jazz era music, a doorman and hotel clerk, and stylish guests in vintage attire mingling and checking in at the front desk.

The Lafayette Complex is composed of the Campbell, Lafayette and Broadway buildings. Campbell Apartments were built in 1928 as luxurious homes for the city's elite, providing hotel

and maid services, and garage and lobby attendants. The Campbell's Spanish Baroque style is typical of the pre-Art Deco architecture of the 1920s, with When beautiful glazed cast terra-cotta ornamentation and Mediterranean Renaissance Revival balconies. The Lafayette Hotel (1929), signed by renowned Art Deco architects Arthur and Cecil Schilling, adjoins the Campbell Apartments. The building facade features large Italian stylized male and female figures, winged ram's head and hanging garlands. The Broad-

On Sunday, October 14, 2007, at approximately 9:30 p.m., West Division officers responded to a shots fired call at 2200 Block Earl Avenue. Officers arrived found a male victim shot in the leg. Preliminary investigation reveal the incident is gang related.

On Tuesday, October 9, 2007 at approximately 8:30 p.m., West Division officers responded to a shots fired call at 1800 Chestnut Avenue. The two victims were walking in the alley when the shots rang out. Neither was struck by the gunfire. The incident seemed to be gang related.

On Saturday, October 6, 2007, the West Division Substation celebrated its 10^{th} Year Anniversary. A large number of city dignitaries, VIPs and over 200 community members of all ages attended this momentous event.

On Friday, October 5, 2007, West Division officers were dispatched to 2500 Block of Maine Avenue for a residential burglary call. The suspect had entered the residence through an opened window. Suspects managed to get away with jewelry and silverware. The investigation is ongoing.

On Sunday, September 30, 2007, West Division officers arrested a grand theft/ robbery suspect from 1600 Block of Chestnut Avenue. The suspect confessed to both crimes. After the consent form was signed, officers search the residence and found stolen items.

On Saturday, September 29, 2007, West Patrol officers were dispatched to 1600 Block of Chestnut Avenue for a burglary to a business. The suspect entered the store and removed the loss. Officers' thorough investigations led to the location, identification and arrest of the suspect. The loss was also recovered.

On Saturday, September 29, 2007, at approximately 10:40 p.m., West Division officers were dispatched to shots fired call at the Pacific Coast Highway and Locust Avenue. Officers found a male victim suffering from two grazing wounds. This incident seemed to be gang related.


