Using lessons learned from other water trails across America, we will create a state-wide network of paddling trails, from freshwater streams and ponds to estuaries and the open ocean. Paddling "trails" are defined by clear information for paddlers, convenient access sites and portages, and conservation of the land and water on which we travel.
