The President's Inbox

Some of you may have read in a recent issue of The Signal that the Christmas Tree Lane (CTL) displays stored at a city facility were taken by WANA. The paper published this quote from WANA President Jill Hill: "As instructed by our City Manager Pat West, WANA recently took possession of the Christmas Tree Lane displays by relocating them from port property until after Christmas, ending the battling question of who the rightful owner is."

A few days later, Pat West sent Ms. Hill a letter saying that the city had not taken a position on the ownership of the displays. Clearly, WANA acted without authorization.

Let's cut to the chase: The Wrigley Association is, and always has been, the legal owner of the CTL displays. And, as a public benefit nonprofit corporation, we have a legal responsibility to protect them.

Why do we say we own these displays? A few highlights:

- In 2007, Joan Greenwood (Wrigley Association President at the time) prepared a chronology of the event for the state that noted the displays as assets of the Wrigley Association.
- The money for the displays was raised by the Wrigley Association from 1988 to May, 2007. Most funds were paid from a Wrigley Association account.
- Wrigley Association members built and maintained the displays, handled the bank account and expenses, performed fundraising and helped set displays up and break them down each December.
- The Wrigley Association arranged for display storage, occasionally paying rent.

Despite what you may have been told, the Wrigley Association never abandoned Christmas Tree Lane, nor was that its intention. What it did was act responsibly to ensure the finan-**Continued on Page 5** cial integrity of our organization and CTL by ordering





Calling Foul

On Wednesday September 10, 2008, many Wrigley residents reported a foul scent in the air to the Air Quality Management District. To me, the air smelled like tar, as if someone was getting their roof repaired. The odor had a distinct petroleum taint. It occurred to me that there may have been an incident at one of the refineries to the west of Wrigley.


Within an hour of dialing 1-800-CUT-SMOG and filing a complaint, I received a follow-up call from the AQMD. An hour after that, two air quality inspectors were knocking at my door. They were sent out to talk to complaintants as they received numerous calls about the foul odor from both sides of the 710 freeway. Enough residents had phoned to complain about the odor that nuisance charges were filed. It is reassuring to know that

when residents pull together and become vigilant, the AQMD listens in earnest. If more Wrigley residents picked up the phone and dialed 1-800-CUT-SMOG when the air quality suffers, we may really be able to impact the environment we live in.

On the very same day, a U.S. District Court Judge decided in favor of the Port of Long Beach's Clean Trucks Program. This means that on Oct. 1, the Port of Long Beach will begin to ban the oldest and most-polluting diesel trucks from entering the Port

Members of Wrigley is Going Green recently attended a workshop on planting a drought tolerant garden, also known as California friendly landscaping and xeriscape gardening. This lecture was sponsored by the Long Beach Water Department, located at 1800 E. Wardlow Road. You also study the demonstration garden there to see the variety of drought tolerant and California native plants that are appropriate for Long Beach residential gardens. You can signup for free monthly residential landscape classes offered to Long Beach Water Depart-

ment customers by calling 562-570-2303. Or, you can learn through the internet by logging on to LBwater.org and click on the Landscape Home Page to get the latest on water conservation and planting water wise gardens. Many informative links are provided at this site including an on line gardening class.

Many residents in Wrigley are already transforming their gardens to be California friendly/drought tolerant. Take a stroll down some local streets to see some beautiful examples: 2500 Oregon and 2745, 2926, and 2950 Eucalyptus. My own drought tolerant transformation is nearing completion.

Several of my immediate neighbors have expressed the desire to convert their gardens to xeriscapes. It would be economical and fun for neighbors to get together to plan new gardens and then buy plants together. Many drought tolerant plants are easy to propagate making the sharing and trading of clippings viable. If you have any

California friendly starter plants or clippings to share or trade, please email Wrigleyisgoinggreen @hotmail.com, and we will help coordinate your efforts.

Wrigley is Going Green is working on many goals and is meeting with different City entities to bring our projects closer to fruition. Stay tuned to find out where our green projects will pop up. that CTL funds be held in a legally separate organization. It was no secret that the association wanted to set CTL up as a separate 501(c)(3) nonprofit and had been working to do so for more than a year. The Wrigley Association always intended to work closely with the new or-

ganization. This was very specific in the motions approved by the board and the membership.

The back story about board members' attempts to correct CTL's financial and accounting inconsistencies and the uncooperative behavior of Maria Norvell, CTL's committee chairperson, is lengthy and complicated. Rather than catalog the history here, I will simply say that separating CTL into a separate organization was necessary to protect the integrity of the Wrigley Association. It was also necessary to minimize the liability of CTL and the Wrigley Association. We had little choice after Partners of Parks refused to handle the funds any more and said that it would only give the money to a 501(c)(3) nonprofit; the Wrigley Association is a 501(c)(4).

I'm telling you this to set the record straight on *The Signal* article. I know some of you care deeply about this matter; some don't. In either case, these displays represent significant corporate assets and we must protect them.

The Animals of Wrigley

I have lived in Long Beach for more than 20 years and have never witnessed so many animals running around, unaltered, not cared for, and sadly not wanted. In the last 11 months alone, I have personally "rescued" 10 dogs from having to survive the mean streets of Long Beach. I have also found homes for stray kittens and spayed/neutered many other adult cats that wander our neighborhood.

About one month ago, I noticed a female cat and her kittens hanging around a vacant back house. I approached the owner with a solution to trap the mom and her kittens and to re-release mom (after she is spayed) and possibly get the kittens new homes. I was shocked that my neighbor, who asked, "Where do all these cats come from?" had no idea that in 7 years a stray cat or dog can produce 100s of descendents! Depressingly, in 1 year in the United States alone more than four million animals are put to death. In the Long Beach Shelter alone, the euthanasia rate is up to 47% at this moment.

Last year a new LA County Law (Municipal code 6.16.080) went into affect making it against the law to breed your animal, by accident or not. It is also the law that cats over the age of 4 months must be altered. Fines for illegal breeding can be up to \$1000. Despite this new law, our community has a huge problem with the overflow of dogs and cats on the streets.

We, as a community, all need to start paying more attention to this tragedy. I have met other neighbors that also have rescued animals off the street but frankly, there are not enough of us. I am hoping by writing this I can rally some of my fellow Wrigley-ites to work together.



Some ways to help:

- Sponsor your neighbor's cat if they get her altered.
- Offer to transport your neighbor's pets to be spayed, vaccinated and micro chipped.
- Call Animal Control at 562-570-7387 if you see any neglect or abuse.
- Educate our neighbors—(email them a copy of this newsletter)
- Friends of Long Beach animals (www.folba.org) can help with the cost to spay or neuter your pet. You may go to their website to find all the facts about spaying and neutering your animal.
- Donate to the Friends of Long Beach Animals to help control the pet population.
- Another inexpensive resource is Goldenstate Humane Society located at 555 E Artesia Blvd Long Beach, CA 90805 (562) 423-8406. They offer low cost spay/neuter, vaccinations as well as micro chipping your dog or cat. Micro chipping involves placing a small chip in your pet's back so that you can be identified and contacted when you are separated from your beloved animal.
- Foreclosed homes are often problematic, if you know of a foreclosed home on your street, please take a look around the house to be sure there isn't a dog or cat (or any pet) left behind, too often there are. If you cant take in the animal then call animal control officers at 562 570 7387. This option is a last resort but it's a better resolution than letting a dog or cat get hit by a car, fend for themselves and die lonely and unwanted in an alley.
