MOTION

The City of Los Angeles, like other City, county and state governments throughout the nation that provide essential public services, is facing some of the worst financial challenges in fifty years. These challenges will certainly result in reductions of essential services.

It is incumbent upon the City of Los Angeles to continue its efforts to identify costsharing programs through public-private partnerships that will help mitigate reductions in services and, in some cases, actually improve service delivery.

In July 2005, the City implemented a "50/50 Sidewalk Repair Program" to help increase the number of sidewalk repairs performed by City crews. Under this program, property owners are required to pay fifty percent of the costs associated with sidewalk repairs and the City is required to pay the remaining fifty percent. This program is a true public-private partnership that empowers property owners to expedite repairs while sharing the cost with the City. This program could and should be used as a model for other City services that may be understaffed and under-budgeted.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Street Services be directed to report to the Public Works Committee on the feasibility of implementing a pilot program in Council District Eleven to create public-private partnerships with Neighborhood Councils, homeowner groups, and other community based organizations that are willing to leverage their funds with City funds to address such issues as tree trimming, median island landscape maintenance, public building landscape maintenance, and other services deemed critical by the community and the Council District.

I FURTHER MOVE that all City Departments assist the Bureau of Street Services in identifying additional essential services that could be applicable to a cost-sharing program under a public-private partnership.
