



Dianne Bryant (Chair) opened the meeting at 7: 05 PM with a moment of silence.

2. Chair's Report

- Dept of Planning study on S. Moreland Ave Public Meeting 3/20/08 at 630 Mt. Nebo Church
- There are now extended hours at the Helene Mills Senior Multipurpose Facility. The facility is conducting a contest for NPUs. Whichever NPU has the most members signed up for classes wins.

4. Public Services

Zone 3 Police Department – Lt. Lyle

- 3 part 1 crimes. Most are down at Kroger.
- o Major Finley has an initiative regarding burglary. He has assigned expert people to a car dedicated to burglaries. These two people are Marshall Hall and Ryan. So far, they have apprehended 3 burglars. The car also has a tag reader. It is a camera that reads plates. Then, it searches the database for reported stolen cars.
- o Also, there is another initiative on the homeless campsites. Lt. Lyle states that they are working on it. They are "running everyone" at the campsite. Some, they are arresting for outstanding warrants. Some, they are entering in to the system. Police are also bringing Gateway out to the site to assist.

Nan Orrock State Senator:

- o Foreclosure issue: They are introducing a package of bills that focus on foreclosure prevention and give relief to those in foreclosure. Predatory lending bill was gutted.
- o There are now more foreclosures than any other time in the nation's history. Ms. Orrock is proposing a moratorium on foreclosures and address the appraisal situation.
- These bills also address loans that are bought up in packages and the government cannot find the owner.
- They will also provide protection for renters if owner is in foreclosure. It will require mandatory notice to the renter. The current bill that is going through right now does not have any enforcement.
- o Is Governor going to pass it? Ms. Orrock states that it is going to be a difficult time to get these bills passed.
- Code Enforcement introduced a bill to force landlords to register their houses with the city. The bill has not passed. Ms. Orrock favors the registration.
- She recommends that the 1st thing to do is contact Legal Aid if you are involved with a foreclosure.
- Suggestion to Ms. Orrock: Work with AHA. AHA has reduced rent subsidies drastically. Landlords are now in a tough spot.



Zone 3 Police Department – Major Finley

Reported 3 robberies, 3 assaults, 5 larcenies/others and 5 vehicle larcenies, 16 shoplifters and 9 auto thefts. Thirty arrests around Connell Ave, Metropolitan Pkwy, and Cleveland Ave. Area struggling with quality of life issues. There are many incidents in the Kroger area.

• Zone 4 Police Department – Major Perdue

Burglaries are up. Arrested three thieves last week. Twelve new officers are going to be dispatched for foot beat in the future. They are putting a detail car in the high incident areas. Zone 4 starts at 75/85 to 166 West to Cascade. Vice is running details up and down Metropolitan. Speeding is a problem on Brewer Boulevard.

• MARTA – not present

Atlanta Fire Department – Station 20

632 alarms and 25 major fires so far this year. Last shift 3 fires. One on Hartford resulted in 2 deaths. A ninety year old lady survived the fire. The cause of the fire has not been established. Firefighters canvassed the Hartford area passing out smoke detectors and batteries to residents who needed them. Councilmember Joyce Sheperd mentioned ASAP program where fire fighters go from home to home to inspect smoke detectors and give alarms and batteries to those who do not have them. She suggested canvassing the Hartford area. There are rumors that station 30 may be closed and Ms. Tommie voiced her concerns that her area may be the target of budget cuts. Combo CO₂ smoke detectors are available. Firefighters were asked how many fires this year are arson. This information can be obtained at the arson department at 404 -853-7000.

• Code Enforcement – Inspectors Smith and Turner

Officer Smith updated the community on the following cases: 2195 Springdale Road (citation was sent); 791 Peg Road (due in court on April 23); 799 Peg Road (owner will be served by the sheriff, not answering the door); 511

Peg Road (junk cars); 2378 Springdale Circle (owner can't be located); 2907 Metropolitan (most of the junk has been removed); 569 Milan Avenue (owner has a license for motor vehicles/part). 1892 Metropolitan, the creek area next to Kentucky Fried Chicken (owner was sent a fifteen day notice for them to clean up the area).

Ms. Tommie voiced a concerned about a dumpster in the street. Complaint from community about 18-wheel trucks near Murphy and Division (they have not been moved); dumpster at 609 Dill is a mess - How long is it allowed to stay there? A citation can be sent if it is excessive junk and debris.

If there are many problems in one area code enforcement can do community sweep and issue citations. A citizen complaint was made about 2263 Metropolitan (They don't have any permits and they are functioning as a junk yard). Officer Turner 678-616-6804 and the office 404-330-6190

Department of Watershed Management - Caryn Anderson not present

Flyers with information on building your own rain barrels were distributed

• Department of Public Works – Travis Dennard (404-624-0799)

Deals with trash collection and illegal dumping. Customer service – 404-330-6333. We are making some cases in court using the cameras. No Littering signs come out of the public works department. Is aware that dumping on Estes continues to be a major problem. Hammond Park area by the dental office (near Third and Seventh Avenue) there is major dumping. Many instances of dumping in NPU-X were discussed and the neighborhood would like to know how to combat this problem other than constantly reporting. The issue of West Nile in Southwest Atlanta is a major problem due to the dumping. The fines are not severe enough.

Illegal dumping-it is difficult to locate the people dumping. Cameras are a sticky situation with the traffic cameras being challenged in court. She acknowledged that dumping and trash is a major problem. Community must organize in order to combat the problem. A new commissioner is being hired for the Public Works Department Joe Pacista

They will be a repast at Perkerson Recreation Center on Saturday at 6:00 p.m. for the two individuals who died as result of fire on Hartford. Memorial Service is at 4 p.m. Owner of house, Ms. Hall is still in the hospital at Grady.

Councilmember Sheperd hasn't heard about Fire Station 30 closing. It was renovated last year. Tire Roundup will be on April 26th. There will be a cook out and a clean up at the park. There will be dumpsters for the tires from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Mortgage fraud workshop will be this Saturday at Atlanta Metropolitan College.

Qualify of Life money is used for speed bumps. The school buses may be the reason that there are no speed bumps on Brewer.

The community is looking to finish the Cleveland Avenue Corridor study. Planning Department is currently analyzing the data.

The protest against the Cell Phone Tower at the corner of Dill and Metropolitan is continuing and they are looking to appeal to Superior Court, distribute petitions and/or picket.

Zone 3 Community Prosecutors Office – Susannah Wright

Surveys were passed out so that people could note and report major concerns. She would like to prioritize issues according to citizens' concerns. The Court Watch program is targeting repeat offenders who are about 20% of the offenses. The Zone 4 community prosecutor is LaDawn Blackett-Jones at Ladawn.blackett-jones@fultoncounty.ga.gov. Steps being taken to deal with people selling stolen copper was discussed.

Santa Fe Villas Re-Development (Paul Bolster) – Santa Fe Villas is a complex for people with special needs. It is a former motel that was converted to permanent housing and has 147 formerly homeless people with section 8 vouchers as residents. Current market rate rent is \$475. The facility is supported with HUD money. Residents have access to a mental health team from Grady. Plans are to tear down the building and re-build with additional units. Current residents will be relocated to another HUD site during construction. They are applying for state of Georgia tax credits to help finance the redevelopment. There will be 24 units and will include a community center. With the addition they will be able to accommodate couples but still won't take children. A motion was put forth to grant the letter of support. In favor 11 oppose 0 and abstained 0.

Atlanta Investing (Perry Chandler) Remodels and sells houses to first time buyers, teachers, fire fighters. One of their projects is 1457 Brewer Boulevard. Their builder is Earth Craft certified.

Atlanta Victim Assistance Program (Patricia Hudson) deals with domestic violence and mediation. They are located at 150 Garnet Street 404-588-4770. Grant received from ACoRA to work with communities on public safety initiatives

KIPP Ways Academy (Ed Chang) KIPP stands for Knowledge is Power Program. There are two KIPP academies in Atlanta. When starting at KIPP students typically score in the bottom third on standardized tests. When they leave they have moved to the top third. Councilmember Joyce Shepard has given a letter of support for the KIPP academy. Ed Chang's contact information is 404-449-5383. 



- After reporting a leak 3 times resident flagged down a water department truck. They were told to call customer service number and it took 4 days to resolve the problem





3. Chair's Report (Dianne Bryant)

- § House in the Park festival at Perkerson Park was a great success. Ramon Guyton (sponsor) is planning to hold the festival at the park again next year.
- § The Last Summer Jam festival that was scheduled for September 10 − 12 at Metro Fitness has been cancelled.
- § Superintendant Beverly Hall mentioned each of the schools in NPU-X except Capital View during her 2008 State of the Schools address. You can view or read the address at the Atlanta Public Schools website.

4. Treasurer's Report – (Sig Ehrmann)

§ Balance was \$900.51. \$27.00 was collected at the meeting and \$250 was disbursed as a donation to the Sullivan Center. Current balance is \$677.51.

5. Public Services

§ Zone 3 Police Department (Lt. Lyle)

• Beats which were formerly 404 and 405 will now be 311 and 312. Boundaries won't change. Kroger still having problems (couple of automobile break-ins and shoplifting). NPU-X portion of Zone 3 had 43 burglaries in 2007 and 33 during same period in 2008. Officers assigned to Burglary Unit have received special training and are becoming experts in working with repeat offenders. On October 1 Zone 3 will have new recruits on foot patrol for 8 weeks. Have found that stores are selling illegal drive-out tags. Captured a suspect who matches the description of the perpetrators in several incidents. Auto theft car with tag reader is active all the time. Repeat offenders being handled by Chalet – officers are notified when they are released.

§ Zone 4 Police Department (Lt. Klotzer & Jettmore)

• Beats 404 and 405 (Sylvan Hills, Capital View, Capital View Manor) are moving back to Zone 3. Officers and equipment will also be moved. There will be no break in service. This area had 180 arrests in 2007 compared to 228 arrests during same period in 2008 and 202 aggravated assaults versus 267. In most aggravated assaults the victim and perpetrator know each other. An officer was hurt during a fight with a perpetrator.

§ MARTA (Lt. Sharon Williams – Evening Commander)

Automobile crimes are the biggest issue for all MARTA stations. GPS are popular items for thieves. The officer stationed at the Murphy entrance of Oakland City Station was moved but is now back. MARTA Police meet in a manner similar to APD (MPACT – MARTA Police proactively attacking crime trends)

§ Atlanta Fire Department (Battalion Commanders Ken Byers and Val Singleton)

• \$13 million budget reduction – in three rounds of cuts, many positions abolished, demoted and transferred. Written report will be distributed via e-mail. Relief days are ahead for firefighters. Concerns about brownouts (not enough to man engines). Fire Department just became accredited again. Car seats and smoke detectors are still available.




