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The Community Council meets the first Thursday of most months, at the Peterson-Dumesnil House, 301 S. Peterson Avenue.

Membership costs \$15 a year and includes the newsletter, a discount card for Crescent Hill businesses and a vast array of volunteer opportunities. The CHCC is a nonprofit organization. In addition to this newsletter, it produces the Crescent Hill Old Fashioned 4th of July Celebration.

Discussion two newsletters ago of how the Crescent Hill Newsletter gets put together caused a Crescent Hillian to suggest a look at how the Crescent Hill Community Council works.

That's easy. By fits and starts and occasional pratfalls. But usually with good intentions, and often enough with good effect.

The council is really a membership group that usually has around 500 members. Anybody who lives in Crescent Hill, or owns property or a business here, can become a member by paying \$15. The council has a committee that more or less beats the bushes for new members, and it has been quite successful under recent leaders Pat Brinson and Jerry Fielden.

As a practical matter, the rank-and-file members meet only once a year, usually in September, to elect a slate of officers. The elected officers are president, one and sometimes two vice presidents, a secretary and a treasurerlot of other offunelected icers, t make up a board of directors. The neighborhood currently is divided into nine districts, and each of those gets two representatives on the board. There can be up to 10 "at large" representatives, who represent the neighborhood in general. At the moment there are 17 council committees — those people who go looking for members, for example, and others who wrangle volunteers, put out the newsletter, attend to projects to beautify Crescent Hill, and similar chores. The head of each or those committees is a member of the board. The council's immediate past-president also is a board member.

So let's see, that comes to 51 or so officers. They have board meetings monthly, usually on the first Thursday of the month, usually at the Peterson-Dumesnil House. There often are vacancies on the board, and we never quite get 51 officers for a meeting.

But we do invite ALL council members, be they board members or not, to board meetings. In fact, anybody who wants to come is invited, and a lot of interesting people do show up. A meeting can swell quite a bit if a controversy pops up somewhere in the neighborhood – say the water company announces it will build a chlorine plant, or the Baptist seminary starts buying up a lot of houses adjacent to its campus.

The Kennedy Park Renovation Project continues to move ahead with fundraising and fine-tuning of improvements detailed in its master plan. Initial development efforts have yielded over \$18,000 for phase one of the park, which includes new benches and additional trash receptacles.

Usually, though, it's a case of more chiefs than there are Indians at a meeting. For one thing, anybody who comes very often usually gets sucked into being an officer of some type before long, and there go your Indians.

Only the chiefs get to vote at the monthly board meetings. Occasionally though, an issue calls for a special meeting, and any member who has paid dues has a vote then. One of those was held in January on expansion of the art fair.

The council has its best effect bringing neighborhood issues before government officials. Ninth District Councilwoman Tina Ward-Pugh attends or sends a representative to most meetings, and a metro police officer gives a report on crimes, answers questions and listens to problems every month. The mayor attends the council's annual meetings.

The council has representatives from all of the institutions in the neighborhood, and is quick to get the ear of those institutions when their neighbors have concerns – such as the chlorine plant and the seminary's real estate ventures.

The council puts on the Crescent Hill Oldfashioned 4th of July Celebration and Art Fair each year, and uses that to raise money for council activities — which include donations to Field Elementary and Barrett Middle schools, to the United Crescent Hill Ministries, and to worthy projects such as the Kennedy Park renovation.

It is grass roots democracy. Join in. First Thursday of each month, 7:30 p.m. Peterson-Dumesnil House, 301 S. Peterson. You'll feel better about yourself.

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
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

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

Robert Fischer's Dark Star Tavern, at 2636 Frankfort Avenue, right next to the Wine Rack, has restaurant ancestry. Years ago it was Gippers, and it also has been The Jockey Club.

So when Robert began looking for ways to improve the business's fortunes a year or so ago, he thought of dusting off the old kitchen space in the back and starting to offer real food again – several burgers, chicken sandwiches, Reubens, French dip, some Mexican offerings, and the like.

The kitchen stays open until 2 or 2:30 a.m. It offers a person caught out late on the avenue after the restaurants have closed a little nourishment, he said. And he said the effort seems to be turning around an image that had seemed headed in a gloomy direction.

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Robert took over the place in 1999, and took it in a tavern direction. He named it Dark Star for the Grateful Dead song, which Robert Greenfield also tapped for the title of his "Oral History" of "Dead" frontman Jerry Garcia. Robert found out later that Dark Star also was the name of the 25 to 1 shot that beat the fabled Native Dancer in the 1953 Kentucky Derby – not a bad coincidence for a bar in Louisville.

Robert, who owns the bar with his mother, Nancy Fisch, ran it until 2004, and then sold out to new owners who operated there until 2008. The place took on a decided bar tinge under that ownership, Robert said, and it didn't work out well.

In 2008, he said, the landlord asked him to come back. The new direction is the result. There are still some pool tables in there and some video games, and Robert says it's a suitable spot for families with children in the late afternoons and early evenings. Hours are 5 p.m. to 4 a.m., 6 to 2 on Sundays.

He has brought in a Bluegrass band every Thursday night, and he sometimes gets a band in on a Friday or Saturday night. Music, he said, is something he'll start working on in earnest this year.




