35,000 riders of TARC in 1995 62,000 riders of TARC in 2007

Gas has increased from \$1.02 a gallon in 1994 to \$4.25 a gallon in 2008 causing a 4 million dollar shortfall

Plan of Action:

Increase fare from \$1.25 to \$1.50

Eliminate the Nite Owl runs.

Reduce service on 11 routes

Put training center on hold

Eliminate 8 administrative positions

Tarc 3 will remain unaffected THIS TIME

No guarantee for the future

Many businesses have fare subsidy which may help employees with the increase in the fare

11 new busses

3 new hybrids

Adding express service along 1-65 in Indiana New Radio/ AUL system next year

Affects Kids the most because everything goes into the mouth.

If it is in solid form, no chipping or peeling it's not as horrible, however, when it starts to deteriorate and the paint chips then it' becomes a real problem

Kids can get poisoned by dust – make sure you do clean-ups wet, it traps dust and collect chips

Metro Housing provides training

If they help out then you need to keep home for 3 years but they will put house on their lead safe list.
