Musician and songwriter Chilton Searcy Price died in January after living in the Upper Highlands.

Last October, the Kentucky Arts Council awarded the Governor's Award in the Arts to Price for her lifetime achievement as a songwriter.

She played violin in the Louisville Orchestra in the 1930s and 40s and penned some hit songs in the 50s. While working at WAVE TV as music librarian, she met Pee Wee

King, who hosted a television show.

King and fiddler Redd Stewart helped Chilton with publishing and exposure in the music busi-

ness and credit for writing some of her songs was shared with them.

Pee Wee King had perhaps his biggest hit with Chilton's "Slow Poke." She also wrote "Never Look Back," which was sung by Doris Day in the film, "Love Me or Leave Me."

Chilton did most of her songwriting while living at 2815 Whiteway Ave. and penned her most famous song, "You Belong to Me," while living there.

The song became a number one hit for Jo Stafford in 1952, and a number of other musicians have recorded the song, including Dean Martin, The Duprees, Bob Dylan and Tori Amos.

The shirts are white and have the UHNA logo in purple. They are made of 100 percent pre-shrunk cotton.







# Sound barrier update

The timeline for beginning construction work on a sound barrier along the north side of the Watterson Expressway adjoining the Upper Highlands has changed.

Design work was delayed due to unforeseen problems.

December is now the target for completing the design process and a construction contract is expected to be awarded next spring.






