Though the Peterson-Dumesnil House has been nicely restored by a succession of boards of directors since it was purchased by the Crescent Hill Community Council in 1982, it is a very old house. It's creaky in spots. Its winding stairway, high ceilings and ornate woodwork speak of a time long past. It is, in short, a perfect place for ghosts.

The late Jane Ramsey, who worked at the Crescent Hill Branch Library, told an intriguing story about a ghost she said she saw there when she was a child. Various spirits have been reported by other visitors to the house over the years. So it was with some interest that a handful of members from the current board and this reporter met investigators from Ghost Hunters Louisville at the house on an October night.

detectors, and their own senses to a number of old buildings around Louisville, including the Conrad-Caldwell House and Locust Grove. They asked if they might check out the PD House, and board president Joyce Cossavella agreed.

Elisha Myrick, who the hunters say is their most sensitive investigator, got vibes from the Brides Room (upstairs, front left) when she walked in the front door. "I'm sensing a little girl in here," she said in the room. "I keep hearing laughter."

Later, Dee Combs, an aunt of Case Manager & Investigator Melyssa Fox, said she picked up on a sad woman in the same room, near the south window. She had a feeling, she said, that there was something special to the woman about the window. It was a place, she said, where the woman "would escape for peace and tranquility, when things were going wrong with her."

Still later, the women heard boxes being dragged around in the basement of house, and got a feeling they should leave. Dee said she smelled kerosene in the basement. "Something happened there," she said. "Somebody got hurt. I felt a female presence there shooing us away to protect us."

As it happens, according to Sam Thomas in *Crescent Hill Revisited*, there was a fire on the site, in a building that pre-dated the P-D House, sometime after 1842 and before Joseph Peterson bought the property in 1859. Thomas's book says the older house was partially destroyed and its remains may have been incorporated when Peterson built his house in 1869. So the basement could have been involved in the fire. Ooh.

The board members and reporter spent a good part of the time from dark to after midnight sitting quietly in the darkened living room, seeing camera flashes and hearing equipment buzzing, various rumblings that were later explained, and cryptic conversations on walkie-talkies, while the investigators moved through the house.

At night's end, the investigators reported picking up voices, aromas, lighting anomalies and feelings that suggested to them that there is a lot going on in the old mansion besides weddings and council meetings. Elisha said, in fact, that the house yielded more of the kind of information they look for than any other they have investigated.

Besides the woman in the basement and the one at the window upstairs, the investigators said they picked up on, among other things, a man "behind a tree watching a woman and smoking a cigar." They heard voices – such as a woman saying, "I'm sorry. I'm lost," and a man saying, "I want to tell you about lust."

They picked up on names: Murray or Murphy, Mark, Mary, Elizabeth, and Abigail. Dee said she got an impression that somebody whose spirit inhabits the house is pleased with the way it is being used now, though she noted that what's in the house now isn't her furniture. She apparently didn't say anything about the décor.

The data gathered will go into the Ghost Hunters Louisville database where it will be combined with that gathered from other buildings, and from other investigators, perhaps one day to shed enough light on the supernatural that skeptics will be persuaded.

So this is to get out ahead on the takeover of that space by It's All Greek to Me, which once was a takeout place in the old Wine Rack spot next door.

"Our customers have requested more space for the dining area, and this expansion allows us to accommodate that demand with little renovation, and without leaving Frankfort Avenue," said Maria Bell, Owner and Chef of It's All Greek To Me. "Next, we will focus on obtaining a beer and wine license, which is another big desire our customers have expressed."

Maria's eatery is situated at 2716 Frankfort Ave., where she opened in July, 2009. The menu features authentic Greek dishes made fresh daily including stuffed grape leaves, spinach cheese pie, hummus, gyros, salads, and baklava.

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A Popular Crescent Hill Classic Is Coming Back

Sam Thomas is pleased to announce the pending publication of *Crescent Hill: Its History and Resurgence* in 2011. The hardbound book will be a larger, revised, updated, and completely redesigned edition of *Crescent Hill Revisited*, first published in 1987 and long out of print.

The basis of the narrative remains the oral histories of those who grew up in Crescent Hill and were young when the neighborhood was just emerging. Almost all their voices are now silent, but their stories live on. The book also contains their photographs as well as many new ones, maps and plats and newspaper accounts that document how Crescent Hill came into being.

Once just a mule car and railroad suburb of Louisville, in recent years Crescent Hill has become a significant neighborhood tied to the upswing in the fortunes of Frankfort Avenue. This is a street by street study in new urbanism as it was occurring.



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

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Clifton Center Appoints New Executive Director

John Harris, the new Executive Director of the Clifton Center, has a 20 year background in arts and nonprofit management. Most recently, he served as the Executive Director of Cityfolk, a Dayton, Ohio based organization that presents roots, jazz and world music and organizes the Cityfolk

Festival, which is the largest festival of the traditional arts in the region. Harris moved to Louisville last April when his wife, Natalie, was hired as the Executive director of the Coalition for the Homeless.

John is only the second person to hold the position of Executive Director of the Clifton Center, following the recent retirement of Cindy Adelberg, who had led the organization since its founding in 1995.

"We carefully reviewed over 90 candidates for this position," says Mark Carroll, Chairman of the Clifton Center's Board of Directors. "John has great credentials, and when we heard his vision for the Clifton Center, it made him the obvious choice. We are confident that under John's leadership, the Center will become one of the region's premier presenters of music and fine arts."

A native of Lexington, Kentucky, Harris studied at the North Carolina School of the Arts, the New England Conservatory of Music, and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music before beginning his career as a performer with ensembles including La Orquesta Sinfonica del Estado de Mexico and several American orchestras. As an administrator, he has served on the staffs of the Cincinnati Art Museum, the Oregon Symphony, the Oregon Food Bank and Appalshop, in Eastern Kentucky.

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

The Colored Department was established in 1884 and housed in its own building about a quarter mile from KSB. The school remained divided into white and "colored" departments until the 1950s. Considered a progressive social reform at the time, the Colored Department nonetheless promoted racism among those least equipped to understand it. In the seventy-five years of its existence, the school sheltered dedicated teachers, both black and white, and students who went on to successful lives and careers. 


