August: Jeff Higel, owner of Orchids Etc. of Sarasota, will discuss general orchid culture with the hopes of teaching new growing methods. Jeff is the past president of the Venice Area Orchid Society and has been a commercial grower for 10 years. His specialty is "not specializing" and he grows miscellaneous orchids, including cattleyas, vandas and dendrobiums in naturally ventilated greenhouses. In his youth he worked for two commercial orchid growers, Earl Small Orchids in St. Petersburg and Bob Wilson's Fantastic Gardens in Miami. Ken is a former AOS Trustee and chairman of the AOS **Historical Committee and currently serves on** the AOS Judging Committee. He specializes in growing and line-breeding species cattleyas.

Mac Holmes was there to greet us and showed us into a brightly lit room glistening with orchids. There, he gave us his expert growing tips and answered questions ranging from watering and repotting to hybridizing. We then ventured off to the 18 greenhouses he had described, including the personal-stock house they opened just for us. The Draculas were incredible and the Psychopsis were humongous. The Paphs and Phrags were big, round and unique. The beauty was nearly overwhelming, but not so much that we couldn't add to our collections the Lycaste, Anguloa, Angrecum. Vandanopsis, Masdevallia, Cymbidium, Oncidium, Bulbophyllum, Pescatorea, Laelia, and Cattleya plus ferns, unique Oxalis, Begonias, Silaginella, Cotton Candy ferns, Strawberry Begonias and Anthurium.

Around lunchtime, when we finally pulled ourselves away from the orchids,

we were given another lesson by Raye Holmes, who, with a lovely spread, taught us the difference between North and South Carolina barbeque and that Klondike bars come in four flavors, including my favorite, Cherry!

Checkout time came and we had a little unplanned competition about who "earned" the highest discount. When I thought the three boxes that Gary and I had gathered had to come in first, Mac informed us that we weren't even in the running, but perhaps came in at fourth or fifth. The good news was that we still had a 25 percent discount, quite a buy for a \$15 Paph for only \$11.25!

Our bus soon became a greenhouse with the extra seats and floor space taking on the appearance of Carter and Holmes nursery – just beautiful.


