### What exactly is Willow Park again?

The Willow Park
Neighborhood is located in northwestern
St. Louis Park. It occupies 192.9 acres and
includes 973 housing
units (301 single family
homes, 326 condominiums, 38 townhomes

and 308 apartments.) The population as of the 2002 census was 1,908.

Jr. High is lo-

cated in our neighborhood. Public parks include Rotary North Side Park, Carroll Hurd Park, Cedar Knoll Park and Willow Park. Fire Station 2 and a portion of the Westwood Shopping Center that includes Almsted's Super Valu are within its boundaries. Parks and open space comprise 13.1%. Commercial and industrial make up 1.8%.

Park's larger neighborhoods, Willow Park, formerly North Side, had never been organized.

Organization allows our neighborhood to apply for grant funds that are available through a trust with the city.

### Primary Election to be held September 15 for Open Ward 4 City Council Seat



Mark your calendar to vote in this year's primary election on Tuesday, Sept. 15. Three candidates are vying for an open St. Louis Park City Council Seat representing Ward 4. Incumbent C. Paul Carver is not seeking reelection. Candidates are (in alphabetical order):

- Thomas Peterson— an Elliot View Neighborhood resident
- Julia Ross-a Willow Park resident
- Bill Theobald—a Willow Park resident

Ward 4 is the only ward with a primary election for City Council this year.

The primary election will determine which two candidates will compete in November's general election. Ward 4 encompasses the entire northwest quadrant of St. Louis Park and all of the Willow Park Neighborhood.

That afternoon I introduced myself to a grandma planning a garden with her daughter and granddaughter. I also met a young woman who decided to take up gardening while making plans for her summer wedding. We all were excited to discuss our ideas and exchange seeds.

This is how a small community of gardeners was born. As the days passed, I met other gar-

deners putting up chicken wire fencing and transplanting tomato plants.

Our first challenge was of the small, cute, fuzzy variety.

New litters of rabbits arrived at our garden gates hungry and ready for an all-you-can-eat buffet. Those who had installed plastic fencing around their beds quickly learned that plastic is no match for a hungry bunny. Lettuce and green beans were quickly mowed down.

Our next hurdle arrived in the form of a long draught. Promised water spigots were delayed. The city provided water in garbage containers but these quickly emptied as gardeners filled their watering cans.

Finally, rains came and crops grew. Now, our only challenge was to guard our patches from curious and often well-meaning neighbor kids with an overwhelming urge to pick green heirloom tomatoes. That and finding homes for all the excess hot peppers and zucchini.

Now, you may ask, would I do it all again? Well, my optimistic side has me reading garden books and quietly making plans for next spring.
