wide yard sales on July 23.


Having all the sales the same weekend draws a much larger crowd, thus meaning more sales.



Highlands Community Ministries is sponsoring a seven day, six night vacation to Savannah, Ga., Oct. 9 - 15.



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### **Pets Getting More Active**

It's that time of year when everybody, including our beloved pets, enjoys getting out and being active. With many pets possibly meeting other pets, perhaps for the first time, pet owners can help their pets and neighbors, by being responsible, courteous citizens.

Use a Leash - Louisville Metro has a leash law, for dogs and cats. Dogs must be under control at all times, including in their own yard. Tethering or chaining a dog to a fixed point is not permitted from 8 am to 6 pm. It is allowed for 1 hour from 6 pm to 8 am.

Cats are allowed to be outside as long as they remain on the owner's property; cats are not allowed to roam freely without the permission of the property owners where the cat visits.

And remember cats are a potential threat to our songbird population.

**Pick-up After Your Pet** – No one likes to step in pet waste. Pet owners should always have a means to pick up after their pet when walking their animal, and they should use it.

License/Rabies Tags – All pets should have two tags, a rabies vaccination tag and a Louisville Metro License (this applies to all cats, dogs and fer-

**Lost Animals** – If you lose your pet, it is important to visit Metro Animal Services (MAS) in person. If you call to identify your pet, it is very difficult for staff to be certain that your pet is not there.

You can also visit www.PetHarbor. com to see the animals in the shelter; however this is not as important as a visit to the shelter.

Spay/Neuter – For the health and well-being of your pet and the general pet population, spaying/neutering is the responsible thing to do.

**Report a Concern** – If you are concerned about the treatment of a domestic animal, call 363-6609.

**Volunteer** – If you would like to help with our community's orphaned animals, the new Animal House Adoption Center is the place to be. Call 574-5556 to sign-up.



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### 'Knock Out' Roses


'Knock Out' roses have become a popular choice for urban gardens.

Their popularity, due to low maintenance, continuous blooms, and disease and pest resistance, has caused many gardeners to plant these roses.

For success, follow these tips:

**Soil -** Shrub roses can tolerate dry conditions, although they prefer well-drained, moist soils with a pH range of 6.0 - 6.8. Your Jefferson County Extension Service offers \$7 soil testing which analyzes soil pH and soil nutrients. Based on your soil results, soil pH may need to be adjusted by adding powdered sulfur or lime.

**Light** - 'Knock Out' roses need at least six hours of sunlight. Lack of sunlight will reduce blooming.



**Planting** - The best time to plant roses is after the danger of frost and before the shrub has leafed out, normally in early spring. Once placed in the hole, backfill with native soil and water thoroughly at the root zone to avoid foliage wetness.

**Pruning** - To maintain a particular size and shape, pruning may be necessary, though not required to re-bloom.

Pruning promotes growth, maintains balance and form in the landscape, improves air circulation and light filtration, and promotes plant health. Hand pruners are the best tool for pruning shrub roses.

Prune dead and diseased branches and then reduce size by cutting as much as 18 inches above the soil line.

**Fertilization** - Apply fertilizer after spring pruning and danger of frost has passed. Continue fertilization monthly and discontinue during hot, drought conditions and the dormant season.

Fertilizers such as 5-10-5 or 4-10-4 are common for roses, while all-

purpose 10-10-10 works well. Avoid using fertilizer high in Nitrogen.

For soil testing *or other questions:* Jefferson County Cooperative Extension Service, 569-2344.

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### Don't fall for "Fly-by-Nighters"

This time of the year, "Fly-by-Night" contractors come out of the woodwork. They knock on your door offering you a "deal of a lifetime" whether it's a new roof or paving.

A spring storm brings them out like earthworms on a sidewalk.


By hiring an unknown contractor you don't know what you're getting. And you don't know if others have been satisfied with their work.

Materials and workmanship are often circumspect. They might tell you they have asphalt leftover from a job down the street or leftover fence materials at bargain prices.

The Better Business Bureau advises:

- Don't be rushed in making a decision to hire a contractor. Check their record with the BBB;
- Don't *just* ask for references, call them as well;
- Check if the contractor has all required licenses and insurance;
- Ask for a written contract and read it to ensure everything that was discussed is included.


