Would you give your vehicle to a criminal?

I would hope you would answer no to the above question. According to the Indiana State Police, 7,693 vehicles were stolen in Indiana in 2010. 2,145 of those vehicles were stolen in Marion County. Unfortunately, Marion County leads the state in the number of vehicles stolen.

As soon as the weather turns cold, we see an increase in the number of vehicles that are stolen while they are running. Some people must have a warm car to drive off in. In the morning, people exit their residence and start their vehicle and return inside to allow it to warm up. People have a false sense of security because they are at home and their vehicle is in the driveway or in front of their house. Someone who is cold and possibly in need of a ride will seize the opportunity to drive off in your vehicle.

I'm sure it is a sickening feeling to watch your car speeding down the street, having just been stolen. Some cars are recovered quickly while others are not. The person that took your car does not take care of it like you would. Many stolen vehicles are wrecked, vandalized or have parts stolen from them.

The prevention of this type of crime is common sense. Your car should not be running if you are not in it. If you have to have a warm car, invest is a second set of keys so your car can remain locked while warming up. A second set of keys is cheaper than the damage done by a car thief. Also, never leave your keys in the car. Thieves will hang around gas stations and convenience stores waiting for people to fill up and go inside. You would be surprised as to how many people leave their keys in their vehicle at these locations. By having the keys in your car, that is just an open invitation to become a victim.

With most types of thefts, these are crimes of opportunity. By not leaving your car running, you eliminate the opportunity. If your car should be stolen, please call 911 immediately. Give the dispatcher a description of your vehicle and a direction of travel if known. A description is broadcast to all the officers working that area.
