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



As you can see, the natural items take a shorter time to decompose and the man-made items take much longer.



A survey by GMAC Insurance found that approximately 36.9 million current U.S. drivers—close to 5 percent—would fail a driving test if they had to take one today. 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

As is the custom at all military bases, we stood to attention when "The National Anthem" began before the main feature.continued on page 27



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












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All was going well until three-quarters of the way through "The National Anthem" and the music stopped.

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

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
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
