
New this year: a wonderful display of Crescent Hill History. This is a chance to see what we used to look like. You can reminisce or make new history but the

Calling all Field School alumni, their parents and descendants, and other interested parties:

Your school will be 100 years old in a few short years. Deborah Rivera, the new principal, wants to start gearing up to celelbrate now. She's looking for old photographs and mementos associated with the school, t-shirts, report cards, stories and memories. Anything you have that bears on school days at Field, going all the way back, will be treasured, gently handled, and returned to the owner at the end of the celebratory display.

"All the way back" actually goes beyond 1915 if you're talking about school days on the grounds where Field now stands, on Sacred Heart Lane. Back in 1858 – and this is the gospel according to Sam Thomas – eleven Crescent Hill neighbors, including Thomas Kennedy and Godfrey Stilz, to name two whose names remain on the neighborhood landscape, built the Spring Station School for girls there. It operated for about 10 years.

In 1915, the school system – and, again, we're quoting Sam and Deborah Thomas's new book, *Crescent Hill: Its History and* 

Resurgence – spent \$89,781 on a school with eight classrooms, for 320 pupils, in grades one through six. It also had an auditorium, two combined gymnasiums and play rooms, an office, library and rest rooms and a room for a visiting nurse and physician. For at least part of the time since then, pupils who lived on Crescent Avenue and east went to Field School, and those who

lived west went to Clark School between S. Peterson and Galt streets. After the sixth grade they all went to Clark.

Anne Driskill, who lives on Eastover Avenue, said the hallway at Field appeared to be extraordinarily long when she started there as a kindergartener in 1934. She can name her Kindergarten and first grade teachers – Mrs. Logsdon, a widow, and Miss Snow. She doesn't remember her third grade teacher's name, but she remembers she had to quit before the year was over because she got married. Married women were not allowed to teach in those days.

Anne remembers that pupils read the bible after the pledge of allegiance back then, and they had "stupid things you had to cut out and paste under pictures." At lunch, pupils could get peanut butter on buns for two cents, and Anne thought they were great. On May Day "they had a May Pole and we danced or did something," she said. In summer there was a little garden on the school grounds, and neighborhood children planted things.

Marie Goodwin, who moved onto Eastover across the lane from Field about the time the school was built, and still lives there, went to Sacred Heart instead of Field. But she remembers that the school faced Frankfort Avenue when it was first built, and there was a big circular drive on the north side of the school, with a front door that gave visitors a straight shot into the gymnasium. "The drive was very nice for skating," she said.


There was a playground on the west side of the school, and the space where the playground is now was a "big open field" that she and her friends used to pretend was a wilderness. "They even had cows over there," she said.

Barb Sinai, who lives on Gardiner Avenue at the end of Eastover Court, said the current exterior of the building was added in 1969 and 1970, and about doubled the size of the school. The old building was entirely enclosed. If you stand over near the playing field on the grounds of Sacred heart and look at the chimney, you can see a piece of the old exterior above the roof of the new.

That all is to prime you to get into the attic and those old trunks and dig out stuff from Field school days. The celebration is still a three years off, but there's no time to get started like the present. Call Deborah Rivera at 485-8252 to offer use of your treasures.

# Green Triangle—Your Impact

Since last May when we announced the 9th District Green Triangle Vision, we've been very excited about the opportunities that exist for everyone to be a part of making our neighborhood more green. Listening to your opinions and working with your neighbors, we created the vision statement below.

**Imagine Individuals, Businesses and** Government working together to create a 9th District of:

- Green spaces for people to connect with nature and each other;
  - Green options for transportation;
- Green thinking that promotes the conservation of resources and our small neighborhood feel.

One of the keys to making this vision a reality is measuring our impact. This fall we launched a powerful tool that will help us do that. The Green Triangle website (www.mygreentriangle.com) will be a hub for green activity in the District. One of the most important features of the site will be the ability to track and measure our progress. The site will allow residents to identify sustainability goals that are important to them, and then provide an opportunity for people to report on their progress towards their goals.



Are you interested in reducing the amount of energy you use in your house? Set a goal around it, and then show off how much you've done! We'll then take that information and put it together with all your neighbors' to get an overall picture of all the greening of our community. All of us working on our own, and together, will create a huge difference for our

neighborhood.

In addition to tracking all our impact, my office is trying to bring green thinking to everything we do. A great example of this is the recent expansion of our recycling program. We know that people in the 9th District are some of the most active recyclers in the city, so why not make it easier for them to do it. Building on the success

of the Frankfort Avenue Business Recycling project, we are now offering 95-gallon recycling carts to all businesses AND residents in the 9th District Urban Services District. For a nominal fee, anyone in the district may access a 95gallon recycling cart. 





# Street closures for the 2011 Santa Sprint and Stroll are as follows:






