Why Use Them?

 Combining All The Pieces Of The Puzzle, The Suspicious Activities, Aids Law Enforcement In Reducing and/or Removing Crime Risks

 Ensures Law Enforcement Are Not Overwhelmed With Calls Which Are Not An Emergency In Nature

Emergencies Call 911 Immediately

How To Use Them?

- Computer Form: Fill In The Information By Left Clicking To The Right Of Each Heading.
- Be Sure To Save A Copy of Your Report.

When To Use Them?

 Because ZCSW Members Are Trained In What Suspicious Activities Are, You Understand Exactly When You View An Activity which is NOT Normal.

 Suspicious Activities which seem NOT Normal are Reported ASAP.

Where To Use Them?

• Normally members will report Suspicious Activities which are viewed in the Area in which they live and/or do business.


 Can Report Suspicious Activities Viewed In Other Areas By Altering The Location Viewed In On The Observation Report To Coincide With The Observation.

What To Report

- When Filling Out An Observation Report,
 Be <u>Very Specific</u>.
- Take Pictures when possible.
- Use a Small Recorder to help you remember **Exact Details** when possible.
- Take Videos When Possible.
- Use All Technologies you have

- Removes Security Code
- Emails Reports To Ward Coordinator

Ward Coordinator

- Views Area Captain's Reports
- Saves Reports In Area Folder
- Combines Reports
- Emails Reports To Law Enforcement, The Safety Director, and The Mayor

Add Details

Post Observation Activities

- Write down your observation ASAP
- What is a Suspicious Activity?
 - Something Unusual
 - Something very different
 - Something which may be illegal
 - Others?

Personal Information

- Security Code
 - Your personal identity
 - Known by your Ward Coordinator and Area Captain only.

- Location: Where You Live, The Park, or Where you viewed it.
- Suspicious Activity
 - What you believe you may have seen
 - Name it!

Additional Information

- Date: of suspicious activity
- Time: of suspicious activity
- Viewed By: other than ZCSW member
 - Friend
 - Family
 - Visitor
 - non-member neighbor

Observation

- How did you see it?
 - Examples: while walking, driving, window watching
 - Exactly what did you see?

• Example: While my wife and I were taking an evening walk, we saw a man checking autos to see if they were locked. He seen us walking towards him, and got in a truck and quickly left the area.

Physical Setting

 He was spotted in front of 75 Lucy St. home.

His vehicle was parked at 95 Lucy St.

People

- There was only one man involved
- He was white
- He was older (50 to 60)
- He was wearing blue-jeans and a red sweat-shirt.

People cont.

• He was acting like he lost something.

• He was in a hurry

Specific Items - Routines

- He was driving an older model red Ford pickup with a white cap on the back.
- His license plate number was Just Me.
- He was looking in the driver's side windshield too. It looked as if he was writing down Vin numbers.
- We have reported him twice before, but on a different streets in our neighborhood.
- He visits our area in the evening just before dark.

- Ratings: Items listed
 - -1 to 3 = Poor
 - -4 to 7 = Good

 - 12 and above = Excellent

Suspicious Activities - Burglary

- A stranger entering a neighbor's house while the neighbor is away.
- A stranger crossing your or your neighbor's yard looking at back entrances.
- Anyone trying to open a neighbor's door.
- A moving truck or van pulling into your neighbor's driveway while your neighbor is away.
 - Burglaries often happen at times when appearances seem normal.

Stolen Property

- Someone carrying certain types of property like a TV, Stereo, etc.
 - -Especially when they are not wrapped as if purchased.

Burglary or Vandalism

- The sound of breaking glass
- A loud crashing noise of a door being broken open.

Vehicle or Theft from a Vehicle

- Anyone peering into vehicles as they walk down the street.
- Someone removing license plates, gasoline, or accessories from a vehicle.
- Someone attempting to enter a vehicle using a coat hanger or other device
- Never assume it's their vehicle if you don't know them.
- Be suspicious of anyone you don't know is tampering with the hood or trunk of a vehicle.

Vehicle Theft

- An improperly parked car or an abandoned vehicle.
- Someone leaving one vehicle and driving away in another.
- These could be signs of a vehicle theft.

Possible Abduction

- Anyone forced into a vehicle
- Someone screaming for help.
- Persons loitering around schools, parks, secluded areas, or in your neighborhood.
- Child molesters.
- Sex Offenders

Drug Sales

- Apparent business transactions conducted from vehicles.
 - Around schools or parks if juveniles are involved.
- A constant flow of strangers to and from a particular residence on a regular basis.
- They deliver
 - Late or unusual times
 - If you see a neighbor who does not work and comes and goes many times during the day and/or night.
 - Driving a fancy vehicle with dark windows
 - They meet at parks and/or secluded areas
 - They meet in large parking lots where they can blend in.

Fencing Operation

• Offers of merchandise at unusually low prices.

Robbery or Assault

- Loud screams
- Gun shots
- Sex offenses
- Additional?

Solicitations

- Strangers <u>selling or offering</u> merchandise without proper permits
- Rule of thumb
 - If it seems to good to be true, it usually is.
