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

When the Crescent Hill Garden Club's Judy Gogan asked Joe Winkie to make a xylophone for the Peterson-Dumesnil House's side garden (see the article on page ??, this issue) he didn't even know how to spell it. Crescent Hill's master craftsman/artiste – responsible both for the PD House's storm windows and the Fourth of July's hand-fired fireworks – went to the internet looking for information starting with a "z."

But that's Joe's modus operandi. He starts with what he knows, or thinks he knows, and then finds out what he needs to know. Using the internet and friends, he found out what a xylophone is, where it came from, the best sort to have for an outdoor community location such as Judy had in mind, what materials he needed, and ultimately, how to build one.

He settled on an amadinda xylophone – which Joe can now tell you means "big keys wood sound" – and learned that it needed to be tuned in the key of C on a pentatonic scale. That's the technical stuff. On the more practical side, it needed to be made from wood that could take a beating – since it was to be played by all comers – and would weather well, since it was to be outside.

Besides being the PD House caretaker, Joe works for Tow Zone Trailer and Equipment Sales in Jeffersonville, where, among other things, they put really tough floors on truck and trailer beds. They use a hard wood called Apitong, from Malaysia, and there usually are scraps of it lying around the work shop. Joe got some of that, and some short lengths of pvc pipe for resonators from Habitat ReStore, and some chunks of 4x4 and 2x6, and a couple of aluminum bars and some nylon rope, cotter pins and turnbuckles, and he was in business. The whole thing cost the Garden Club \$550 with Joe donating the labor.

Joe called Mark Tate of the Louisville Orchestra to find out what exact notes he needed for his key and scale, and he emailed a friend of a friend in California to find out how to tune his chunks continued next page

of Apitong. He had to cut them to a certain length, and then remove a little wood in a concave shape from the underside – a little more for deep tones, a little less for the treble. He found and learned to use a computer program into which he could feed a note through a studio quality microphone, by tapping a piece of wood, and then shave it a bit on his radial arm saw and tap again, until he had "precisely" the right note. He said all of that tapping may have driven his wife, Alice, a little nuts, but she didn't say so.



Once he had the notes, he had to adjust resonators that hang below the keys to amplify the sound. They're made from the pvc pipe, and work on a principal similar to blowing across the mouth of a jug. He cut the pipe to an approximate length as suggested by his friend in California, and

then tuned it by moving a water-filled 2-liter bottle with the top cut off up and down on the pipe and tapping until the sound was just right, to the ear, and verified by the length of its wave as shown on the computer. He sealed the bottoms of the tubes with chunks of an old mudflap off a Peterbilt.

Joe can't play the xylophone, so he had to wait for its dedication to hear it played – by musician Chris Roode. He said he knew he had all the notes right and everything, but still he was mildly astonished to hear something he made sound that good. He thinks it took him about 40 hours to make it, including time to learn computer programs, but it would take less now to make another one, in case anybody wants to commission more.

He built the instrument last summer, and until he put it into storage for the winter recently, people played it all of the time. "It's kind of a babysitter," he said. "Kids play it while their parents are inside." He said one couple with a child would come almost every night, and he and Alice, eating dinner on the balcony of the caretaker's house, could hear the notes of the instrument resounding off Barrett Middle School next door, a very pleasant sound.

"It combined all of the things I like," he said "woodworking, design, computer skills and music."

Plus, it adds to his already impressive resume: xylophone maker.

recycling carts for businesses and households are available through the 9th District Expanded Recycling program, which has been received by our community with great excitement. Businesses can receive 95-gallon recycling carts for a one-time fee of \$55 per cart. Residents have two options to choose from, each costing a one-time fee of \$55. Residents


> may opt to keep their current garbage capacity and receive a new 95-gallon recycling cart, OR they can receive an orange lid for their current 95-gallon garbage cart to convert it to a recycling cart and a new 68-gallon garbage cart. Recycling will be picked up once a week for both businesses and residents.

One of the two main goals that the Green Triangle is working towards is

creating a universal access system for recycling and repurposing in the 9th District, to reduce the overall waste output of the District. Expanded Recycling is the first major project related to this goal, and more will be created in the coming months. The Green Triangle's website will be updated in the coming months to include interactive components to help District residents quantify the steps they are taking to create a sustainable future.

Green Triangle is a community guided initiative to look at everything through a green lens in the District. Part of realizing this sustainable vision is the Expanded Recycling program for households and businesses, which began in April 2011, after a successful pilot program for businesses on Frankfort Avenue.

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


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MINI of Louisville Clifton Center LIVE at the Clifton Center



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Crescent Hill Garden Club Donates Xylophone by Mary Johnson

Visitors to the Peterson-Dumesnil House this fall may have come upon a large play-ityourself musical instrument in the Sitting Garden. It's an amadinda xylophone, donated by the Crescent Hill Garden Club and designed and constructed by P-D House's Joe Winkie.

Inspiration for the xylophone came from the Garden Club's Judy Gogan, who says that the P-D House "has always meant 'music' to me," since the band camps held there when she was a student. Gogan said she had seen television programs about outdoor "community" xylophones, and was intrigued, so the Garden Club commissioned Winkie to develop a similar instrument. The amadinda xylophone was the result. "Joe is a true craftsman," says Gogan, "and would be happy to create similar instruments for other Crescent Hill and Clifton community institutions."

This kind of xylophone originated in Uganda. While the Baganda tribe from Uganda has an established method of playing the amadinda -with 3 players, set notes, and a syncopated rhythm -- the 17 keys, tuned to a five-note scale (F,G,A,C,D), means that all the notes are "sympathetic" with one another, allowing any number of people or anyone to play; there are no "sour" notes. It's an ideal instrument for children or people who have "no musical ability."

On Sept. 28, one could hear the familiar strains of "Amazing Grace" echoing in the twilight at the xylophone's unveiling reception. Local musician Chris Roode's brief concert also included Asian melodies and a number of his original compositions. Since then, the xylophone has been played a lot. During public events at the P-D house, people find their way to the Sitting Garden and start making music. In fact, almost every day, or evening, someone can be found creating a tune on the instrument.

The xylophone is now in storage until spring.




