# **Westwood Going Green in 2012**

Every year volunteers help keep our parks and streams cleaner and healthier. With looming city and county budget cuts, the need now is even greater. This year WNA is joining these efforts. Des Moines Parks and Recreation has identified three potential projects where WNA efforts could directly tie into already planned projects in our neighborhood.

### Earth Day Trash Bash 2012 - Friday, April 20

Each year volunteers and especially corporate volunteers gather throughout the City to help beautify parks, trails, and other public spaces. This year the focus will be on cleaning up our waterways, protecting and improving water quality and watersheds, including those in and next to our neighborhood. This year's Earth Day Trash Bash is a cooperative effort between the City of Des Moines, Water Works, Polk County, DNR, Metro Waste Authority and Waste Management and could be the biggest ever.

Spring Creek Clean-ups
Near our neighborhood are several

creeks in desperate need of being cleaned up. Parks and Rec is looking for volunteers to start at one end and walk the creek to clean out small and large trash. The timing of this work is necessarily determined by weather to make sure everyone is safe either walking or canoeing the creeks.

#### **Invasive Species Removal**

Help clear invasive plants such as garlic mustard, honeysuckle, and buckthorn from our woodlands. The non-native plants are out competing our native wildflowers, grasses and trees. They need to be removed to restore the integrity of the beautiful oak savanna landscape in our parks and improve water quality. Volunteers will use their hands or hand tools to remove the plants.

# In Our Neighborhood-Merrill Middle School

Merrill Middle School is an International Baccalaureate World School, which offers the Middle Years Program (MYP). The Middle Years Program does not dictate curriculum. Instead, it serves as a framework for the curriculum and emphasizes holistic learning, international awareness, and communication.

Whereas traditional education simply treats curriculum as a body of knowledge, the MYP focuses on meeting the needs of the whole student. Ideally, the knowledge becomes part of the student's person. As such, the Middle Years Program teaches concepts and critical thinking skills. It develops attitudes to guide actions shaped by the knowledge learned. According to Allison Chartier, Merrill's IB Coordinator, students in the Middle Years Program are presented with units of inquiry that allow them to explore topics at length. She said, "In an MYP setting, students engage in authentic learning activities with real-world applications. A unit of inquiry, then, brings together many components. It does not offer students a simple list of facts to memorize; instead, students critically examine a central theme through the lens of one of the areas of interaction, and teachers use authentic assessment methods to measure learning."

Along those lines, the MYP emphasizes intercultural awareness to develop an international mindedness. The learning approach creates a world view to consider issues from multiple perspectives.

Fundamental to the International Baccalaureate framework and philosophy is the belief that student service within the school and/or local community "encourages responsible citizenship" and "deepens a student's knowledge and understanding of the world around them."

Moreover, MYP stresses comprehensive communication skills, skillful listening, verbal and non-verbal communication, and articulate expressions of thought. Excellent communication skill empowers the student to reflect upon what they learned and better express their learning in their life.

In sixth-grade science classes, Mr. Hammond, Mrs. Ryerson, and Mrs. Hleihel posed this question: How much good can you do with one dollar?

To allow the students to answer this question, each sixth-grade student was given one dollar with the charge to pay it forward in some way. Students were encouraged to find creative ways to increase their dollar in order to "do some good" in the community.

On December 20<sup>th</sup> the students presented their projects to their classes. There was an overwhelming response to the project, and the students raised **\$8, 356**, donated **2,600** items, and devoted **71** hours to various organizations. In all, approximately 50 organizations benefitted from the students' projects.

Along with their individual service projects, the sixth-grade class worked together on a project for Aging Resources of Iowa. In their Language A and Humanities classes, students created holiday cards, which will accompany the dinners delivered by Meals on Wheels during the holiday season. In addition, students spent time in their math classes making blankets to donate to the Animal Rescue League, and in Mrs. Williams' Humanities class, students created banners for the Merrill hallways. The banners were made on transparent contact paper to create "lights" in the hallway.

# **Doodlebugs in Westwood**

The word **Doodlebug** does not refer to an insect or a mixture of a French Poodle and some other breed of dog. In this case a Doodlebug refers to a railroad car that once carried passengers and mail on the railroad tracks that today serve as the southern boundary of our Westwood Neighborhood Association.

Today the railroad traffic on these tracks is very infrequent being almost none at all. But many years ago in the 40's, 50's and early 60's it was a different story. Then the tracks belonged to the Milwaukee Railroad and there was considerable train traffic running up and down these tracks. Then it



was considered a "branch line" connecting Des Moines with the "main line" in Madrid, Iowa. At "Clive Junction" (presently 86<sup>th</sup> and University) there was a switch in the tracks that would allow the train to go either to Madrid or all the way to Arnolds Park (Okoboji). Can you imagine your self and all of your vacation gear riding in a Doodlebug through all of the small towns and farm fields in Iowa on your way to Okoboji? The thought of getting there and being able to jump into Lake Okoboji to cool off would make that hot summer trip with no air conditioning seem all worth while. Or you could catch the Hiawatha high-speed passenger train at Madrid and go all the way to Chicago or Omaha. As a 10-year-old boy, I would watch the passing Doodlebugs and imagine that some day I too could be riding to some far away place.

Now, just exactly what is a Doodlebug you say? Technically they were officially known as a gas-electric motor coach. They were about 75 feet long and painted bright orange and trimmed in maroon. Some times they would have a second car coupled to the coach and sometimes it would be just the Doodlebug itself. Some said they were quite ugly, but I thought they were beautiful with their rumbling motor, ringing bell, and distinctive whistle sound they made at every road crossing including the road crossing at the end of 52<sup>nd</sup> street by the bike trail.

Trains run on schedules and the Doodlebugs were no exception. I remember hearing the whistle every day at 1:00, 4:00, 7:00, and 10:00 as the Doodlebugs rumbled by our house on Welker. In addition to Doodlebugs there was also freight traffic on these tracks. Box cars, tank cars, gondola cars, and the distinctive orange Milwaukee cabooses all were being pulled by either diesel engines or steam engines. As a boy, I was thrilled to witness this train traffic on a daily basis. Come to think of it, I guess I never got over my fascination with trains.

The next time you are about to cross these tracks on your way to the bike trail remember, stop, look, and listen. Listen very carefully and you just might hear that long forgotten sound of a Doodlebug rumbling down these railroad tracks on its way to a far away destination.

### **Cornerstone Credit Union**

A neighbor brought to my attention that we have a Cornerstone Credit Union in our neighborhood; we can join it by having a 50312 zip code. It is located off of Grand Avenue beside McDonalds. I took my sons Jackson, 12, and Roman, 9, there with their piggy banks. They received a deposit just for joining. The Credit Union also matches A's earned at school, \$1 for \$1 match with parents. The staff was very friendly. Both boys received a passbook saving account that they take in each time to keep track of their deposits and withdrawals.

I wanted to share this, because I had been saying for several years, that I needed to open bank accounts for them, but not just that. I wanted them to learn about having a relationship at a financial institution, to get in the habit of going there and depositing gift money, money they earn for good grades or for working. I also wanted them to have to make withdrawals by going into the credit union, looking at their balance, subtracting, looking at the new balance. What I and the boys have found is that they think a lot harder about withdrawing that money. I will say, "Sure, you can get that, we just need to go to the Credit Union and withdraw it from your savings account." More often than not, they decide on their own, they don't want the item that badly!

I had not taken them to open account because our bank is not convenient. By being able to buzz down Grand and avoid traffic, it has caused us to go in more often. I want to thank that neighbor for making me aware of Cornerstone Credit Union, and to share the news with you!
