

The easy part of the hike is about the end.




We started hiking uphill on a dirt road.



We turned away from the dirt road on to a trail.






The trees and the bamboo shaded the trail.

Margarita, our American friend, hiked with us.




There were small farms along the trail.

Mr. Tanawat also saved rainwater.








Some students took notes during the hike.



We got ready to hike along the road.




Sometimes we stepped aside for motorcycles.

After walking along the road, we went on a steep trail.


Some people needed help going up.

There were wild flowers growing along the trail.




It was good to see beautiful flowers on the hike.

We hiked through an old corn field.






Do you know what these came from?

It is rich in vitamin C.




We passed some newly planted fields.

The yellow plant growing on the tree is called "Dodder." It is a parasite.






We saw this coconut tree.
