### CycLOUvia Coming October 14


The first Cyc*LOU*via will be **Sunday, October 14** from 2 - 6 p.m.

This free event will be along a 3-mile stretch of Bardstown Road and Baxter Avenue from the Douglass Loop to Broadway with automobile cross traffic allowed *only* at major intersections along the route.

Businesses with frontage along the corridor will be open to create a community atmosphere.

Citizens have two options:

- 1) Attend CycLOUvia to promote healthier lifestyles, alternative transportation, economic development, pedestrian and bicycle safety and community engagement.
- 2) Be aware in advance that traffic flow in the Highlands will change with Bardstown Road being closed.



## Schemes, Scams and Frauds

LOUISVILLE

A popular scheme used on unsuspecting victims is called the "Pigeon Drop." It can take many forms but is intended to steal your money.

Typically a victim is approached by a suspect who claims to have found money and asks if it belongs to the victim.

When the victim says that it does not, the suspect might say they know someone to help figure out what to do with the money.

The suspect says that if no one claims the money they can split it but the victim must provide "collateral" or "good faith" money.

Criminals successful at this type of scam are often well-dressed and articulate, making them appear trustworthy. They are often intelligent, persuasive, and aggressive and hope to confuse and overwhelm victims to make quick decisions.

Another version of this scam can

find its way into your email. You might receive a message saying you won a lottery or received a long lost inheritance. To receive the funds a deposit is required.

Many of these scammers operate outside of the United State so prosecution is difficult.

If you receive such an email, simply delete it and do not respond.

## **Canning the Fall Harvests**

In January, we think back to those juicy tomatoes, sweet ears of corn and fleshy peaches of late summer.

Canning is a good way to enjoy the harvests of summer. It can be safe and economical when done properly, not to mention a source of pride.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, if vegetables are handled properly and canned promptly after harvest, they can be more nutritious than fresh produce.

Start with the freshest of the harvest for the best canned vegetables.

Your county extension agent can suggest varieties of fruits and vegetables that are best suited for canning.

Canning vegetables within 6 to 12 hours after harvesting is the best.

For best quality let most fruits ripen one or more days between harvest and canning. If you must delay the canning of other fresh produce, keep it in a shady, cool place.

How much should you can? Your county extension agents can help you

determine the amount you might need for the size of your family.

Canning takes some work and care, but when you are enjoying the "fruits" of your labor this winter, it will all be worth it.

## Spaying/Neutering **Stray Cats**

Anyone feeding stray cats should know that a stray cat population can quickly increase. Cats can have several litters each year and kittens can have kittens at six months old.

Trapping, neutering and returning (TNR) cats to the area where they live is the most humane way to handle the stray cat population. TNR works because future unwanted litters are prevented and cats can live out their lives where they call home.

Alley Cat Advocates is dedicated to this practice and can trap cats and get them spayed and neutered, so that

no more unwanted kittens are born. Every cat involved gets a 3-year rabies and other shots, is flea treated and eartipped.
