A Visit with Mike Eaton, Red Cross Volunteer

At our June 14th meeting, Mike spoke to us about the need for emergency preparedness.

Living here in Oklahoma, sometimes it seems we have more than our fair share of disasters. Most people assume the local authorities will take charge immediately and help will arrive in a matter of hours. Yet, experience has shown that sometimes it can be days — even weeks — before that happens.

The first thing Mike reviewed was what should go into an emergency preparedness kit. Most of us envision a backpack with a few key items along with some sturdy shoes that should be kept in whatever safe spot we have in our homes in case of severe weather. And some of us may even keep a warm blanket and water and munchies in our cars. But in reality, that is not nearly enough.

You need to have enough for three to seven days if you plan to evacuate/hike out (the roads may not be passable), or for two weeks if you are going to tough it out at home.

Obviously, a backpack just won't do. From the water standpoint alone, each person needs a gallon of water a day. We need to be thinking on the scale of a shopping cart, wheel barrow, or some kind of large pushable contraption with big wheels able to navigate uneven terrain.

Here's a partial list of what should be in a kit:

- Water one gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Food non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Flashlight
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- Extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items
- Multi-purpose tool

- Sanitation and personal-hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cell phone with charger
- Family and emergency contact information
- Extra cash
- Emergency blanket
- Map(s) of the area
- Bug spray
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Games and activities for children
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- Two-way radios
- Extra set of car keys and house keys
- Manual can opener
- Whistle
- N95 or surgical masks
- Matches
- Rain gear
- Towels
- Work gloves
- Tools/supplies for securing your home
- Extra clothing, hat, and sturdy shoes
- Plastic sheeting
- Duct tape
- Scissors
- Household liquid bleach
- Entertainment items
- Blankets or sleeping bags

Mike also stressed the need to make a plan — who should grab what, where to meet, what routes to follow.

He shared so much information that we simply can't cover here. However, there are vast resources available online at the Red Cross website. Go to www.redcross.org for complete information.

CHECK OUT <u>www.crimeseen.com</u>. Here you can report suspicious activity so others can be aware of what's going on, as well as see what others have posted.

WATCH YOUR MAIL BOX

We've also had thieves going through mail boxes, stealing outgoing checks. They've then crossed out the name of the payee, put in their own, and cashed them. One person has been arrested, but the accomplice has not. Other area neighborhoods have had problems too.

If you believe your mailbox has been tampered with, call Lolita at the post office: 815-2342.

We strongly urge you to take any mail with checks to the local post office — don't even put it in a standalone collection box. Or pay your bills online, or at other locations set-up to accept payments.

It is time for everyone to renew their CONA memberships. The dues are \$10.00 per household, and are on a voluntarily basis only.


If you cannot come to the October meeting and want to join or renew your membership, please call me or Kathey Rauh.


