NW District Personnel Complete Advanced Certification Training for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design! (CPTED)

Officers and civilian personnel from IMPD NW District completed the Advance Certification Training for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design. (CPTED) The Advanced Training was the final process for certification that began for these individuals in April, 2011.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) theories contend that law enforcement officers, architects, city planners, landscape and interior designers, and resident volunteers can create a climate of safety in a community right from the start. CPTED's goal is to prevent crime by designing a physical environment that positively influences human behavior. The theory is based on four principles: natural access control, natural surveillance, territorial reinforcement and maintenance. In simplest terms, CPTED says make your home, business or property the hardest target in your area for crime. NW District individuals who are now

Make a list of serial numbers that correspond to your electronic items. Photograph valuable or irreplaceable personal possessions. Download your serial numbers and photographs to a flash drive. In the event you experience a home burglary, you will have the much needed information stored on the flash drive to give to the burglary detective.

Vehicle Larceny Crime Prevention Tips

Vehicle break-ins are one of the most prevalent crimes. It is also one of the most preventable crimes. Stealing items from a car is a crime of opportunity. People steal what they can see. It really doesn't matter what the item is. HELP US reduce the number of car larcenies in our community.

We need your help by making sure everyone knows not to leave anything of value in their vehicle.

- Be aware that if you have a GPS system, laptop computer, CD player/radio, cell phone, purse, brief case, popular clothing or any other item in plain view that it should be removed from your vehicle whenever it is unattended.
- Theft from vehicles can occur anywhere and at anytime.
- Leaving items visible in your car sends a message to thieves, regardless where it is parked; shopping facilities, churches, sporting and recreation events, restaurants and even your own driveway.

Auto Theft Prevention Tips

Auto theft is a costly crime. Fortunately, there are a number of steps that you can take to prevent a thief from stealing your vehicle.

Keep your car doors locked.

- Park in a well-lighted area. If you park in a garage, make sure to close and lock the garage door.
- Don't entice thieves by leaving valuable or other items in plain view.
- Don't hide a key in or on your car.
- Lock you car and take your keys with you.
- When parking in attended lots, leave only the ignition key with the attendant. Never leave a key ring with your name, address and phone number.
- Make it a habit to periodically check your license plate and registration tag. When purchasing a vehicle, ask about anti-theft features that are available. Vehicles are now available with a car tracking device that enables law enforcement agencies to track your car if it is stolen.
- Take your keys with you if you are going into a convenience store or gas station.

Burglary Prevention Tips

In an effort to reduce crime in the Northwest District, we are asking for your help by using these simple burglary prevention tips:

- Lock your doors and windows
- Reinforce sliding patio doors
- Keep your outside lights on at night
- Have lights on a timer when not at home
- Trim shrubs and trees around your residence that could conceal burglars
- Keep your curtains or shades closed so as not to advertise your valuables
- Record the serial numbers of items and keep the list in a safe place
- Do not keep valuable jewelry in your jewelry box
- Consider purchasing a home alarm system

Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department CrimeWatch Mission Statement

In April, 1976, the City of Indianapolis, the Indianapolis News, and the Greater Indianapolis Progress Committee put together the concepts that have guided the existing CrimeWatch Program. The purpose of CrimeWatch is to create a self-help cooperative effort to reduce crime and fear of crime in neighborhoods. This is achieved by citizens, law enforcement, and local government working together.

CrimeWatch is a division of the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department. Citizens participating in this program become more aware of crime prevention techniques that can help lower their risk of becoming victims. A pro-active approach against crime is taken through communication and cooperation of citizens, local government and law enforcement.

Over time, CrimeWatch has developed additional programs in response to the needs of the community. These programs also promote crime prevention education. The CrimeWatch Program continues to find innovative ways in responding to the needs of the community, with crime prevention education being it's primary goal.

Organizing neighborhood block clubs has been the primary focus of CrimeWatch since its inception in 1976. A few concerned residents, a community organization, or a law enforcement agency can spearhead the efforts to organize a block club.

To organize a block club, residents are required to have two meetings, one with their IMPD District CrimeWatch Specialist and the other with their IMPD Community Relations Officer. During these meetings, members receive training on in-home security, reporting skills, and other crime prevention topics. Members are provided with the latest information on local crime patterns. Block Clubs are not asked to be vigilantes or to assume the role of the police. They are extra eyes and ears for reporting crime and helping neighbors. CrimeWatch programs help to build pride and serve as a springboard for efforts that address community concerns.
