TJ HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL AND NEW COACH

You may have noticed some changes surrounding the Thomas Jefferson High School football team. In April, TJ hired Chad Hornik as its new head football coach. A graduate of Florida International University, Hornik is a local restaurant owner who lives in the West End with his wife, Kathleen, and their two young daughters. Hornik has coached football for 12 years, including at Freeman, Deep Run, and most recently at Glen Allen High School. Now Coach Hornik has inherited a struggling football team, with too few players, too little money, and outdated facilities. TJ has a weight room, yet the players cannot use it because it is unsafe. Until a few weeks ago, the lockers were decades old and too small to hold football equipment. Any hopes for Friday night lights require the team to travel to other schools, as Thomas Jefferson lacks lights, a field house, or even an adequate field.

Coach Hornik hopes to change all of that and bring TJ out of a culture of losing. He has more than doubled the number of players, he has instituted a twice-weekly study hall, and he plans to raise the minimum required grade point average to play. His efforts are working. On August 31, TJ won its season opener against Colonial Height High School, snapping a 41-game losing streak (the longestrunning in Virginia!) While the team lost its next two games, there is a renewed sense of confidence, thanks to Coach Hornik's efforts, as well as the creation of a booster group -- the Tee Jay Vikings Fund.

Headed by Albert Negrin, TJ Class of 1976, the group is working hard to raise both funds and school spirit in support of the Vikings football team. The group has a website -- www.teejayvikingsfund.org -- which includes information on some upcoming fundraisers.

For TJ's neighbors in Sauer's Garden, this is a great opportunity to support the team and to better our community. Coach Hornik stresses that our involvement in the school's PTA could go a long way in setting a great foundation for TJ's future. Membership is only \$5 per person, and getting involved with the school gives us a chance to change the school for the better! Imagine if we could get excited about sending our children to TJ!

Richmond City Council Candidates



Don't make it easy for the thieves!

Nobody wants to be the victim of a crime, and in recent months you have probably read crime reports regarding shed and car vandalism and thefts.

Unfortunately, our family was the victim of a shed robbery, and it left us with mixed emotions: thankful that our loss was just a power tool, but a bit violated when we imagined someone sneaking across our back yard in the middle of the night to creep into our shed.

The Richmond Police Department responded, took a report and I got a follow up call from a detective the next day. I was impressed with their response time, concern and professionalism.

Here are a few prevention tips to help protect your property:

Lighting Fit a motion-activated outside light. This is a powerful deterrent for burglars who rely on the cover of darkness.

Defensive planting Plant prickly shrubs like holly or pyracantha near windows, drainpipes and fences.

Gravel Use gravel on driveways and paths, as it could help alert you if anyone is outside. Make sure you lock any gates to your drive or back garden too.

Mark and photograph the property you keep in your shed, particularly power tools and valuable equipment. This will help police identify and return your property if it's stolen and recovered later.

Secure your shed by fitting a padlock, and consider putting wire mesh across windows.

The above tips relate to sheds, but the detective I spoke with encouraged everyone to keep their vehicles locked at all times, and to avoid storing any items, including sunglasses and phone chargers, in plain sight. He said the majority of the thefts from sheds and cars take place when these are unlocked – the thieves are simply looking to get in and out quickly.

DINING WITH DAVE-A Road Trip to Pakistan

If you are looking for a unique, international meal it is well worth the Road Trip. The Grille offers traditional Zabihah halai Pakistani (Punjabi) food at a very reasonable price. The menu is guite complete offering appetizers; Kababs of chicken, beef, lamb, and vegetable; Gyros and Salads with a lamb Gyro Sandwich served with rice, fries, or salad: Karahi Specials that serve two including chicken, beef, lamb and goat; Curry Specials in a wide variety including Fish or Shrimp; House Specials as well as a complete Vegetarian Menu. The Kabab Grill was recently voted "Best Vegetarian Food in Richmond by Richmond.com. Side dishes are available as well traditional desserts including Baklava and rice pudding. Drinks include fountain soda, ice tea, assorted juices, a variety of Pakistani teas and special non alcoholic imported drinks including Ginger Beer.

My favorite is The Kabab Grille Buffet available for lunch and dinner. This is a great way to sample Pakistani food to see what you like best. My first introduction to Pakistani food was at the Intercontinental Hotel in Karachi, Pakistan back in the '70s and I have loved the food since that time. I have on good authority, Jodie, that the lamb Gyro is excellent. Tuesday through Friday you will find a wide variety of items on the buffet featuring chicken, lamb, beef, goat and a host of vegetables. Wednesday night is Allie's favorite, the Vegetarian Buffet from 5pm – 8:30pm. Saturday the All Day Buffett features the chef's special soup, fresh tandoori naan(brick oven flat bread) sweet halwa(cream of wheat and many items selected by the chef, each week is a little different. Sunday offers a Brunch Buffet from noon – 8:30 pm. Oh I forgot to mention the Buffet is "All You Can Eat". So go ready to eat. If you have a question about one of the items on the menu or the buffet, just ask Chris Ballard when you arrive, he will be glad to assist you. Take out orders are available by phone and the menu is available at www.Kababgrille.com. Please allow 10-15 minutes for all to go orders.
