"The View from the Front Porch"

Who wants to be outside where it's too hot or too cold or too loud? The ice cream truck doesn't blare as much when you're **inside**, plus it's easier to see the computer screen **indoors**!

Sarcasm aside, we have to admit that with the absence of the front porch, our relationship with our neighborhood diminishes. We may not know our neighbors as well as we could and we may not know what is going on on our street. Maybe our increased awareness would lead to decreased crime.

7th District Update



Dear Friends.

City Council is currently discussing the 2014 budget. For the first time in many years, we have a budget surplus. Long Beach's 2014 budget shows the benefits of the necessary, but difficult, fiscal decisions we have made over the last few years. We have gone from pension abuses to pension reforms, deferred maintenance to record investments in our infrastructure, and budget deficits to a modest budget surplus. Thanks go to the city employees and residents who have made this possible by coming together during tough times in the spirit of shared sacrifice. Nonetheless, tough decisions remain, as does the need for fiscal prudence.

It is important to reflect on how we came back to fiscal health. We faced our problems head on and did not succumb to the temptation of budget gimmicks, irresponsible borrowing, or a fire sale of assets. While some other cities endlessly deferred maintenance, we increased our spending on infrastructure, realizing that letting our assets deteriorate does not save money but simply shifts the rapidly escalating costs to future budgets. We reinstituted our street maintenance budget, which had previously been eliminated in 2003. We increased tree trimming to get back to a standard trim cycle, instead of waiting for overgrown or diseased trees to fall and damage property. We worked in partnership with our employees to reform pensions, saving \$215 million over the next ten years.

Our challenge now is to set aside funds for the rainy days that are sure to come so that we can avoid future service cuts. When I asked you (via my weekly e-newsletter) how we should spend millions of dollars of one-time funds available this year, a clear theme emerged in your comments: we should save some for the future. By putting aside some money today, we can avoid reductions to services (such as public safety and street repair) tomorrow. I advocated putting some funds aside for the long-term success of Long Beach and I will continue to do so. We know our pension costs will rise and that we have other costs ("unfunded liabilities") that, if avoided, will only increase over time. While we are making increased infrastructure investments due to available one-time funds, we know that we need to do more.

Additionally, we discussed making responsible investments to improve quality of life for our residents. City Council will weigh potential investments in open space improvements throughout the city, including funding of up to \$1 million for Willow Springs Park. This investment, if approved in the coming weeks, will allow us to continue the progress we have made developing the biggest park in Long Beach since 1952.

I was lucky to be born and grow up in Long Beach, a city with excellent parks, libraries, public safety officers, and a school system second to none. When we think about our budget decisions, it's important that we think not just about today, but tomorrow. Let's use surplus funds to ensure that the Long Beach we pass on to our children is even greater than the one passed on to us.



Wrigley is Going Green Reminisces About Their First Tree Planting in 2007

Wrigley is Going Green (WiGG) was founded in 2007 by Lisa Wibroe, Brenda Martinez, Richard Pass, Mauna Eichner and Lee Fukui to complete a NPP Grant co-signed by the Wrigley Association. The grant was awarded to WiGG and on November 3, 2007 WiGG planted 150 trees in two hours with the help of over 200 volunteers, the Conservation Corps and the Neighborhood Services Bureau. Things went so quickly and smoothly that the biggest problem was getting the pizzas donated by Buonos, Dominoes and Pizza Hut delivered an hour early. About 75 volunteers hung out and waited for the treats. It was a great neighborhood event

Last month there was quite a conversation on Facebook in the **Wrigley Neighborhood Group** about the origin of the Wrigley Association's logo. Well, here's the scoop (as related by longtime Wrigley resident Candace Mead):

"It was designed in the mid-to-late 1980s by the artist Cathy Cangro who is a former Wrigley resident and the wife of the association's president at that time, Dan Cangro.

Cathy Cangro said, "The association needed a logo, so I designed one." Cathy said she designed it "after the house across the street" from their house."



So that's the story of the logo that's displayed on the monument signs located on Willow Street as well as the ones on PCH at Daisy Avenue and at Golden Avenue.

The Wrigley Association's logo was inspired by the 1928 Spanish style house that's located at 1985 San Francisco Avenue

The other studio hubs are located in the Bixby/California Heights area, Belmont Heights and El Dorado Park Estates area.

This tour is a fun way to get to know your local artists and see where they create their art within your own community. Wrigley's local restaurant, Guadalupe's Grill, is inviting the public to view their large group portrait of famous Mexican actors from classic westerns as well as their new acquisition of a portrait of Jenny Rivera, the famous salsa singer from Long Beach who recently perished in a plane crash.

The Wrigley hub of art studios is also including a studio a bit outside of its borders, The Pan African Gallery and Kambon Studios on Atlantic Ave. Akinsanya Kambon is a prolific artist who not only exhibits his myriad of paintings, sculptures and drawings, he also opens his studio and volunteers his time and skills to teach art to local children. This is a real treat to the community, and Wrigley is proud to stretch out its borders to include this gem in the Wrigley hub.

There is so much local talent to enjoy on this Tour that you might as well schedule the entire weekend of October 12th & 13th right now. Mark your calendars!
