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# Neighborhood College's Neighborhoodology

The past year has been a busy one for NSD's neighborhood specialists with the launch of Neighborhood College's Neighborhoodology.

The Neighborhodology program is for existing neighborhood organizations listed with the city that are looking to revitalize their leadership. Participants will enhance capacity through a more interactive, hands-on experience designed to increase their knowledge of civic engagement and community building. This track is specifically designed to offer active neighborhood associations and block watch groups a greater level of detail and information to assist them in working in their communities and with the city.

Neighborhoodology consists of approximately 10 hours of core classroom instruction, hands-on activities and required electives that must be completed over a nine-month period culminating in a capstone community project.

Neighborhoodology kicked off earlier this year with a pilot of four established neighborhood organizations. There are currently four additional organizations participating in the program. By the

# Homeownership program helps buyers overcome market obstacles

A lack of homes listed for sale, interest rates on the rise and saving for a down payment and closing costs are just a few of the obstacles buyers may encounter in today's housing market.

Aiding homebuyers in their path to homeownership is the city of Phoenix Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP), which offers homebuyer assistance on newly remodeled homes. NSP still has homes available and more will be available to eligible homebuyers in the months to come. What does that mean to anyone interested in purchasing a home in the city of Phoenix? It means they

have the opportunity to receive \$15,000 to help cover the down payment and closing costs on the purchase of a Move-In Ready home, without the bidding wars.

"Prior to learning about the city's homeownership assistance program, we were outbid on 21 homes. Some of the offers we made were blind offers, and even so we could not buy a home," said recent NSP homebuyer Erika Rodriguez-Nievez. Now, Erika and her family live in a beautifully remodeled single-family home in west Phoenix, where they originally hoped to buy.

NSP has worked to improve Phoenix

neighborhoods since 2009 by providing opportunities and incentives for homebuyers and filling homes vacated due to foreclosure. Since

then, it has helped 513 families accomplish homeownership, brought 320 foreclosed vacant homes back into productive use, and provided homebuyer education to more than 2,150 buyers.

Many of these accomplishments were made possible through the acquisition and renovation that brought these formerly abandoned vacant homes back to livable standards. Through this process all Move-In Ready homes

received energy efficient upgrades, enhanced curb appeal and improved design finishes. Additional benefits to homebuyers include a homeowner warranty, pre-purchase education and friendly assistance through the process.

With the influx of homes in the months to come, it is highly recommended that interested buyers get started in the program as soon as possible.

# Check 'no-burn days' before using your fireplace

A crackling fireplace is tempting this time of year, especially during the holidays, but check to make sure it's OK before lighting a wood-burning fire.

Fall and winter's cooler temperatures can trap air pollution near the ground, which is why Maricopa County may issue no-burn days to help avoid high levels of air pollution. On no-burn days, Valley residents are asked to refrain from wood burning in fireplaces, wood stoves and outdoor fire pits. Violators may be subject to fines.

Natural gas or other cleanburning fire appliances are allowed on no-burn days. If you must burn wood, use only dry, seasoned wood because it is more efficient at heating your home. You also can reduce pollution by not driving after 4 p.m. and combining errands whenever possible.



# Be in the know: List your organization

Looking to stay connected with the city about neighborhood cleanups, graffiti removal trainings and other community news? The city's Neighborhood Services Department is updating its listing of neighborhood organizations.

The Neighborhood Notification listing is a vital tool utilized by the city of Phoenix to communicate with neighborhood organizations about city-sponsored events and workshops, grant opportunities, public meetings and initiatives, as well as requests for community input on various projects.

Besides being informed about city issues, neighborhood organizations listed with the city are eligible to borrow neighborhood clean-up tools for free through the department's tool lending program.

Existing organizations on the list can update information online or by calling 602-534-4444. To list a neighborhood organization, download the directory form from phoenix.gov/NSD and return the completed form via email to nnet.nsd@phoenix.gov or send it by U.S. mail to Phoenix City Hall, Neighborhood Services Department, 200 W. Washington St., fourth floor, Attention: Neighborhood Notification, Phoenix, AZ 85003. Forms can be mailed upon request.

### Free tax help

The Human Services Department Income Tax Credit (EITC) campaign helps low- and moderate-income working families who earned less than \$51,567 in 2013 with free tax-filing services and an EITC tax credit up to \$6,044.

Individuals and families who qualify also may be able to file for the child tax credit and the education tax credit at the city's free tax preparation sites. Eighteen primary sites, scheduled to open Feb. 1, offer free tax-filing services.

Individuals and families may file their taxes for free online at myfreetaxes.com/phoenix if they earned less than \$58,000.

# Tips from Energize Phoenix

Temperatures are dropping and heaters are being turned on. Here are a few tips to make your home more energy efficient:


- Change your air filter regularly. Check your filter every month, especially during heavy use months (winter and summer). If the filter looks dirty after a month, change it. At a minimum, change the filter every three months. A dirty filter will slow down air flow and make the system work harder to keep you warm – wasting energy. A clean filter also will prevent dust and dirt from building up in the system.
- Tune up your HVAC equipment yearly.
   Just as a tune-up for your car can
   improve your gas mileage, a yearly
   tune-up of your heating and cooling
   system can improve efficiency and comfort.
- Install a programmable thermostat. A
  programmable thermostat is ideal for residents who
  are away from home during set periods of time
  throughout the week. Through proper use of a preprogrammed setting, a programmable thermostat
  can save you about \$180 every year in energy costs.
