
Heath and Betsy Carrier of 404



History of Cedarwood Pool

A kid swimming in the Cedarwood Pool this summer would not be impressed to learn that the original pool cost \$28,000.00. In fact, he may be aware that his parents paid more than that for the van that his mom takes him to school in each day. However, in the early 1960's, when the pool was built, a family could have owned a house in this neighborhood for the cost of building that pool. Today those 28 thousand dollars would be the equivalent to over \$200,000.

So it was quite a leap of faith when a couple of Cedarwood residents took a lien against their home in order to finance the construction of a pool on property that had been donated to the newly-organized pool association. The fact that they did take that daring step, however, gave the community one of it most prized assets; and it also created an environment that the kids who grew up in this area loved and still cherish its memory today.

Art and Mary Lea were the brave souls who financed the project, and Bow Stafford donated the property when the Cedarwood Pool Inc. was formed May 4, 1963. Five members formed the first Board of Directors: Dudley Moore, Art Lea, Don Setliff, James Jackson, and Bow Stafford. Moore was President, Jackson and Setliff were Secretary and Treasurer, respectively.

By May the next year, committees were formed for Building Maintenance, Membership, Pool Activities, and Community Center. The basketball goals were installed and swimming lessons were underway. That first year the dues were \$25 dollars and there were 135 members. A year later, with a debt of \$626, the dues were raised to \$35 a year. By 1967 the membership had increased to 150. The cost of that membership included a \$200 stock certificate and a \$100 initiation fee.

In 1968 the cover for the pool was purchased and property secured to build two tennis courts. With a membership of 170, the pool association felt sufficiently secure to borrow \$6000 to build the tennis courts. Families who wanted to use the courts were given keys and tennis regulations were adopted. With playing members granted access on a first come first served basis. That same year the Board of Directors grew from five to seven members, with four being residents of Cedarwood.

By May of 1970 there was a waiting list of people who wanted to join Cedarwood Pool, Inc. Discussions began that would lead to the enlargement of the pool to its present size and at a cost of between \$28,00 and \$33,000. The new membership cap was then placed at 250 with a \$350 joining fee.

Today, the Cedarwood Swim and Tennis Club is the sports and social hub of the community. The Board of Directors includes between seven and fourteen members. The membership cap is 310. The purchase of a \$300 stock certificate and a \$525 annual dues payment is required of the members. The pool complex includes a bath house, a club house, five swim lanes, a deck with a gazebo, and a kiddie pool. The outdoor basketball court and the tennis courts are also popular spots. The Club offers a full range of swim and tennis lessons as well as sponsoring the teams that compete with other clubs in the area.
