African American History

Statesman, abolitionist, human rights advocate, fighter for equality

Underground Railroad Stop, close to the site of the Brockton Liberty Tree

Brockton Edward Bennett house and business

Cape Verdean community and shipbuilding/whaling in New England:

Douglass escaped to the north dressed as a sailor; worked with Cape Verdeans in New Bedford and Nantucket as a ship caulker

Liberty Tree

William Lloyd Garrison and many orators who spoke out against prejudice here

1845 trip to Ireland

- "The Black Daniel O'Connell"
- Belfast shoe industry and special 'wide' shoes to accommodate Africans in the slave trade; Brockton shoe industry
- Multiple monuments and memorials for Douglass in Ireland
 (Paddy Lane/Irish in Brockton located right at the Douglass Garden site)

54th Massachusetts Regiment/Civil War

- His two sons served in the regiment
- Douglass' argument with Lincoln re equal pay for black soldiers
- -"Touissant Guards" in this regiment
- -Civil War "Haytian Emigration" movement

"Some...know the value of education by having it. I know its value by not having it."

Women's Rights

Seneca Falls, New York

"[A] woman should have every honorable motive to exertion which is enjoyed by man, to the full extent of her capacities and endowments. The case is too plain for argument."

1889 – Minister Resident and Consul General to Haiti

Served for two years, just after their independence
