While the 1975 busing and desegregation period was a very traumatic period for many, it was a cornerstone historical civil rights event which helped shaped Louisville and the state. Mayor Sloane was mayor of Louisville and his office placed the call to Governor Julian Carroll requesting support from the National Guard during the riots, marches and protests of 1975 during that very pivotal year.

According to the Atlantic Magazine April 2015 issue, Louisville is touted as the city which maintained integration through 40 years of busing. Louisville's school system is consistently compared favorably to other city school systems such as Detroit, Boston, and Charlotte-Mecklenburg who underwent busing.

Powdered Booze: A Public Health ThreatSIX THINGS EVERY COMMUNITY NEEDS TO KNOW

A powder that can be mixed with water to make an instant cocktail and two types of liquor may soon be available at Kentucky retailers. Parents should take note as this product sparks numerous health concerns about its high potential for abuse and appeal to youth. The powdered alcohol product called **Palcohol** gained federal approval to be sold in the U.S. last March; and according to the product's website will be available for distribution soon. 25 states have banned powdered alcohol through state statute and three more states banned it via agency policy. However, Kentucky has NOT enacted legislation related to powdered alcohol, and there are some things parents should know before this dangerous product hits the shelves.

- 1. **Marketing and appeal to youth** Youth are highly receptive to marketing. What kind of message does powdered alcohol send to teens? Like Alcopops, jello-shots or the former alcoholic energy drinks, powdered alcohol will appeal to youth through the variety of fruity flavors and colorful names.
- 2. **Accidental overdose/ingestion by small children** Powdered alcohol packets are of similar size and shape to packets of nonalcoholic children's drinks. To a kid, powdered alcohol looks like Kool Aid, Tang, or the sugary sweet powder inside a pixie stick or fun dip packet. If a small child accidently ingests even a small amount of powdered alcohol, the result could be fatal.
- 3. **Date rape** The inconspicuous nature of the powder which can be sprinkled into a drink or onto food has raised concern the product could be used as the next date rape drug. Adults who choose to drink should be reminded to maintain a close watch over any food or beverage product they plan to ingest, and if some thing is left unattended, even for a brief time—DON'T' RISK IT.
- 4. **Ingestion of the product by snorting** Granulized alcohol can be inhaled, making it MORE POTENT and MORE ADDICTIVE. When alcohol is inhaled, it bypasses the stomach and liver, and is ingested through the lungs directly into the bloodstream where it gets delivered to the brain in much stronger doses.
- 5. **Increased potential for binge drinking and alcohol abuse** Palcohol is 50% alcohol by weight and, mixed according to the package directions, is designed to produce drinks that are 10% alcohol by volume, or roughly twice as much as a standard beer.
- 6. Concealment by underage drinkers attending events/locations where alcohol is prohibited or already sold (licensed venues) Alcohol retailers and law enforcement need to be made aware of this new product an on the lookout for it.
