Council calls May 7 election to consider City Charter amendments

Residents will vote May 7 on recommended City Charter revisions dealing with the number of City Council members, terms of office, compensation and more.

The charter defines the organization, powers, functions and essential procedures of city government. The city's first home rule charter was adopted in 1924, establishing the city council/city manager form of government Fort Worth uses today. The charter has been amended 13 times since adoption, most recently in 2006.

An 11-member task force, appointed by the City Council, presented its final recommendations in December. The Charter Review Task Force examined these questions:

- **Number of councilmembers.** There currently are eight members plus the mayor. Due to Fort Worth's population growth, the task force is recommending an increase to 10 members plus the mayor. The resolution appointing the task force called for the increase to become effective upon redistricting after the 2020 Census for a 2023 election.
- **Terms of office.** The task force recommended going from two-year terms to three years for all members.
- Staggered or concurrent terms for councilmembers. Currently, terms are concurrent, meaning all members are up for election at the same time. The task force recommended continuing to elect all members concurrently.
- Compensation for councilmembers. The current charter puts councilmembers' pay at \$25,000 annually, \$29,000 for the mayor. The task force recommends increasing the salary of councilmembers to \$45,000 and increasing the mayor's salary to \$60,000, effective Oct. 1, 2016.

In addition, the City Council is proposing eight technical amendments. These are aspects of the charter that are inconsistent with state law, use archaic language or include unused provisions.

The Council voted 8-1 to place the charter election on the May 7 ballot.

The city will conduct an outreach campaign this spring to educate voters on the proposed charter amendments.

Randol Mill Project Update: Per department staff

- 1. Project is over budget/over schedule
- 2. In tunneling under the 820, from east to west, we ran into a gas main in direct conflict with the sewer alignment
- 3. The gas main appears to be Atmos, running N-S in the utility easement on the west side of 820
- 4. Resolving the conflict (piping the gas main around the sewer alignment) involves excavating down to the conflict
- 5. The excavation challenge is exacerbated by 20-25 additional feet of fill material that has been placed over the gas line and the water line that parallel the 820.

How to Guide on the Application Process

Any candidate who desires consideration for employment with the City of Fort Worth will need to first view all available jobs posted on the City's official website.

- First time candidates seeking employment opportunities will need to register before applying for vacancies. Certain positions require passing a clerical test.
- Applicants are screened by assessing relevant education and work experience.
- Applicants must meet the minimum qualifications for the job classification to be interviewed.
- Once an applicant is selected for employment, the applicant must pass all required background screenings, *i.e. criminal and background reference*, *drug testing*, *polygraph*. Any offer of employment is conditional until all background screenings are clear and finalized.
- All paperwork required for new employees must be completed and submitted to finalize the hiring process.

The City of Fort Worth is currently seeking School Crossing Guards for seasonal, temporary work at various school locations. Work is scheduled for 15 hours per week (1.5 hours in the morning and 1.5 hours in the afternoon), during the time when the school system is open.

Under direct supervision of the School Crossing Guard Program Coordinator Officer, the School Crossing Guard provides assistance to children and other pedestrians in crossing at specified streets along school routes and performs related work as required. To perform this job successfully, an individual must be able to perform each essential duty satisfactorily. The requirements listed below are representative of the knowledge, skill and/or ability required.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES include the following; other duties may be assigned as required:

- Assemble children and other pedestrians behind curb lines awaiting traffic fulls or signal changes.
- Stop traffic and escort pedestrians into the street allowing them to cross safely.
- · Instruct children in proper procedures for safe street crossing.
- Report students who do not adhere to safe street crossing procedures.
- Dependability and an overall sense of responsibility for the safety of students.
