Details for the debate are still being finalized. January 26 (last Tuesday in January), at 4 p.m. is the candidate filing deadline to file nomination papers for the May primary. The last day to register to vote in the primary is on April 18, and the May primary is Tuesday, May 17.

UHNA's Reforestation Program to Begin This Year

One of the current goals of your neighborhood association is to add much-needed trees to the existing tree canopy. We are losing more of our large trees every year to age and weather; and, currently there is no plan in place, as a community, to reforest the area. This is an urgent problem that needs our continued attention. We commend and appreciate those neighbors who have replaced trees on their own property, as they have been lost.


The UHNA plan includes building on the outstanding efforts of Chris Catt and Mike Hayman, who, independently, have managed the planting of approximately 160 trees in our neighborhood since 2012. Their efforts resulted in trees being planted on Tartan Way, Fordyce Lane, Fraser Drive, Lamont Road, Dundee Road, Winston Avenue and Emerson Avenue. With the help of Atherton High School's principal, they also spearheaded a significant number of trees being planted on the school property.

A large number of trees were planted by volunteers, including Boy Scouts from St. Raphael, Atherton students and teachers, Bellarmine professors and students, generous neighbors, as well as arborist and former tree commission member, Mike Hayman of Whitehall. Councilman Tom Owen also generously helped with the cost of 11 trees. Chris Catt and Mike Hayman have been a major catalyst in our neighborhood to make this important project a success,

UHNA Safety and Security Report

Recent area crimes and suspicious activity have generated a number of concerns and questions. While UHNA works closely with District 8 Metro Councilman Tom Owen and Louisville Metro Police Officer Kevin Mumphrey, both offices are asking residents to always call the Louisville Metro Police Fifth Division at 574-7636 to report any unusual going-ons.

There have been concerns that minors "selling" items door to door may be being exploited by criminals. Councilman Owen's office has asked that you ask these young people for identification, which they are supposed to have on them with a phone number. Call police at 574-7111 with their information, along with a description and direction of travel. This can also sometimes be a scheme to see if anyone is home and if not, a home invasion (burglary) can follow. •



Junk Pick-Up for District 8

Feb. 5, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2016 May 20, 2016 to May 22, 2016

Ready to clean out your unwanted junk but not sure what to do with it? The city has two free junk pick-ups this February and May. All you need to do is set out your items near your normal trash collection point. Below are some guidelines from the city regarding junk pick-up.

- Set out items before 6 a.m. on Monday of your collection week but no earlier than 4 p.m. on the Friday before.
- Small items must be bundled or put in plastic bags. Do not use garbage cans or cardboard boxes.
- Tree branches and brush no greater than four inches in diameter must be cut in four foot lengths and separated.
- Doors must be removed from large appliances such as refrigerators and freezers.
- Items not allowed include computer equipment, dirt, gravel, concrete, construction debris; auto parts or hazardous materials such as motor oil, batteries, paint, gasoline and antifreeze; pool chemicals or lawn chemicals.
- Electronics and batteries can be recycled at Louisville Waste Reduction Center, 636 Meriwether Avenue from Tuesday -Friday, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Saturday, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m.


