2017 Membership Drive Kicks off April 15



We're a few months into our membership year and currently have 17 paid members, about the same number as this time last year.

Our spending is very consistent year to year at around \$3,300, most of which goes to upkeep of our entrances. We need 110 paid members to fully cover that amount.

Over the past few years,

however, membership has declined sharply, by about 40 percent. Last year, we had only 89 paid members, in comparison to the 145 we had in 2011.

Our dues are a bargain at just \$30 per year! Your paid dues allow us to provide events and services like:

- Our annual neighborhood garage sale
- Neighbors Night Out
- Santa Ride
- Christmas decorations at our entrances
- Neighborhood-wide meetings with guest speakers and refresh-

ments

- Landscaping at our three main entrances —mowing, mulch, fertilizer, plants, water, etc.

- This newsletter, delivered to your door

Our merry little band of volunteers does all this because we believe a sense of community is essential to quality of life. And studies show that neighborhoods with that sense of community are safer and have higher property values, so there's a practical benefit, as well.



Equestrian Park in OKC!



Did you know there's an equestrian park in Oklahoma City? Equestri-

an Park opened last fall, and is located along the south side of the scenic Oklahoma River near the historic Oklahoma City Stockyards.

The 20-acre park features:

- Open riding space
- 0.6 miles of dedicated softscape looped trail
- Parking for trucks and trailers
- Views of the Oklahoma River and the downtown

The park is envisioned to be a place where local riders can enjoy a day out along the river, or riders traveling with their horses can take a break.

The Oklahoma River Horse Park Task Force members hope the park will eventually include a visitor center, corral, horse exercise area, public riding stable, and outdoor arenas.

Warm-Weather Reminders



As our unseasonably mild winter turns more and more spring-like, we wanted to

give you a couple of warmweather reminders about water use and smoking in parks.

Watering Lawns

Remember that Oklahoma City has permanent Level 1 water conservation measures in place:

- If your house number ends with an odd digit (1, 3, 5, 7, 9), you can only water your lawn on oddnumbered calendar dates.
- If your house number ends with an **even** digit (0, 2, 4, 6, 8), you can only water your lawn on evennumbered calendar dates.

Rain Barrels

Harvest rainwater for your garden by investing in a rain barrel for just \$63.50.

Use rainwater to water your plants, clean muddy tools, or wash your car, all of which conserve drinking water.

The barrels have screens to allow you to collect and save the water without providing a habitat for mosquitoes and other insects.

There are pickups around the metro during March and April. Each location has its own order site; simply pick a site and order by the Sunday before the pickup dates for that location. Visit https:// okc.gov/Home/Components/ News/News/1969/5159? npage=2 for details.

No Smoking, Please

Smoking is banned in OKC parks and other City property. The ban includes all Cityowned or operated property indoors and outdoors with exceptions for streets, alleys, sidewalks, City golf courses and land or facilities licensed by the Oklahoma Horse Racing Commission on Cityowned property.

The ordinance also prohibits smoking on sidewalks inside parks, on trails and in the area immediately surrounding City-owned and operated buildings.
