ATTEMPTED BREAK-IN ON BELLA VISTA

On December 30, 2015 at 4 pm in broad daylight, two youths driving a red car attempted to burglarize the home of Doug Horner at 237 S. Bella Vista Drive (at the corner of Bella Vista and Sentinel Peak Road). On youth waited in the car, while the other took a crowbar to the locks on Doug's main entry door. Doug was away at the time, but fortunately Johnny Evans, who rents the casita in the back, heard the commotion and confronted the two would-be thieves, who fled the scene. The door lock was damaged, but the house was not entered, and nothing was stolen. The incident was reported to TPD.

DR. BARBARA WARREN ON NEIGHBORHOOD EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Our annual meeting speaker, Barbara Warren MD of Physicians for Social Responsibility (PSR), described how a lack of social cohesiveness, as well as social isolation, contribute to poor outcomes during climate disasters such as floods, fires, excessive heat and severe cold. On the neighborhood level, emergency preparedness, and simply "looking out for your neighbor" can mean the difference between life and death in extreme climate situations. PSR is studying how to build resilient neighborhoods using modeling and disaster scenarios, and is offering a workshop on the hows and whys of sheltering at home. BRUSH AND BULKY PICK-UP SCHEDULE CHANGES

Dates for the 2016 semi-annual Brush and Bulky pick-up for Panorama Estates have been changed to **March 28th, 2016, and September 26th, 2016**. This arrangement avoids our usual July 4th pick-up; probably a good thing since dry brush and fireworks are a poor mix. Our recent additional neighborhood roll-offs January 11--15, 2016 were under-utilized, most likely because of the previous week's record breaking drenching rain and cold! PEA will monitor the neighborhood response to the City Brush and Bulky pick-ups, prior to scheduling our next neighborhood roll-offs. If you need additional brush and bulky pick-up, keep in mind that the City of Tucson will pick up on an individual basis for a reasonable fee.

WARD I OFFICE ASSISTS IN PARKING ISSUES, MEDIAN CLEAN-UP

In response to neighbors' concerns voiced at the PEA annual meeting in October, Ward I assistant Steve Almquist helped to organized a Fire Department investigation of the parking situation on Lazy Place. As a result of the investigation, "No Parking" signs were erected on Lazy Place, designating it as a fire lane. Additionally, overgrown trees and brush encroaching on Bella Vista were handled by Tucson Department of Transportation after Steve called and had them re-open their file. By November, TDOT had trimmed the brush and trees back from the roadway. Thank you to Steve and Ward I for helping with these issues.

ROGER PFEUFFER ON THE HISTORY OF THE MISSION GARDENS

At our annual meeting in October, Roger Pfeuffer of Friends of Tucson's Birthplace (FOTB) gave a fascinating presentation on the history of Mission Gardens, the unique recreation of the historic gardens at the foot of A-Mountain. In 2007 and 2008, the City of Tucson built the gardens' adobe walls with the last of the Rio Nuevo funds. FOTB was formed by local interested volunteers in 2010. A three party organization consisting of FOTB, City of Tucson, and Pima County was formed in 2011 to further work on the Mission Gardens. In order to remain viable, FOTB was required to raise a minimum of \$250,000. Well, they did, and then some: they raised \$600,000. That combined with \$1.1 million from the Rio Nuevo Settlement formed the financial foundation for Mission Gardens.

The archeological finds at Mission Gardens have essentially rewritten the archeology of the southwestern United States. Mission Gardens has completed many projects to interpret and showcase the 4100 year history of continuous agricultural cultivation on this site, the longest timespan in the United States. The earliest found examples in the US of cultivated corn, as well as pottery, come from this site.

Timeline gardens interpret the multicultural farming traditions that have existed here, including the Early Agricultural (Hohokam) 2100 BC to 1450 AD; the O'odham 1450-1692 AD; the Mexican/Father Kino 1692-1854 Gadsden Purchase; and the Territorial 1854--present, which includes Chinese, Yaqui and Statehood Gardens.



BUFFLEGRASS BASHERS AT IT AGAIN

This year's Beat Back Bufflegrass Day, January 23, 2016, found 19 Panorama neighbors and volunteers attacking the noxious weed along Sentinel Peak Road and Bella Vista Drive. Altogether, the workers worked for 3 hours and chopped 20 giant bags of bufflegrass, which was later picked-up by Parks and Recreation. Special thanks to the Bufflegrass Clearinghouse for sending us volunteers, to Mary Jo Ghory for organizing the tools, snacks and roll-call (as well as for herding cats), to Jill Hofer for photography, and to Fred Elling for the use of his very cool 1978 pick-up truck.



WHAT IS THE PANORAMA ESTATES ASSOCIATION?

Founded in 1958, the Panorama Estates Association is the smallest neighborhood association in Tucson, but works to improve and support our unique and very special neighborhood.

Here is a sample of some of the services PEA provides:

-- organize and hold annual meetings, elect officers, and hold regular open Board meetings in compliance with our bylaws, and have done so continuously since 1958

--maintain a website on the Department of Neighborhood Resources, and our own Facebook page -- maintain our nonprofit status with the Arizona Corporation Commission

--work closely with Ward I on issues affecting our neighborhood, such as improvements to Sentinel Peak

Park, and pedestrian safety

--foster communication with the Tucson Police Department regarding illegal parking, general security, and coordination of 4th of July traffic

--promote beautification of our neighborhood with bufflegrass removal, graffiti abatement, and roll-offs for removal of larger trash items

--support local schools, non-profits and public art with occasional small donations, as approved by our membership

--organize social events such as our Neighborhood Home Tours, and Neighborhood Parties, and welcome new neighbors with a welcome packet

--publish a semi-annual newsletter, and maintain an archive of records from the earliest days of the Association.

-- respond to neighborhood complaints and questions, and promote neighborhood cohesion and harmony

The \$20 mandatory annual dues break down to 5 cents per day. All of our board members are unpaid volunteers, most while working full-time jobs. We welcome anyone to participate in the Panorama Estates Association, and thank you for all you do towards making our neighborhood such a wonderful place to live.
