Where did May Come From?

The fifth month of the Gregorian calendar, May, is named after a goddess named Maia. But which goddess named Maia? There are actually two. The Greek goddess Maia was one of the <u>Pleiades</u>, the companions of Artemis. This Maia was the mother of Hermes, the messenger of the Gods. But the Romans had yet another goddess named Maia, who just happened to share a name with the Greek goddess. The Roman Maia was named for the Latin word for large, *maius*, and she was associated with growth and the spring. As the Romans adopted many elements of Greek culture, the two goddesses became conflated and gave their name to the fifth month.

However, there is another suggestion that the month is not named for these <u>intertwined</u> goddesses at all. The Latin poet Ovid claimed that the month may have been named after the Latin word *maiores*, "elders," to juxtapose it to the month of June, which was named after *iuniores*, the Latin word for youth.

The month of May entered English from the Old French in the 1000s. In Old English, the month of May and "mother may I" could not be confused because there was another name for the month of May. Sadly, we lost the Old English word for the fifth month of the year: brimilce. It literally meant "three milkings" because it was the only month of the year when cows could be milked three times per day.

WHAT IS THE TRUE MEANING OF CINCO DE MAYO?

Cinco de Mayo has its roots in the Second French intervention in Mexico, which took place in the aftermath of the 1846–48 Mexican -American War and the 1858-61 Reform War. The Reform War was a civil war that pitted Liberals (who believed in separation of church and state, and freedom of religion) against Conservatives (who favored a tight bond between the Catholic Church and the Mexican state). These wars nearly bankrupted the Mexican Treasury. On July 17, 1861, Mexican President Benito Juárez issued a moratorium in which all foreign debt payments would be suspended for two years. In response, Britain, France, and Spain sent naval forces to Veracruz to demand reimbursement. Britain and Spain negotiated with Mexico and withdrew, but France, at the time ruled by Napoleon III, decided to use the opportunity to establish an empire in Mexico that would favor French interests, the Second Mexican Empire. The empire was part of an envisioned "Latin America" (term used to imply cultural kinship of the region with France) that would rebuild French influence in the American continent and exclude Anglophone American territories.

Late in 1861, a well-armed French fleet attacked Veracruz, landing a large French force and driving President Juárez and his government into retreat. Moving on from Veracruz towards Mexico City, the French army encountered heavy resistance from the Mexicans close to Puebla, at the Mexican forts of Loreto and Guadalupe. The French army of 8,000 attacked the poorly equipped Mexican army of 4,000. On May 5, 1862, the Mexicans decisively defeated the French army. The victory represented a significant morale boost to the Mexican army and the Mexican people at large and helped establish a sense of national unity and patriotism.

A 2007 UCLA Newsroom article notes that "the holiday, which has been celebrated in California continuously since 1863, is virtually ignored in Mexico." TIME magazine reports that "Cinco de Mayo started to come into vogue in 1940s America during the rise of the Chicano Movement." The holiday crossed over from California into the rest of the United States in the 1950s and 1960s but did not gain popularity until the 1980s when marketers, especially beer companies, capitalized on the celebratory nature of the day and began to promote it. It grew in popularity and evolved into a celebration of Mexican culture and heritage, first in areas with large Mexican-American populations, like Los Angeles, Chicago, Houston, New York, followed by Cleveland, Boston, Indianapolis, Raleigh, Dallas, San Antonio, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, Miami, Orlando, Denver, Phoenix, Philadelphia, Tucson, San Francisco, San Jose, and San Diego.

HOW TO AVOID A SUMMER VACATION SCAM AND OTHER PITFALLS

Nothing can spoil your carefully planned R&R like getting ripped off.

Or worse, a misfortune of your own doing — think an expired passport, lost wallet or booking a vacation to, say Walley World, only to discover it's temporarily closed.

However, these are all pitfalls that can be avoided. Ahead of summer travel season, here's how to sidestep two all-too-common snags.

You fall victim to a travel scam

With the rise of deeply discounted online offers and unregulated home rentals has come a slew of potential scams.

<u>Travel fraud</u> rose 16 percent last year and cost travelers \$283 to \$588 per fraudulent transaction, according to a recent report by credit reporting company Experian.

"The reason why most folks get into this situation is because they are out there hunting for a deal," said Mike Bruemmer, Experian's vice president of consumer protection. "If it's too good to be true, it usually is."

Avoid "instant" travel discounts through third parties designed to lure you into an impulse purchase on a hotel, plane ticket or cruise,

Bruemmer said.

Often, high-pressure booking tactics require payment well in advance, and that leaves vacationers with little recourse if their trip falls flat (there's only a 60-day limit on disputing a credit card purchase, according to the Federal Trade Commission).

If you're looking for an apartment rental, steer clear of making arrangements directly with an owner, who may or may not be legitimate, and opt for a trusted site such as <u>Airbnb</u> or <u>Expedia's</u> HomeAway, which have built-in protections and money-back guarantees.

And even then, avoid providing any more personal identification than is necessary, such as a Social Security number or agreeing to a credit check.

Your passport is no longer valid

Be sure to verify that you have your passport — and that it has not expired — well before your international trip.

Keep in mind that the expiration date on that document is misleading.

That is because you generally want to have a passport that is valid for at least six months from the date of your trip, according to Julie Hall, a spokeswoman at travel organization AAA.

If you need to renew your passport or apply for one, be sure to leave plenty of time. The process can take six weeks, Hall said.

It is possible to obtain expedited passports in some cities, such as New York, though those services may be harder to find in other locations, said Erika A. Richter, director of communications at the American Society of Travel Agents.

Not updating this key document could be a deal breaker if you arrive at the airport gate unprepared.

These were only a few but being aware of potential pitfalls can make your vacation a fun adventure. ENJOY!


