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PANORAMA IN THE TIME OF PANDEMIC

Note: All of these observations are based on direct experiences, both mine and my neighbors'.

After we entered into lockdown around March 15th, Panorama Estates neighbors really showed their resilience.

Early on, PEA President Mary Jo Ghory sent out an email urging neighbors to check on each other and offering PEA's assistance if needed.

Many of us reached out to elderly, or high risk, or solitary neighbors, offering to pick up groceries or run to the pharmacy, or just talk.

Some neighbors began sewing facemasks; they delivered them locally to the Pima County Health Department, Banner Health, St. Mary's Hospital, and the Tucson Community Food Bank; they mailed them to the Navajo Nation and to the Congo.

Some neighbors donated money to charities or non-profits.

Some opened their rental properties for the use of doctors needing a place to self-isolate while they cared for COVID patients.

Some of us got out our shovels and rakes, and put in a vegetable garden, or started a compost pile and invited neighbors to contribute their kitchen scraps and yard trimmings.

One family moved in during the pandemic, a long-planned relocation for a new job here. Despite the lock down, they made contact with neighbors and became a welcome part of the community.

Others tackled long delayed household projects, from cleaning out closets and sorting through boxes of family photos and estate records, to painting, remodeling and yard maintenance.

Neighbors started cooking more at home, often sharing their excess culinary creations with neighbors (from a safe distance).

We ordered carryout from our local restaurants and pizzerias, knowing they needed our help, and appreciating how much we loved those places and the people who made and served the food there. People started wearing masks, walking regularly, saying hi to neighbors they passed.

Tumamoc closed, and A-Mountain got more use by pedestrians, bicyclists, and families with strollers, dogs and small kids in tow.

We started doing yoga via Zoom, cocktail parties via video conference, and Facetiming grandkids and far-flung relatives.

We read books, wrote our memoirs, started to paint, wrote poetry and short stories.

We worked on master's degrees, law degrees, and taught classes online.

We all consumed information about coronavirus, trying to maintain our equilibrium and navigate a new reality.

We were brought, sometimes against our will, to a deeper appreciation for our spouses, friends, roommates, children, parents, country and world.

MAIL THEFT IN PANORAMA ESTATES

Many Panorama residents have had mail stolen from their mailboxes in the past, and some have had outgoing checks stolen, washed and deposited for larger amounts of money. Many have opened PO boxes out of concern for security.

The local Postal Inspector is requesting any information about mail theft in our neighborhood. Any information, no matter how small, would be helpful.

In October 2019, 14 PEA neighbors signed a petition of concern regarding the bright light emanating from the U-Haul facility at Speedway and I-10.

That light, which shines upward, has been noticed by many in our neighborhood, and violates the Dark Sky Ordinance. Ward 1 supports our concerns and promises to explore ways to address the issue with U-Haul, which was previously not open to discussing the concerns of PEA neighbors. Stay tuned...

FRIENDS OF SENTINEL GATEWAY UPDATE

After completing the small traffic circle at Cuesta and Cedar, Friends of Sentinel Gateway are looking ahead towards continuing work on their proposal.

The new Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) Program is a \$3 million initiative passed by Mayor and Council in February 2020, with the goal of installing GSI on Tucson streets, in accordance with Complete Streets principals (see Tucson.gov/gsi).

The goals of the GSI Program are essentially identical to the goals of Friends of Sentinel Gateway and include traffic calming and use of stormwater to irrigate landscaping.

Friends of Sentinel Gateway's proposal recently received a positive initial reception from the GSI Program, which will begin capital allocations this summer.

In addition, Ward 1 has promised to introduce FOSG project to their standing meetings with Tucson Water and Tucson Department of Transportation.

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SENTINEL PEAK PARK UPDATE

The new ramada, interpretive signs and paths near the upper parking lot have been completed (see tucsonaz.gov/parks/SentinelPeakPark).

>It has been six months since the start of the Road Safety Pilot Program, which modified the Park hours on Sentinel Peak, including closing the Park to automobile traffic on Mondays. The program has been extended for six more months.

With the closure of Tumamoc, the use of Sentinel Peak Park by walkers, bicyclists and motorists has increased. Out of concern for social distancing, Tucson Police Department has dispersed at least two large gatherings in the parking lots, one with over 200 people.

Many people continue even now to use the Park while not wearing masks, despite the increasing numbers of people there.
