The latest updated critical contact information is collected via a meeting sign-in log. This includes emails and cell phones.







The parade map is adapted from 2014, but changes were possible so the map wasn't finalized in time for the orientation meeting.






All hams are observers and NOT parade officials. Net Control Dennis KI6NQG briefs the hams on frequencies, Net protocols, and general parade operating procedures.















Reporting to Net Control










