It Is Time

I thought I would begin this letter with an appropriate line from a wonderful Disney movie. As parents of young children may know, the line is from the movie, "The Lion King," and it is in reference to the main character when it is time for him to reclaim his kingdom. The purpose of this letter is to tell you that it is time to reclaim our neighborhood elementary school.

So many exciting things have taken place over the last few months that I hardly know were to begin. I received a call from Dr. Irene Jordan from Denver Public Schools a couple months ago to let me know that Montclair has been chosen as one of three schools to receive an additional \$250,000 over the next 3 years to help in a revitalization project. I was also informed that the principal was retiring and they were searching for a new principal to lead the school in the direction that we as a neighborhood would choose. Dr. Jordan is well aware that less than 5% of the students who attend Montclair actually live within its historic boundaries. She wants that to change and she has backed up her assurances with helping us do this, not only with money, but with a new leader.

Katy Saunders, who is a fellow Montclair board member, and I were invited to help select the school's new principal. The other members of the group included two school officials from DPS, one parent, and five Montclair teachers. There were more than 50 highly qualified applicants who were considered for this position. As a group we were being picky because we know that turning Montclair around is going to be tough and we need just the right qualities in a new principal if we are going to make it work. Well, I would like to tell you that we found her.

Not only did we all know that we wanted her the minute the interview was over, but the first thing she said when we gave her the chance to tell us about herself was that she "wanted this job." She had driven through our neighborhood over the previous several days and talked with many parents at the neighborhood parks to found out what the perception of Montclair School was in our community. I would like to add at this point that she was the only one to do this. On top of this she is an expert at grant writing, a Ritchie Fellow Intern, holds a Masters in Curriculum and Instruction in the Content Areas, and is currently the Technology Specialist for Denver Public Schools. She also speaks French and Spanish and designed the Writing and Technology project for 3rd-5th grade students and teachers, etc. etc.

Changes Coming to Colfax

Trendy retail shops and restaurants are coming to Historic Montclair. The construction will begin this fall on Mayfair Village, two pedestrian-oriented retail complexes that are expected to house 10 quick-serve restaurants, upscale retailers and coffee shops.

The development by Drake Real Estate Services of Denver will be built at the northeast and southwest corners of Krameria and Colfax, former home of Empire Honda. According to Vikki Seward, development manager, the two properties cost \$1.9 million. She said Drake has received letters of intent, but no firm commitments at this time, from a coffee shop, a small bank, and a Mexican food restaurant that will provide both dine-in and take-out service. The three are slated for the southwest corner site.

Drake is awaiting approvals from the City of Denver before proceeding with the development but hopes to begin construction in October and have shops open by April 2005. Seward said there are no definite plans at this time for

what is being called the northeast corner, a site on the north side of Colfax between Krameria and Leyden. According to an April 12th article in the *Denver Post*, other Colfax changes within the Historic Montclair boundaries



include the Ivy Cafe, now open for breakfast and lunch, and a future Mexican and Cajun restaurant that will replace the Dutch Boy Donut shop at Magnolia and Colfax. A burger "joint" is scheduled for the future at

Elm and Colfax.

The projects are part of the Colfax Avenue redevelopment where \$80 million has been invested in buildings that stretch east from Grant St. for 40 blocks along Colfax. Councilwoman Marcia Johnson is actively involved in the redevelopment

Another major change for the neighborhood will be a new two-story Safeway at 13th and Krameria, set to open later this year. A Starbucks and a larger organic produce section are among special features planned for the store. Construction will begin as soon as the current 26-year-old store is razed.

Murder in Montclair

Historic Montclair has a checkered past - it is part of what makes our neighborhood historic. Montclair's beginnings were with a European baron intent on striking it rich by building a town on the plains. Then the town of Montclair failed, becoming part of Denver. We also housed tuberculosis patients, had a mysterious tunnel from the Molkery to the castle and a casino at the corner of 8th & Monaco (just to name a few highlights).

But one of the most sensational chapters in our neighborhood's history was a 1911 murder trial, featuring a beautiful female defendant who shot her husband in the back at the gate of the Richthofen Castle. The tale has been retold by in a book titled *Alienation of Affection* by Robert Hardaway, a University of Denver law professor.


Hollywood could not have devised a more intricate, titillating plot than the one that unfolds in Hardaway's book: an emotional triangle, wealth, a whirlwind romance and death. Gertrude Gibson Patterson, who reporters dubbed "The Most Beautiful Woman in America," may have been a heartless gold digger/murderess or a loyal friend caught in a hopeless situation. Her life begins in a small rural town in Illinois and weaves its way through Chicago, Europe and Denver.

The courtroom circus that follows the shooting (yes, it was

called "The Trial of the Century") rivals anything we have witnessed in recent years. Media accounts (including the New York newspapers) extol Gertrude's beauty and fashion sense in excruciating detail and speculate about her romantic connections. Women's groups wrote to the newspapers beseeching


they halt the scandalous coverage. Lucky for Hardaway, the coverage was exhaustive and gave him plenty of research fodder.

For a motivated reader, this book can easily be finished in a few sittings and can be addictive. My neighbor, Jack Murphy, loaned it to me after he checked it out of the library and I finished it a few days later. Hardaway paints his picture from one of several possible scenarios, but he is not heavy-handed in his depiction -- a reader can easily differ in their interpretation. But



the book may leave you wanting more information, or at least a walk around the castle to imagine the scene of the crime.

There is a tragic subplot to Hardaway's tale. This is a book that would not have been published without the assistance of a law student who unearthed extensive Denver newspaper coverage (testimony was printed verbatim in the next day's edition), but did not live to read the book. Her mark is as much a part of this book as Gertrude's.
