# March Meeting Regarding 2 Recent Violent Crimes in our Area

On March 6th, several members of the Mesa Police Department, led by Commander Mike Dvorak, held a community meeting at Rancho Del Mar Park, one of our neighboring communities. The meeting was attended by area residents including several residents of Marlborough Mesa. Topics of discussion included two recent criminal incidents in the area.

The first, occurring February 19 was a drive by shooting at a residence on W. Naranja in the Dobson Woods neighborhood where the residents of the house returned fire, injuring occupants of the vehicle. Police believe this was not a random act, the parties involved knew each other and this may be a continuation of an earlier altercation.

The second incident involved the stabbing of two young men in the Rancho Del Mar park on February 27 by a man who was allegedly intoxicated. The man then barricaded himself in his (stolen) vehicle; the SWAT Team responded to the call, cleared the situation and placed the man under arrest.

Giving a breakdown of crime in the area over the past two years; burglary is down, violent crime is unchanged but there has been an increased rate of auto theft, more so in parking lots rather than in residential areas.

What can we do to protect our neighborhood? Form neighborhood watch programs, report suspicious acts and keep an eye out for each other.

#### Nov. 6, 2004 Homicide Defendants Sentenced


The four cousins that committed the homicide at 1007 Portobello have been sentenced. The four men beat Omar Villalpando, 20 to death at a party. The defendants were sentenced as of February 18<sup>th</sup>, 2006, and will each serve between 13 and 21 years in prison. (3 plead guilty to 2<sup>nd</sup> degree murder, the 4<sup>th</sup> to manslaughter). (*The family no* longer lives in MM.)

#### **Recent Violent Crimes:**

Recently there was a stabbing / barricade situation on Country Club & Guadalupe (Rancho Del Mar), as well as a drive by shooting just across Guadalupe (Dobson Woods) from our neighborhood. Fortunately, we have not seen this type of occurrence in MM.

#### Vehicular Burglaries / Vandalism:

We are seeing a substantial amount of vehicular crimes, vandalism, theft,

& burglary. Please keep your vehicles locked and watch out for your friends and neighbors cars also. Parking in your garage or driveway whenever possible, and ensuring the area is illuminated at night may help reduce your chances of falling victim

### Potential budget cuts

(Reprinted from The Arizona Republic)

At the beginning of March, Mesa laid out potential budget cuts in a list that could change. Below is the description of the reduction and the savings impact on the General Fund if a property tax and/or increased property sales tax fail.

- Transfer an economic development specialist to Falcon Field: \$98,587.
- Eliminate a marketing and communications specialist II position: \$68,771.
- Cancel membership in the Valley Forward organization: \$7,000.
- Reduce the Mesa Room's operations at the Main Library to appointment only: \$105,837.
- Eliminate staff support for E-Streets broadband and GIS technical support: \$214,964.
- Code compliance officer proposed to be paid from CDBG funds in FY 2006/07: \$70,537.
- Reduce security officer positions from 44 to 39: \$217,304.
- Eliminate the operating costs associated with the sale of a fixed-wing aircraft: \$14,000.
- Increase revenue in photo safety program to break even with program costs: \$214,000.
- Delay expansion O&M for new court facilities: \$483,217.
- Reduce Quality and Org Division adviser positions from three to two: \$120,597.
- Eliminate a management intern position: \$46,704.
- Cut membership payment to the Innovations Organization: \$7,506.
- Reduce funding for economic development studies: \$50,000.
- Eliminate two staff positions within Town Center: \$126,675.
- Eliminate holiday lighting: \$50,000.
- Reduce Economic Development Division funding and eliminate an economic development specialist position: \$211,258.
- Reduce WGAA contribution from Mesa as Part 2 of a phased implementation of impact: \$1 million.
- Reduce broadcasting communications (Channel 11 programming, production, audio/video services, administration and overhead) activities: \$151,810.
- Eliminate a marketing and communication specialist position and reduce collateral materials: \$112,072.
- Discontinue stocking urban lakes with fish: \$8,000.
- Eliminate cultural arts grants to outside groups: \$113,668.
- Eliminate the General Fund subsidy to performing art classes for youths: \$143,734.
- Eliminate the General Fund subsidy to performing art classes for adults: \$160,145.
- Eliminate General Fund subsidy to visual art classes: \$443,521.
- Eliminate General Fund subsidy to Stageworks (children's theater): \$210,000.
- Close Autry Tennis Center (lease out if possible): \$155,190.
- Eliminate Parks Special Events Programs beyond July 1: \$245,710.
- Reduce the level of funding for the Park Ranger Program by 50 percent: \$244,877.
- Museum for Youth facility reduces hours by 50 percent: \$514,941.
- Mesa Southwest Museum reduces hours by 23 percent: \$852,384.
- Reduce the marketing and communication staff in community services by 50 percent: \$182,699.
- Reduce the operation of the Dobson and Red Mountain branch libraries, reduce support services at the Main Library that support the operations of the branch libraries: \$1,178,649.
- Adjust court revenue streams to increase receipts: \$300,000.
- Delay expansion O&M for new court facilities: \$669,493.
- Reduce bidding project coordination activity for the city and CIP administration: \$93,692.
- Reduce landscape maintenance at city facilities by 50 percent and perform minimal maintenance to meet weed requirements and keep trees alive: \$148,000.
- Reduce Household Hazardous Waste Program collections from four per year to two per year: \$56,000.
- Reductions in administrative support in development services administration: \$106,094.
- Reduce As-Built staff in Engineering Division: \$204,686.
- Eliminate a real estate services specialist II position: \$65,766.
- Reduce public transit services by 21 percent of the \$4.79 million General Fund contribution: \$1 million.
- Eliminate a program assistant position, equipment technician, parts and supply assistant, and a parts and supply specialist: \$205,268.
- Eliminate a program assistant position: \$60,916.
- Eliminate a fire inspector position: \$70,193.
- Eliminate a fire inspector supervisor position: \$81,581.
- Eliminate administration support assistant I position: \$44,852.
- Eliminate the general services manager position: \$179,964.
- Eliminate the communications director position: \$141,437.
- Reduce safety coordinator positions and associated costs from three to two: \$81,532.
- Eliminate human resources analyst position, office assistant I position: \$107,080.
- Eliminate human resources specialist II positions: \$109,336.

Eliminate human services specialist & reduce human service General Fund support & explore a Mesa Senior Center rental fee: \$745,542.

- Reduce a marketing and communication specialist II position: \$85,010.
- Reduce five staff and related costs from the Neighborhood Outreach Administration activity: \$489,742.
- Eliminate one and a half code compliance officers and eliminate one FTE support staff: \$137,701.
- Reduce animal control officer positions from seven to four: \$155.371.
- Reduce security officer positions from 39 to 34: \$214,978.
- Reduce police crime-fee activity by 66 percent: \$135,205.
- Increase SRO contribution from the schools. Schools pick up 100 percent of the cost of officers in the middle schools: \$486,204.
- Provide core enhancement funding for facility maintenance, purchased capital, capital improvement funding, and to improve fund balance reserves: **Would cost \$5 million**.
- Eliminate chief assistant city prosecutor, one staff position and professional service reductions: \$204,150.
- Reduce funding for public space management by half: \$109,629.
- Reduce the city managers diversity office staffing from two to one: \$70,165.
- Eliminate economic development GPEC funding: \$176,372.
- Reduce Williams Gateway AREA staffing from two to one: \$55,567.
- Reduce WGAA contribution from Mesa as part one of a phased implementation of impact. Transfer \$75,000 to pay for an updated development plan for WGA: \$925,000.
- Reduce the city council assistant positions from three to two: \$62,969.
- Reductions in the transfer of the city's bed tax revenues to the Mesa Convention and Visitors Bureau: \$200.000.
