# Cancellation Update at March 28 Annual Meeting

Wednesday, March 28, 2007, 7:00-8:30 p.m.

Join us, meet and greet your neighbors and get a timely update on important neighborhood issues at the Sorensen Neighborhood Association annual meeting. The meeting will be held from 7-8:30 p.m. on March 28 in a <u>new location: the St. Louis Park High School cafeteria.</u> And we are keeping with our shameless enticement, **LOTS OF FREE PIZZA.** 

The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) recently informed the City of St. Louis Park that it has removed the permanent reconstruction of Highway 100 from its next 10-year plan. The project had been scheduled to begin in 2014, and MnDOT was positioning the project so that construction could start earlier if funds became available. City Council Representative Sue Sanger will attend our meeting to pass along the latest information about Hwy. 100 and other issues.

According to Sue, the city will work with legislators, the City of Edina, the Chamber of Commerce, residents, businesses and others to attempt to reverse the MnDOT decision.

Additional speakers include State Rep. Steve Simon, Marney Olson, St. Louis Park's new community liaison, and Karen Atkinson from Children First. State Senator Ron Latz has also been invited.

Official business will include the annual election of the Sorensen Steering Committee. You'll have an opportunity to join the steering committee, serve as a volunteer and meet current committee members.



#### SORENSEN FACTOIDS

#### Did you know?

- Every summer in the 1920s, fireworks were sold out of the Butler Brothers warehouse, which stood where Alabama Avenue intersected the railroad tracks a block east of Brunswick. Smoking was banned near the building, and neighborhood residents came to buy cherry bombs, caps, 3-inch salutes, Roman candles, skyrockets and ladyfingers.
- In 1933, a committee led by C.L. Hurd came up with a new street naming and numbering system for St. Louis Park. Webster, Xenwood and Yosemite were among the names added. The "second alphabet" took names from U.S. states and Canadian provinces (such as Alabama and Brunswick).
- Hamilton Street is named in honor of Joseph Hamilton, a founding father of St. Louis Park who served as its first mayor and postmaster from 1886 to 1900.

#### From our City Council representative, Sue Sanger:

#### First, the good news:

Construction of the citywide high speed wireless internet system is expected to be operational in the Sorensen neighborhood by June or July. If you haven't already done so, indicate your interest in subscribing to the service by contacting Clint Pires at City Hall, or on the city's website.

The City Council is reviewing the dozens of excellent recommendations made by citizen action teams, as part of the Vision St. Louis Park strategic planning process. Many thoughtful and creative suggestions were made for the improvement of the city's natural and built environment, transportation systems, arts and cultural events, community diversity, housing, sidewalks and trails, gathering places, etc. We are considering how to prioritize and pay for them and of course will be seeking additional public input prior to any final decisions.

After several years of multiple major redevelopment projects, there seems to be a temporary lull in new projects, with one significant exception. The city has received a proposal to redevelop 44 acres southwest of the intersection of Highways 100 and 394, including some land located within Golden Valley. The proposal is to build a new retail development and several office towers, also including a movie theater, restaurants, and possibly a hotel. The city is

working with the developer to refine the site plans and address the numerous associated traffic, financial, environmental and legal issues. Demolition of existing buildings is anticipated to begin later this summer.

#### And now, the really bad news:

MnDOT has informed the city that it has removed the permanent reconstruction of Highway 100 from its' next ten year plan. As you may recall, MnDOT had previously scheduled the project to begin in 2014, and as recently as December, 2006 had been expediting the highway design process, so as to be ready to build earlier if funds became available. As MnDOT previously indicated, this rebuild is vital due to the deteriorating bridges and long-term mitigation of traffic congestion, despite the temporary relief provided by the recent "interim" roadwork. The city will aggressively work with legislators, the City of Edina, the Chamber of Commerce, interested residents and businesses, and other partners to attempt to reverse this decision.



When construction of their home was completed they moved in on their wedding night, August 28, 1948. The construction cost of their home: \$15,000.

#### Evergreen Winner Has "Gardener Angel"

Sorensen residents Lauren and Greg Behl, 5917 Minnetonka Blvd., were honored in September for adding beauty to the neighborhood with their home's landscaping. The Evergreen Award they received from the St. Louis Park City Council was a surprise; they don't know who nominated them, although they suspect a neighbor.

"I'm not a skilled gardener, but I think I have an eye for design and color and I like to keep the landscape natural to the lot," said Lauren, who began updating her large yard following a home expansion project in 1995.

Lauren has tackled the landscaping in stages, doing almost everything herself. An old driveway was filled in with dirt and perennial flower beds have been added on all sides of the house. Lauren feels the work is "about two-thirds done" as she continues to replace grass with gardens. Coming up soon: landscaping the hill that wraps around the southwest corner of the lot.

"This house has been in our family since 1920, starting with my grandparents, Ray and Ethel Mosher," Lauren said. "My mother, Jean Martin, was born here and we bought it in 1980 when my daughter was born. It was hard for me to change things, but my grandfather was a gardener and I kind of feel like he's been an angel gardener on my shoulder."

### Hot Topics from Steve Simon

Steve Simon, District 44A, Minnesota House of Representatives:

The 2007 legislative session is underway. I'm cautiously optimistic about the prospect of positive action. Here's a brief overview of the big issues.

**K-12 Education** Nearly everyone agrees that K-12 schools will get more resources. The only question is how much more—and under what conditions. In addition, there's a push to fund voluntary all-day kindergarten.

**Health Care** There's broad agreement that we need to move toward giving all children health care. This "Cover All Kids" initiative won't happen overnight, but we can make sure over time that all kids have health security.

**Property Tax Relief** People need a property tax break. The most likely package will include restoration of state aid cuts to cities, direct aid to seniors and low-income residents, and the use of existing state money instead of property tax revenue to fund our schools.

**Energy** The legislature will probably pass a requirement that utility companies use renewable energy in the production of 25% of their energy by 2025.

**Transportation** All sides concede that new spending is needed to keep up with increasing demand. The governor wants to borrow to pay for billions in backlogged highway projects—like the final phase of Highway 100. Legislators in both political parties prefer a modest increase in the gas tax (which hasn't been raised since 1988).
