MINUTES OF MARCH 23 MEETING -

Call to Order (CTO) by President Unruh at 7:31pm at John Collins Church, 2320 S. Bannock.

Present: President Jack Unruh, Vice President Catherine Sandy, Secretary Charley Samson, Treasurer Lois Strohmeyer, Explorer Patrick Bramley, Neighbors Judy Greek, Dora Greek, Jean Hogan, Dawn Dutton, Frank Dutton, Betsy Raube, Matt Riley, Monique Guidry, Becky Clark, Helene Orr, Joanne Weiss, Ray Ehrenstein, David M. Lipman, Arlene Lipman, Jim Sample, Jennifer Pollock, John Chapman, Melanie Ulle, Barbara Barg, Kevin Dickson.

Minutes of last meeting were approved, as was the Treasurer's Report, which noted a balance of \$1174.84, not counting membership receipts received tonight.

Kevin Dickson noted that Bike Denver recommends a bridge over Iliff, but no money to fund it. An "historic" bridge over Jewell was mentioned, as were Johan Damiano and the interns. Unruh mentioned neighborhoodlink.com + zip code as a resource and the need for a pedestrian friendly concourse from the Evans Light Rail Station to Broadway. A new RTD person will be invited to a future ONA meeting. The Evans station was described as an "area of change," given the owner of the snowboard outlet on Delaware and the notion of the TMU (Transit Mixed Use) concept. BARD (Broadway Area Redevelopment District?) is also interested.

Jennifer Pollock noted Julie Connor's bid to succeed MacKenzie on the city council.

Catherine Sandy brought up the subject of the Santa Fe billboard moratorium and the lack of enforcement. It costs \$4000 a month to rent a billboard.

In other news: the McStain's project south of Mississippi, and the Parks Department's plan to renovate Aqua Golf and a bike path link to same. Overland Ponds rest rooms have migrated, then were eliminated due to homeless loitering. Unruh: "supervised elimination" if the new Aqua Golf had rest rooms. Platte valley cleanup around Earth Day.

Partnership Denver, a volunteerism organization, is having a focus group at Green Valley Ranch on Saturday. Unruh said he has attended one such meeting, which concerned distressed properties and the need for financial education.

NIS (Neighborhood Inspection Service) has a checklist of property upkeep. There are DURA (Denver Urban Renewal Authority) loans available at 0% or low interest.

Jennifer Pollock noted the Portland model, which is akin to an old-fashioned barn raising, with points earned for volunteering.

Matt Riley called Overland the last refuge for cheap housing in Denver. The Galapago Group was concerned about grafitti and burglary by families known for crime. Free dumpster beige paint is available, as well as a possible District 4 "Grafitti Sting" and Neighborhood Watch. A Galapago Task Force was identified.

Kevin Dickson was approved as "E-mail Net Czar."

The meeting didn't so much adjourn as dissolve around 8:34p.m.

Great American Cleanup / Large Item Pickup

Denver is scheduling CommunityCleanups through May 22nd; these are arranged two weeks in advance so that the City can supply trash bags, etc., even tools in some cases. My favorite target is the trash on the Platte banks, but heaven knows there's plenty in Overland to be cleaned up.

LET'S DECIDE AT THE MEETING THURSDAY IF WE WANT OT ORGANIZE A TWO HOUR CLEANUP IN ONE OR MORE LOCATIONS IN OVERLAND ON A SATURDAY IN MAY...?

Large item pickup – May 8-12: leave furniture, bikes, barbeques, rolled carpet and tree branches (4' long max) and other large items (EXCEPT major appliances, hazardous wastes, car parts and tires, construction materials and debris) near your dumpster.

Organizing Meeting for Neighborhood Watch

Vandalism, graffiti, mugging, theft – mostly by middle school children – where will it all end? Hopefully with organized resistance. Per decisions at last month's ONA meeting, concerned Jewell, Galapago, Elati and Fox Street residents will meet at 6:30 Tuesday, April 25 at the Golf Course to take the first steps toward a Neighborhood Watch Campaign. We'll report at Thursday's ONA meeting.

Image Enhancement / Branding for Overland

Kevin Dickson, Eric Peterson and others have expressed interest in promoting a memorable neighborhood identity. This could enhance property values, encourage business, boost neighborly pride and even guide development. Trouble is, we're a diverse neighborhood that will be hard to capture with one idea (i.e. LoDo).

SoBo is a Broadway handle promoting business [http://www.sobodenver.com/] but it has yet to push its influence south through Overland (we could encourage that). But important as Broadway is, it isn't all of Overland. Changing our neighborhood name back to the historic "Overland Park" could paint a greener post-Shattuck picture of the 'hood, but although we have one of the largest green spaces in Denver (Golf Course, Grant-Frontier Park, Overland Ponds + adjacent Ruby Hill) none of it is east of Santa

Fe. Still, since re-linking across Santa Fe is a neighborhood priority, it could be good, and listing properties as being in historic Overland Park might attract interest.



Crossing Santa Fe and Living to Tell About It

This theme has many threads already going – Kevin is working the BikeDenver folks; our glacially evolving Neighborhood Plan has certainly had this isse front and center for the last 13 years; and a TOD initiative for the Evans Station area has to key on walkability. As a finite start on the issue, how about doing an Americans with Disabilities assessment of the Evans viaduct? We can pay someone to do this officially or parse it out ourselves, but documenting that the scary bridge that's breaking our #!^#'s is also breaking the law gives us leverage. Volunteers?

TOD Is German for "Death" and Urban-Planning for "Life"

The promise of the Evans Station Light Rail stop is largely unrealized (not dead!), though we all like the Burton Snowboard building and are rooting for John's multiple-use development plans. As noted last meeting, a Transit-Mixed-Use-30 zoning designation for both sides of Delaware from Asbury to Iliff and both sides of Evans from Delaware to Broadway could attract developer attention, raise property values and express neighborhood intent. Every planner who's looked at the area has envisioned a pedestrian-friendly concourse from the station to B'way, lined with the kinds of shops that transit riders appreciate – coffee bars, newsstands, dry cleaners, daycare, restaurants, etc.



Councilwoman MacKenzie's office is currently applying to triple the parking at the station, which would also signal added interest. As weird and hostile as the station environment and sub-viaduct atmosphere may be, this is the most central piece of real estate in Overland and needs to develop if we are to be a neighborhood defined by what's here, not what we're near.

WE SHOULD DISCUSS THESE MATTERS AT THE MEETING THURSDAY.
