
We will work with the city to preserve the old firehouse and hopefully find a new use for it.

Also in April, two SLA students received championship honors in the Courier-Journal 2005-06 Young Authors' Program. Jamisha Harris and Juanchya Parris helped SLA finish among the top three winning middle schools in Jefferson County. The students attended a dinner/reception for all district winners on May 15th.

Rose Thieves make Beechmont Residents Blue

was saddened the other day as I exited the Watterson Expressway to find out that some self centered thief had stolen approximately sixty rose bushes planted for an area beautification project. The roses were recently planted at the on and off ramps of the Watterson Expressway at Third Street and Southern Parkway.

The Expressway beautification project bloomed from a comment made by the Beechmont Neighborhood Association to Mayor Jerry Abramson at one of the monthly town hall meetings held back in November. We stated that the ramps at Southern Parkway, and Third street are probably some of the most widely used by visitors to the city. Many visitors to our fair city pass this way on a visit to Churchill Downs. We wanted to make a good impression on visitors to our neighborhood.

From this meeting, the mayor spoke with Steve Sexton, (President of Churchill Downs), and through a partnership with Project Brightside, the Beechmont, Oakdale, and Wilder Park Neighborhood Associations the project was set in motion.

Approximately 550 rose bushes

were planted about a week before the Derby. Then strange things started happening. About a week after Derby, a couple of rose bushes disappeared, and then one weekend, some person or persons stole approximately sixty plants at one time. This act of vandalism decimated the entire project.



After a call to the director of Brightside we were assured that the roses would be replaced, but that if the theft continued that they could not continue to replace them. Thankfully, the roses were replaced, and now the project is really starting to take shape.

The project was an expensive un-

dertaking at no cost to the neighborhood. The rose bushes are a variety known as "Knockout roses" that retail for \$30.00 dollars each. They will bloom from early spring to the first frost in the fall. Once the roses take hold it will be a dazzling display of color.

Hopefully everyone has taken notice of the project and is enjoying the beauty of our new landscape. If you truly do enjoy seeing the roses, please drop a line to the sponsors of this project, and thank them for their support of South Louisville.
