



From our Previous Meeting

Our May meeting was a "walk in the park" as we welcomed Metro Parks. With over 40 members & 20 guests in attendance, we began to form a master plan for the future usage of Camp Taylor Memorial Park. The prevailing issue, parking, brought many ideas, including using diagonal parking, relocating parking and closing off the corner of Redwood Dr. and Poplar Level (near the Softball field) to vehicular traffic.

Inside the park, the location of the playground equipment and basketball court were questioned. It was decided that, while the playground is in good condition, it should be moved away from the athletic areas. Also questioned was the walking track; which will now become a track around the permitter of the park.

Additional concerns about overnight camping in the park prompted the office of Metro Councilman Jim King to offer to fund and staff additional Metro Police officers to patrol the park day and night on Memorial Day, the Forth of July and Labor Day.


"We can achieve something great here, I have no doubt in my mind." That was his quote, one year ago, as Dr. Gilles Meloche joined Louisville Metro Animal Services as director, with a mission of rapid change for the better.

In that year Animal Services added staff, including a full-time veterinarian, a mobile clinic called S.P.O.T., and recently unveiled plans for a new Animal Care Center, of which Mayor Jerry Abramson has allocated \$750,000 for in his proposed 2006/07 fiscal year budget.

As the largest animal protection organization in Kentucky, Metro Animal Services responds to more than 20,000 calls that range from bite cases to severe inhumane treatment, and receives more than 12,000 animals—everykind from household pets to horses—each year.

Adoptable animals can be viewed online at Animal Services website or in-person at the Animal Care Center, Monday through Saturday.

RECIPE—"Apple-Oatmeal Crisp"

Ingredients

- 2³/₄ pounds Granny Smith apples (7 medium), peeled, & cut into ¹/₄-inch-thick slices (Substitute Golden Delicious apples for Granny Smiths for a sweeter dessert.)
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons plus 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup old-fashioned oats, uncooked
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 6 tablespoons butter or margarine



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F. In 1½-quart baking dish, toss apples with lemon juice; add ½ cup brown sugar and 2 tablespoons flour and toss to coat.
- 2. In small bowl, combine oats, remaining 1/4 cup flour, and remaining 1/4 cup brown sugar. With blender, cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

 Sprinkle over apple mixture.
- 3. Bake until apples are tender and topping has lightly browned, 30 to 35 minutes. Cool slightly on wire rack to serve warm. Makes 6 servings.

As you may have seen recently, Mayor Abramson announced that as part of his "21st Century Fire" plan, all firehouses will stay open; including our Fincastle firehouse, which was recommended for closure. The Courier-Journal attributed this to the many discussions held with neighborhood groups, including our own, saying "It's obvious that folks with the city were listening to the community."

Now, with a commitment from Metro Government to continue maintenance on the Fincastle firehouse, the scheduled replacement of their Quint 9 fire engine in 2008-2009, and the construction of Camp Taylor Fire Protection District's brand-new firehouse near Camp Taylor Memorial Park on Durrett Lane, we have become one of, if not the single, best protected fire district in the state.
