



At Our Previous Meeting

ur July meeting had a great turnout as we welcomed Sergeant Robin Shouse, of Louisville Metro Police's Crimes Against Seniors squad to help us learn about exploitation, abuse and neglect tactics and prevention.

Sgt. Shouse taught everyone how to pluck the feathers out of "pigeon drops" or door-to-door scams, how to prevent yourself from falling victim to home improvement shakedowns, and sweepstakes theft.

Identify theft was a hot topic. Sgt. Shouse said that most personal information is available to those who have basic information about a person (name and address), through internet-based systems.

When asked how to limit a person's expo-

sure to those risks, Sgt. Shouse offered three important tips:

- Shred personal documents, such as bank statements, utility/credit card bills, and credit card applications. Sgt. Shouse offered the story of a person who had a false credit card opened in their name, simply by the thief checking the "change of address" box on a discarded application.
- Check your credit report, at least once per year.
 Every person is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three credit agencies.
 Visit www.annualcreditreport.com to request your report.
- Be cautious about your Social Security Number.
 While many companies ask for your Social Security Number mainly as a tracking number, this is
 a main source of identify theft. Once a thief has
 obtained your Social Security Number, they can
 obtain and use any number of personal items,
 such as a driver's license and credit cards.

Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!


