

Cell Phone Crime Fighters

Sellwood/Moreland neighborhood president, Reid Kells, recently came up with an idea and published it in the February issue of the BEE. His idea is a new approach to dealing with abandoned cars, graffiti and shopping carts. Obviously, the Brooklyn neighborhood does not have a problem with shopping carts, since we do not have a grocery store within our boundaries. We do, however, have issues with abandoned cars and graffiti. His plan follows:

The city's **abandoned vehicle line is 503/823-7309**. Put this number in your directory starting with BAC - WRECKS. Any vehicle you notice on a public street that has a flat tire, expired plates, or is visibly inoperable can be reported. Let's get them off our streets.

The same goes for **graffiti**. The city's hot line is **503/823-5860**. Dial BAC – GRAFFITI to find it quickly. The faster graffiti is erased, the less it becomes a problem.

With these numbers programmed in your cell phone, when you see a problem, just dial BAC and find the above numbers lumped together in your phone directory.

It really doesn't matter how many people call it in – the more, the better. Just remember: REPORT, REPORT and the results may astound all of us. As always, if action isn't taken in a timely manner, call the Help-Line (503/241-4540) and let us know.




Doggie Doo Bags


Questions and Answers: Light Rail and the Brooklyn Neighborhood

Q: What is the Milwaukie MAX project?

A: There is a strong desire by both local government officials and area residents to expand Portland's popular MAX light rail system into inner Southeast Portland and quickly growing Clackamas County. The proposed Milwaukie MAX extension would add 6.5 miles of track and

provide improved transit service from Brooklyn to OMSI, River Place, and Portland State University to the north and to Sellwood-Moreland, Downtown Milwaukie, and Oak Grove to the south.



A: Recent analysis by local planners predicts that the new MAX line would serve between 23,000 and 26,000 daily riders by the year 2030. Some of these would be existing transit riders, but MAX light rail has a proven record of attracting new transit riders as well.

Q: How much is this project going to cost?

A: Recent media reports have indicated that this project will cost in excess of one billion dollars. This number is correct. The latest projections show that the project will cost \$1.4 billion. Sixty percent of this cost will be picked-up by the Federal Transit Administration. The State of Oregon has already committed \$250 million of state lottery funds for the project.

Q: Wouldn't it be cheaper to extend the Portland Streetcar into Brooklyn instead?

A: Yes, however such an extension would serve fewer people and would require much longer travel times. Since the streetcar uses existing streets, they can only move as fast as automobile traffic. Milwaukie MAX will get around this problem through the use of dedicated right of way in order to bypass congested city streets.

Q: Where are the rail tracks going to be placed? All of the streets in this area seem to be too narrow to accommodate such a project.

A: The Brooklyn portion of this project will be built along SE 17th Avenue. It was determined that placing this rail line along either McLoughlin Boulevard or Milwaukie Avenue would require

the displacement of a large number of

private homes. SE 17th Avenue was selected as a way to eliminate the need to displace local residents. However, a significant number of commercial businesses in this area will now have to relocate. TriMet

staff members are currently working with local property owners in affected areas to discuss relocation options.

Q: Where will the Brooklyn area MAX stations be located?

A: Light rail stations will be located at SE 12th Avenue and Clinton Street, SE 17th Avenue and Rhine Street and SE 17th and Holgate Boulevard. Plans are also being made to include an additional station at SE McLoughlin Boulevard and Harold Street to better serve both Reed College and the Sellwood-Moreland neighborhood.
