


Presidents Message ... Spring Forward Beechmont

Louisville Metro Police 4th Division Beechmont Newsletter February 2007



This newsletter is the first installment of what I hope to be a regular process, one which will provide you with more information and greater access to your police department. Our partnership with the BNA Bugler came about as a result of the community meeting held on January 11th, 2007, at the Iroquois Branch of the Louisville Free Public Library. For our first installment, I would like to provide you with an update of the issues presented at that meeting, a few generic informational tips, and a general overview of reported offenses for Beechmont for the month of January.

The Iroquois Library Branch

We have continued to work with the LFPL to address issues related to juveniles congregating both inside and outside the library, and the problem behaviors they may engage in on their way to and from the library. The LFPL is working on creating system wide protocols that will enhance their ability to track, monitor, and hold these individuals accountable. The LMPD continues to provide extra patrol to the location, and we have been working closely with the local branch to address disorder concerns.

Reported Offenses for January

Overall criminal offenses in Beechmont are at or below historic levels.

The following reported totals occurred in January for your neighborhood:

- 14 Burglaries (which includes residential, business and garages/ sheds)
- 7 Criminal Mischief/Vandalism
- 4 Auto Thefts
- 6 Thefts from Auto

There were multiple arrests made for several of the reported burglaries, which cleared two different clusters of offenses in the neighborhood. Overall, reported offenses have been consistent with what the neighborhood typically experiences this time of the year. Offense totals usually increase in warmer weather, and decrease during periods of sustained cold temperatures.

The Tip Line

If you think someone has been involved in criminal activity, or there is an ongoing situation in your neighborhood such as a possible drug house, call 574-LMPD. Every tip called in is assigned to the appropriate investigative unit for follow-up, and you DO NOT have to leave your name or contact information.

Calling Dispatch

If you require a police response, but it is not an actual emergency involving immediate threat to human life, call the general dispatch number at 574-2111. This "urgency without emergency" number will start the process for a beat car to respond to your concern without tying up 911, which is reserved for situations where someone's life or well being is at stake.

The Telephone Reporting Unit

I know many of you have things stolen or damaged and don't bother to call the police because you believe it's not important enough. We track offense patterns through offense reports, so if you don't call, we can't look for patterns and assign resources where they will do the most good. If you have a car break in, have something stolen from your yard, or are the victim of vandalism, the Telephone Reporting Unit (TRU) can take a report from you over the phone. This allows us to enter the data in the system without tying up beat officers who could be better utilized in other ways. TRU can be reached directly at 574-4661, and they are available from 6AM to 10PM, Monday through Friday.




