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


# **Board Report**

As we all enjoy the summer in our various ways, remember that there is still work being carried out by numerous resident volunteers to keep the community on an even keel.

Some of these are social in nature, to keep residents occupied during the summer quiet time. Some involve planning for the storm season, evacuations etc.,

which naturally we hope does not materialize. But preparation is everything.



Other work being carried on is by several committees, notably Finance and Planning, as under Florida statutes we must have budgets prepared and ready for voting by predetermined dates. As many of you realize these dates do not conform to the dates you are in residence here, and it is not always clear how and why budgets are prepared. But rest assured, the committee members are always cognizant of what is important to the Cove.

There have been/are several political fronts under way by the Florida legislature that will impact Cove residents. One of course is property insurance, and which, while seemingly settled, is still a work in progress, and the full impact on Floridians, and mobile homeowners in particular, is still to be seen.

Then there are property taxes, and more specifically the homestead exemptions. The legislature is meeting early in June to try to come up with some more equitable way to deal with property assessments and its effect on property taxes. As we all know the present system is not equitable with respect to non-homesteaders and renters. Some of the ideas being touted seem to exacerbate this inequity and others seem to offer a ray of hope that a more equitable system will be found. The one thing I glean from all the preliminary skirmishing by our politicos is that homesteaders will benefit more than at present, particularly at the lower property values, such as exist in this community. However the verdict is still out, and whatever may transpire politically, it will only be a first step, and similar to insurance, will undoubtedly be a work in progress for some time.

The Architectural Review Committee, under the chairmanship of Dick Nemi, has made a suggestion to help us fill the empty lots in the community. This proposal will also need the input of the Planning and Finance Committees, and will need a recommendation of the Board to the membership before being possible. The present Incorporation documents limit the minimum size of homes in the community to double wides, that is to say a minimum outside perimeter of 24 ft. by 36 ft.

The proposal under consideration is to change this to a minimum square foot size. This would allow single wides in the community. In other words there will be flexibility in the types of units allowed. A number of the existing quad lots, and also a number of single lots cannot easily accommodate homes based on the present perimeter sizes, and this is restricting our ability to fill the open spaces, and increase our revenue.

There are now manufacturers of mobiles who have realized this need and are building such units. We believe there is a demand for such homes, but nevertheless, whatever the need is, we cannot accommodate most double wides on many of the remaining empty lots/spaces.

# Manager's Report

### **LAUNDRY HOURS:**

We have had a request from a couple of residents to extend the laundry hours.

At present, the laundries are open in excess of 98 hours a week Monday—Sunday from 7:00 am to 9 plus pm. We are not willing to extend the hours for a couple of people.



Please remember the last load of wash needs to be

in early enough to get them <u>dry before</u> the night guard stops by at 9.45 to lock up. We have also been asked to purchase a larger dryer for large items such as comforters. There are two commercial laundries on  $4^{th}$  street that have large dryers to accommodate you.

### WATER RESTRICTIONS:



Last month I gave particular instructions for watering. Soon after I wrote the article the City was around giving water restriction notices. The problem was the timing – over 300 of our residents had already left for the north.

We have applied for a variance since we do have our own wells. We do not use reclaimed **City Water** to irrigate our lawns and flower beds. We had been turning the wells off during the week, as the city's strict instructions were **Saturday even numbers and Sunday odd numbers ONLY.** 

The well system has suffered some damage by being turned on and off. We can no longer do that and run the risk of breaking a very costly well. Everyone is in the drought together. We will all have to stick together and do what is required to save our ground water. We seem to go through this every April and May.

Rainy season will be upon us soon. PLEASE, PLEASE CONSERVE. WATER ON YOUR DAY AND TIME!

### **OFFICE EXPENDITURE:**



The office expenditure seems to be a major topic of conversation on our ListBot web site. So we will attempt to clear this up. Anyone wanting to see all the figures to date – Actual and Proposed, go to the MAROA Bulletin Board at the Clubhouse.

## HELPING HAND COMMITTEE:



# History of Our Flag



The flag of the United States of America today has 13 stripes - 7 red and 6 white - and 50 white stars on a blue field - five rows of 6 and four rows of 5. The stripes remind us of the 13 original colonies that gained us our liberty. The stars represent the states that are bound together into one country.




The flag of today grew out of many earlier flags raised in days gone by over American soil. From the time that America was discovered, different flags flew over different parts of the country; the flags of Spain, France, Holland, Sweden, and England. An English flag, known as






# Attracting Hummingbirds



onald and Lillian Stokes — authors of Stokes Hum mingbird Book: The Complete Guide to Attracting, Identifying, and Enjoying Hummingbirds — offer this recipe and tips to attract hummingbirds to your feeder:

Boil 1 part sugar to 4 parts water for one to two minutes; cool and store in the refrigerator. They caution not to substitute honey or artificial sweeteners for sugar because both are detrimental to the birds.



Hummingbird feeders should be rinsed with hot water (not detergents) and filled every three to four days (and more often in particularly hot weather). Tie a red ribbon on the feeder and place it near flowers that hummingbirds like, such as fuchsias, hollyhocks, and geraniums.

the Red Ensign, waved over the 13 colonies from 1707 to the Revolution. The Red Ensign was the merchant flag of England. It was red with a union in the upper corner combining the cross of St. George (red on white), patron of England, with the diagonal cross (white on blue) of St. Andrew. patron of Scotland.

The flag that became known as the Grand Union flag was raised over George Washington's headquarters outside Boston on January 1, 1776. The Revolutionary War had started the year before and the colonies needed a flag of their own. The Grand Union flag retained the union of the English flag. Six white stripes broke the red field into seven red stripes - a total of 13 stripes.

The first official flag of the new nation was created by a resolution of the Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia. The resolution was passed on June 14, 1777. That is the date we celebrate each year as Flag Day. The resolution specified, "that the flag be 13 stripes alternate red and white; that the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field,



representing a new constellation." Since the resolution did not state how the stars were to be arranged, flag makers arranged them in different ways, among them; rows, in a half circle, and in a full circle. The one adopted was made by Besty Ross and had the stars in a full circle.

The flag that waved over Fort McHenry when it was bombarded, September 13-14, 1814. was a 15 star and 15 stripe flag. Two stripes and stars had been added to the original 13 on May 1, 1795. It became famous as the Star Spangled Banner. It was the flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to write our national anthem.

The Flag of 1818 had the stripes reduced to 13. Five more stars had been added, for a total of 20. When still more states joined the United States, it became evident that the flag would get to be an awkward shape if more and still more stripes were added. Therefore, on April 4, 1818, Congress passed a law that restored the design back to the original 13 stripes. It also provided that a star be added to the blue field for each new state.

# Blue Moon: What is a Blue Moon?

The term "Blue Moon" is used to describe the **second full moon** when a full moon occurs twice in the same calendar month. This month there is a full moon on the first and the thirtieth. It happens once every 2.7 years and **never** in the month of February because there are not enough days. The moon does not actually turn blue, though in late September 1950, the moon in eastern North America actually did appear blue. This occurred due to smoke from forest fires in western Canada. Any fine aerosol in the atmosphere can have similar effects. The 1991 eruption of Mt. Pinatubo in the Philippines also resulted in reports of blue moons around the world.

The next Blue Moon will occur on June 30,2007. The name of June's full moon is The Strawberry Moon.

If you want a unique treat, wait until the year 2018 when there will be two blue moons in the same year, one in January and one in March.




In 1900, if a father put a roof over his family's head, he was a success. Today, it takes a roof, deck, pool, and 4-car garage. And that's just the vacation home.



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
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the exercise time of about 25 minutes. All are available Mon., Tues., Wed., Thurs. and Fri. All are on channel 16.






# Oh My Pa-Pa (O Mein Papa)





"O Mein Papa" is a Germman language song, written by Paul Burkhard in 1939 for a musical called *Der Schwarze Hecht* or *Feuerwerk* (*Fireworks*). Under the original German title, an instrumental version by trumpeter Eddie Calvert topped the United Kingdom charts in 1954 and was also a top ten hit in the USA. It was adapted into English by John Turner and Geoffrey Parsons, under the name "Oh! My Pa-Pa." A recording by Eddie Fisher became a #1 hit on the US charts in 1954. Fisher's version also made the UK top ten; thus, in the UK, Calvert's version was number one while Fisher's made the top ten but missed the top spot, and in the US, the roles were reversed.

# The History of Father's Day

While many people believe that Father's Day is a holiday invented by the fine folks at Hallmark, it's not so. The celebration of Dad's special day can most likely be credited to Mrs. John B. Dodd, of Washington State, who first suggested the idea of the holiday in 1909.

Mrs. Dodd's father, civil war veteran William Smart, was widowed when his wife died in childbirth with their sixth child. Despite the obvious hardships, Mr. Smart proceeded to raise the newborn along with his five other children, by himself.

It wasn't until Sonora Dodd became an adult that she realized the strength and selflessness her father had shown in raising his children as a single parent. The original date chosen for the holiday was June 5, Mr. Smart's birthday, however the celebration was postponed until June 19, the third Sunday in June, because there was not enough time to prepare.

At about the same time in various towns and cities across America other people were beginning to celebrate a Father's Day. Some accounts credit Mrs. Charles Clayton of West Virginia, as the founder of Father's Day, although most histories give credit to Mrs. Dodd.

In early times, wearing flowers was a traditional way of celebrating Father's Day. Mrs. Dodd favored the red rose to honor a father still living, while a white flower honored a deceased dad. J.H. Berringer, who also held Father's Day celebrations in Washington State as early as 1912, chose a white lilac as the Father's Day Flower.

In 1924 President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national Father's Day, but it never became official until 1966 when President Lyndon Johnson signed the presidential

proclamation that set aside the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day.

# Grandfather's Clock

In the dining room of my grandfather's house stood a massive grandfather clock. Meals in that dining room were a time for four generations to become one. The table was always spread with food from wonderful family recipes all containing love as the main ingredient. The tears flowed freely when I entered the dining room. The clock stood forlornly quiet, as quiet as the funeral parlor had been. Hushed. The clock even seemed smaller. Not quite as magnificent without my grandfather's special touch. I couldn't bear to look at it.


# Extreme Heat Risky for Heart Patients

# Father's Day, June 17



The first Father's Day was observed in 1910. It was the inspiration of Sonora Dodd, who hit on the idea while listening to a Mother's Day sermon the previous year. Her own mother had died in childbirth when Sonora was 16. She helped her father, William Smart — a Civil War veteran who had moved his family to a farm in Washington State — to raise the newborn, along with her four other brothers. Sonora had long held her father in high esteem, but it was not until she was an adult with her own family that she realized the hardships and sacrifices he had made as a single parent. Sonora approached the Spokane Ministerial Alliance with the idea of creating a day to honor fathers. She suggested that the observance take place on June 5th, her father's birthday, but the alliance chose to make it the third Sunday in June.

Today, Father's Day has become a day not only to honor fathers but also all men who serve as father figures, such as stepfathers, uncles, grandfathers, and male friends of the family.



# Hall of Famer: Jacques Cousteau, June 11, 1910



ceanographer Jacques Cousteau was born near Bordeaux, France. As a young man, he attended the naval academy in Brest and became a gunnery officer for the French Navy. While training to become a pilot, Cousteau was seriously injured in a car accident and began swimming regularly in the Mediterranean to regain the strength in his injured arms. A fellow officer gave him a pair of pearl fisherman's goggles to keep the saltwater from stinging his eyes. The fantastic underwater world he saw through those goggles changed the focus of his life from the skies to the oceans. In 1943. Cousteau and colleague Emile Gagnan invented the aqualung, the first commercially successful scuba diving gear. While still a naval officer, Cousteau explored sea wrecks, convinced the French Navy



to build him a diving capsule, and generally advanced the state of the art in undersea exploration. He retired from the Navy in 1957 but continued his deep-sea explorations in a research vessel named Calypso. He developed improved underwater filming techniques and hosted the internationally successful television series The Undersea World of Jacques Cousteau for eight years. Critics praised Cousteau's ability to describe complex theories and issues in simple terms. In 1974, he founded the Cousteau Society to raise public awareness about oceanic pollution. He wrote several books and produced numerous films on his explorations on and under the seas, including three that won Academy Awards. In 1985, Cousteau received the U.S. Presidential Medal of Freedom. Two years later, he was inducted into the Television Academy's Hall of Fame, and in 1988, the National Geographic Society honored him with its Centennial Award. Cousteau died in 1997 at 87.



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
