## **Prevention of Ticks and Mosquitoes**

- Use repellent with DEET on skin.
- Pre-treat clothing with permethrin before wearing.
- Wear uniform correctly.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts.
  - Deprives ticks of attachment sites.
- Check for ticks regularly, particularly along waistbands, in the armpits and groin area.
- Empty containers or large vesicles in your yard or around your home, which may harbor water, these will attract mosquitoes.

### Tick Removal

- Remove a tick from your skin as soon as you notice it.
  - Successful transmission of disease requires the tick to be attached for at least several hours.
- Use fine-tipped tweezers to firmly grasp the tick very close to your skin.
- With a steady motion, pull the tick's body away from your skin.
- Clean your skin with soap and warm water.
- Avoid crushing the tick's body.
- If you accidentally crush the tick, clean your skin with soap and warm water or alcohol.
- Don't use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish, or other products to remove a tick.
  - These materials are either ineffective, or may agitate the tick causing it to force more infective fluid into the wound site.
  - Note the date of tick removal and report any symptoms consistent with tick-borne illness to your physician immediately.
